(B) 70th Anniversary of the end of World War Two

It is proposed that the City of London Corporation hosts a lecture followed by a reception at Guildhall in May 2015 to mark the 70th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

While the 75th anniversary would usually provide the commemorative focus, this event would provide an opportunity to commemorate the end of the War while some of those who lived through it are still able to attend.

We **recommend** that appropriate hospitality be granted and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved cost parameters.

This would be a Full Court event.

(A) Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy

Your Committee seeks approval for the adoption of the revised Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy and informs about the recently undertaken public consultation and subsequent revisions to the Strategy.

The Strategy will -

- a) establish a fully accessible walkway to provide a direct route along the riverside with enhanced connections to the rest of the City;
- b) create new green spaces and produce redesigns of existing green spaces for people to stop and enjoy the Thames, as well as enhance the biodiversity of the City riverside and mitigate flood risk; and
- c) improve the cohesion and vibrancy of the riverside by encouraging new developments to provide a spacious, accessible and better connected Riverside Walk with appropriate active frontages.

In addition, the Strategy sets out a delivery plan which identifies projects arising from the Strategy, it prioritises them and indicates the funding strategy for delivery.

A printed and circulated report is submitted thereon and we **recommend** the adoption of the Strategy accordingly.

(B) City of London Local Plan

The City of London Local Plan was published for its last stage of public consultation between December 2013 and February 2014. The inspector has now issued his report on the examination of the plan and the final step is to adopt the Local Plan. It is therefore recommended that the City of London Local Plan be adopted by resolution, subject to the modifications.

We submit a printed and circulated report thereon, which we **recommend** be approved.

(C) On Street Parking Reserve

Section 55(3A) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended) requires the City of London Corporation (together with the London Borough Councils and Transport for London) to report to the Mayor of London on action taken in respect of any deficit or surplus in their On-Street Parking Account for each financial year.

We submit a printed and circulated report thereon, which we **recommend** be noted and submitted to the Mayor of London.

New Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 – Delegated Powers

This new Act replaces the various measures previously available to tackle anti-social behaviour provided by the Anti-social Behaviour Act 2003 with a new set of powers, intended to provide a simpler and more streamlined framework. It introduces new mechanisms with the aim of giving victims and local communities a greater say in the treatment of anti-social behaviour and low-level crime, and it strengthens the ability of landlords to terminate tenancies on grounds relating to anti-social behaviour.

In adopting the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, it will be necessary to amend the City's Scheme of Delegations and will also require close and coordinated working with partner organisations.

The various changes are outlined within a separately printed and circulated report which is submitted for your perusal, and we **recommend** that you approve the recommendations set out therein.

15 **THE CITY BRIDGE TRUST COMMITTEE****(Jeremy Paul Mayhew)**

27 November 2014

Buttle UK Partnership

A grant of £470,000 was approved by your City Bridge Trust Committee in November 2013 to enable Buttle UK to establish a hardship fund – known as the Anchor Project – for 18 months, to help families re-build their lives following domestic violence, supporting them to resettle and live independently. The original proposal was for a three-year programme of work; however, as this was a new way of working for the Trust, funds were committed for 18 months initially to enable the referral network to become established and to gauge likely demand. This paper proposes that a grant of £634,000 be approved to continue the Project over a further 18 months, providing three years' support in total.

A printed and circulated report is now submitted for your consideration and we commend its **recommendations** to you.

Road safety

Alderman Ian Luder asked a question of the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee concerning the steps the City of London Corporation was taking to improve road safety at Ludgate Circus junction. Adoption of the Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy

To be presented on Thursday, 15th January 2015

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the
City of London in Common Council assembled.*

SUMMARY

1. This report seeks approval for the adoption of the revised Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy and informs about the recently undertaken public consultation and subsequent revisions to the Strategy.
2. The Strategy will -
 - a) establish a fully accessible walkway to provide a direct route along the riverside with enhanced connections to the rest of the City;
 - b) create new green spaces and produce redesigns of existing green spaces for people to stop and enjoy the Thames, as well as enhance the biodiversity of the City riverside and mitigate flood risk; and
 - c) improve the cohesion and vibrancy of the riverside by encouraging new developments to provide a spacious, accessible and better connected Riverside Walk with appropriate active frontages.
3. The Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy sets out a delivery plan which identifies projects arising from the Strategy, prioritises them and indicates the likely funding strategy for delivery.

A copy of the revised Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy has been made available in the Members' Reading Room. Copies are also available upon request from the Town Clerk's Office.

RECOMMENDATION

4. That the revised Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy be adopted.

MAIN REPORT

Background

1. The original enhancement strategy was adopted in June 2005 with 16 projects having been implemented to date; the improvements made so far have transformed some parts of the Riverside Walk making them a more comfortable and pleasant space to use.
2. The strategy has been reviewed and updated over the last year within the context of new developments and improvements. The strategy identifies current issues and pressures for change related to accessibility, movement, public space and new developments. The strategy also sets out a framework for addressing these issues, together with the latest policies and best practice guidance and proposes change to areas of both public and private land.
3. The public consultation exercise was undertaken from May to July 2014 and targeted relevant stakeholder groups using a variety of methods. The submissions have been collated and are available in the Members' Reading Room. The main comments received related to the following -
 - Accessibility and the need for a direct route along the Riverside Walk
 - Pedestrian safety regarding joggers and cyclists using the walkway
 - The desire for open and green spaces with an appropriate balance of vibrant and quiet areas
 - An appreciation of the historic character in relation to views of the river
4. All the responses have been assessed and changes have been made to the strategy to take into consideration the users' needs for the area.
5. The Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy includes a Delivery Plan which identifies projects arising from the Strategy, prioritises them into High, Medium and Low categories and indicates the funding strategy for delivery.
6. It is anticipated that the majority, if not all, of the funding for improvement projects arising from the Strategy will be externally provided via Section 106, Section 278 and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions from developments within the area. Funding bids will also be made to external bodies such as Transport for London.

Conclusion

7. The Riverside Walk Enhancement Strategy has been revised in response to the public consultation feedback to ensure the document reflects the needs of the City community. It sets out a Delivery Plan which identifies the projects arising from the strategy, prioritises them and indicates the funding strategy for delivery. Your committee recommends the adoption of the Enhancement Strategy.

City of London Local Plan: Adoption

SUMMARY

1. This report seeks approval for the adoption of the Local Plan.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Common Council adopt by resolution the City of London Local Plan subject to the modifications.

MAIN REPORT

1. The City of London Local Plan was published for its last stage of public consultation between December 2013 and February 2014. The inspector has now issued his report on the examination of the plan and the final step is to adopt the Local Plan.
2. The preparation of the Local Plan has involved several stages of public consultation since 2011. The final stage ended on 28 February 2014 which was slightly later than originally planned in order that refinements could be made to four of the policies for hotels and housing to improve their consistency with the policy for the protection of offices.
3. Prior to and during the examination a list of proposed modifications to the Plan was prepared to resolve objections, where possible. These modifications are mainly for clarification and do not materially affect the policies of the Plan. The inspector stated that he is content for these modifications to be incorporated in the Plan and did not recommend any further modifications
4. Upon its adoption the Local Plan will supersede both the Core Strategy and the Unitary Development Plan.

5. The Local Plan has been prepared with regard to all the City's other plans and strategies, including the Corporate Plan and the City Together Strategy. The Local Plan is considered to be fully in alignment with these strategies.

Conclusion

6. Your Committee recommends the Local Plan be adopted by resolution, subject to the modifications which are available in the Members' reading room or upon request from the Town Clerk's Office.

Report – Planning and Transportation Committee Surplus Arising for On-Street Parking 2013/14 and Utilisation of Accrued Surplus

To be presented on Thursday, 15 January 2015

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the

SUMMARY

1. The City of London, in common with other London authorities, is required to report to the Mayor for London on action taken in respect of any deficit or surplus in its On-Street Parking Account for a particular financial year.
2. The purpose of this report is to inform Members that:
 - the surplus arising from on-street parking activities in 2013/14 was £5.290m;
 - a total of £4.137m, was applied in 2013/14 to fund approved projects; and
 - the surplus remaining on the On-Street Parking Reserve at 31st March 2014 was £15.653m, which is wholly allocated towards the funding of various highway improvements and other projects over the medium term.

RECOMMENDATION

That Members note the contents of the report and approve its submission to the Mayor of London.

MAIN REPORT

Background

1. Section 55(3A) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended), requires the City of London and other London authorities (i.e. other London Borough Councils and Transport for London), to report to the Mayor for London on action taken in respect of any deficit or surplus in their On-Street Parking Account for a particular financial year.

2. Legislation provides that any surplus not applied in the financial year may be carried forward. If it is not to be carried forward, it may be applied by the City for one or more of the following purposes:
- a) making good to the City Fund any deficit charged to that Fund in the 4 years immediately preceding the financial year in question;
 - b) meeting all or any part of the cost of the provision and maintenance by the City of off-street parking accommodation whether in the open or under cover;
 - c) the making to other local authorities, or to other persons, of contributions towards the cost of the provision and maintenance by them, in the area of the local authority or elsewhere, of off-street parking accommodation whether in the open or under cover;
 - d) if it appears to the City that the provision in the City of further off-street parking accommodation is for the time being unnecessary or undesirable, for the following purposes, namely:
 - (i) meeting costs incurred, whether by the City or by some other person, in the provision or operation of, or of facilities for, public passenger transport services;
 - (ii) the purposes of a highway or road improvement project in the City;
 - (iii) meeting the costs incurred by the City in respect of the maintenance of roads at the public expense; and
 - (iv) for an “environmental improvement” in the City.
 - e) meeting all or any part of the cost of the doing by the City in its area of anything which facilitates the implementation of the Mayor’s Transport Strategy, being specified in that strategy as a purpose for which a surplus can be applied; and
 - f) making contributions to other authorities, i.e. the other London Borough Councils and Transport for London, towards the cost of their doing things upon which the City in its area could incur expenditure upon under (a)-(e) above.

5. The surplus on the On-Street Parking Reserve brought forward from 2012/13 was £14.500m. After expenditure of £4.137m funded in 2013/14, a balance of £1.153k was carried forward to future years to give a closing balance at 31st March 2014 of £15.653m.
6. Currently total expenditure of some £34.4m is planned over the medium term up to 31st March 2018, by which time it is anticipated that the existing surplus plus those estimated for future years will be fully utilised. This total includes expenditures of £13.7m, £11.6m, £4.6m and £4.5m planned from 2014/15 until 2017/18 respectively, which are anticipated to reduce significantly the surpluses arising in those years. The total programme covers a number of major schemes including funding towards the Barbican Podium Waterproofing and Highwalks, Aldgate Gyratory Scheme, repairs to Farringdon Street Bridge and Snow Hill Bridge, Barbican Area Strategy, Holborn Circus Area Enhancement, Holborn Viaduct, Minorities car park building monitoring work and various street scene projects (e.g. around Milton Court) as well as ongoing funding of highway resurfacing and road maintenance projects. The progression of each individual scheme is, of course, subject to the City's normal evaluation criteria and Standing Orders.

Conclusion

7. So that we can meet our requirements under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended), we ask that the Court of Common Council notes the contents of this report, which would then be submitted to the Mayor of London.

Report – Port Health and Environmental Services Committee

New Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 – Delegated Powers

To be presented on Thursday, 15th January 2015

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the
City of London in Common Council assembled.*

SUMMARY

1. This Act replaced the nineteen measures previously available to tackle antisocial behaviour within the Anti-social Behaviour Act 2003 with a new set of six powers, outlined in Appendix 1, intended to provide a simpler and more streamlined framework. It introduces new mechanisms with the aim of giving victims and local communities a greater say in the treatment of anti-social behaviour and low-level crime, and it strengthens the ability of landlords to terminate tenancies on grounds relating to anti-social behaviour.
2. A copy of the Act is available in the Members' Reading Room or upon request from the Town Clerk's Department.

RECOMMENDATIONS

3. That the Court of Common Council delegate authority, for the certain areas of responsibility relating to the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, to the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee and the Community and Children's Services Committee, with responsibility for Housing Services, and that the Scheme of Delegation be amended accordingly to allow Officers to institute proceedings and enforcement remedies in relation to part 1-6 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.

Civil Injunctions to Prevent Nuisance and Annoyance (IPNA)

4. That the Director of Built Environment, Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and Director of Community and Children Services or their authorised Deputy be given delegated authority to seek an Injunction to Prevent Nuisance and Annoyance in accordance with Part 1 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.

Closure Power

5. That the Director of the Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and the Director of Community and Children Services, or their authorised Deputy, be granted delegated authority to apply for Closure Orders and to authorise their officers to issue Closure Notices and in accordance with Part 3 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.

Community Protection Notice (CPN)

6. That the Director of Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and the Director of Community and Children Services be given delegated authority to authorise officers to serve Community Protection Notices and, Fixed Penalty Notices in the event of a breach, in accordance with Part 4 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014;
7. That approval be granted to enable the Director of Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and the Director of Community and Children Services to be able to designate Registered Social Landlords to issue Community Protection Notices, in accordance with Part 4 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014; and
8. That approval also be granted to the Director of Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and the Director of Community and Children Services to be able to authorise Police Community Support Officers and other Police staff to serve Community Protection Notices and Fixed Penalty Notices, in accordance with Part 4 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.

Criminal Behaviour Orders

9. That the Director of Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection and the Director of Community and Children Services or their authorised Deputy be granted delegated authority to seek Criminal Behaviour Orders, in accordance with Part 2 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.
10. It is also recommended that:-
 - The Community Safety Team, within the Town Clerks Department be the 'Single Point of contact for the Community Trigger as required under the Act and the Safer City Partnership oversee/scrutinise any community triggers and appeals; and
 - The Police Committee, in partnership with the City Of London Police, be responsible for the production of a Community Remedies document.

MAIN REPORT

1. The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 received Royal Assent on 13 March 2014 and came into effect on the 20th October 2014 (some parts being delayed until January 2015). The Act proposed a number of reforms to existing legislation and to put the victim at the heart of the response to anti-social behaviour by providing professionals and organisations with greater flexibility to deal with any given situation.
2. The reforms set out in Parts 1-6 of the Act are intended to ensure that professionals have effective powers that are quick, practical and easy to use to provide better protection to victims and communities and act as a deterrent to perpetrators. Nineteen existing powers are replaced with six simpler and more flexible ones.
3. In setting out the new powers, the City of London Corporation will always to seek restorative solutions to issues and only use these powers as a last resort. This will mean that appropriate Service Units across the City Corporation and partners working with the people and communities affected by these powers must be engaged and involved in the decision making.
4. The Scheme of Delegated Powers would be amended to allow the Director of the Built Environment, the Director of Markets and Consumer Protection, and the Director of Community and Children's Services to institute proceedings and enforcement remedies in relation to Parts 1-6 of the Act. 5. The new powers are summarised below:

Civil Injunctions to Prevent Nuisance and Annoyance (IPNA)

6. The IPNA is a civil power which can be applied for to deal with anti-social behaviour. It replaces six orders formerly available to local authorities/ the City and Police. An injunction can offer fast and effective protection for victims and communities and set a clear standard of behaviour for perpetrators, stopping the person's behaviour from escalating.

Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs)

7. PSPOs may be made in relation to activities carried out (or likely to be carried out) in a public place, which are reasonably considered to have a detrimental effect, persistent or continuing in nature, on the quality of life in the locality. The PSPO must be issued after consultation with the Police and community representatives as taken place and may restrict the activity through prohibition or the imposition of requirements, although these restrictions may not go beyond what is reasonable in relation to the detrimental effect sought to be tackled.
8. The long-standing position under the City of London Corporation's Constitution and Terms of Reference is that the promotion of byelaws is authorised by the Court of Common Council. Given that PSPO's are intended to be of a similar nature, and may concern issues which fall under the remit of several committees it is not currently proposed that Court of Common Council delegate authority to make PSPO's. However, this can be kept under review.

Closure Power

9. Closure Power allows the Police or the City of London Corporation to issue a Closure Notice (CN) and a Closure Order (CO). A CN can close premises for up to 48 hours but cannot stop the owner or those who live there accessing the premises. A CO can close premises for up to 6 months and can restrict all access.
10. Breaching a Closure Order will be a criminal offence that can result in 6 months imprisonment. Breaching a Closure Notice can carry a custodial sentence of up to 3 months and both carry an unlimited fine for residential and non-residential premises.

Community Protection Notice (CPN)

11. A CPN is intended to deal with particular, on-going problems or nuisances which negatively affect the community's quality of life by targeting those responsible. These include graffiti, rubbish and noise.
12. Under the procedure outlined in the Guidance which accompanies the Act, a written warning has to be served followed by the CPN then at a later stage a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) may be issued for non-compliance. In addition, the CPN can be appealed within 21 days of service. All these processes need to be recorded and evidenced and the City and its partners will need to ensure that there is an effective monitoring arrangement in place because of the appeal process and potential for prosecution. Some form of 'gate keeping' arrangement may be required in order to avoid duplicate actions by partner organisations. Coordination may fall to the responsibility of the Community Safety Team within the Town Clerks department who have the remit of the Safer City Partnership.

Criminal Behaviour Orders

13. Criminal Behaviour Orders may be issued following a conviction by the Criminal Courts to rehabilitate offenders by tackling the underlying cause of anti-social behaviour, such as misuse of drugs and alcohol etc. They are normally sought by the Crown Prosecution Service but a Local Authority can also apply for these in cases of serious and persistent anti-social behaviour.

Community Trigger

14. If three complaints about anti-social behaviour are received within a 6 month period, upon request, the City is obliged to formally review the actions taken/planned with relevant Partners (Police, Housing Associations etc.) and inform the victim of the outcome. This part of the law could impact on many Departments across the City of London Corporation and any partners. For example, the response to noise complaints, irresponsible dog owners, planning enforcement etc. could all come under scrutiny.
15. If a 'Trigger' request is made, a formal review would have to be held and the case scrutinised. A multi-agency panel would ultimately review the case and make recommendations for action, for the City, the Community Safety Team within the Town Clerks Department will act as the single point of contact for the Community Trigger where they will coordinate any processes with other departments.

Community Remedy

16. This new power allows the Police to choose an alternative punitive/rehabilitation action against offenders, other than proceeding through the courts. The victim and perpetrator of the crime would be involved in deciding the reparation action required.
17. The Police Committee and Community Safety Partnership in partnership with the City Of London Police will produce a Community Remedies document. This will contain a list of:
 - Restorative actions – achieving restitution/reparation for the victim
 - Punitive actions – reflecting the effect on the victim or the community
 - Rehabilitative actions – addressing the causes of the behaviour
 - All or any part of the above in combination
18. The use of the Community Remedy will be restricted to Police Officers, PCSOs (if authorised by the Police Commissioner) and Investigating Officers (who are persons employed by a police force or by the Office of the Police Crime Commissioner) who are authorised to offer and give conditional cautions or youth conditional cautions.

Conclusion

19. The provisions of the 2014 Act will give the City of London Corporation and its partner organisations a more effective means of tackling anti-social behaviour in certain areas if/ where it is prevalent. However there will be a need for an effectively coordinated monitoring process to be established with partner bodies and the requirement for a single point of contact within the City Corporation. It will be essential that all officers involved in these new processes are effectively trained and that the additional workload is monitored in the first year of operation.

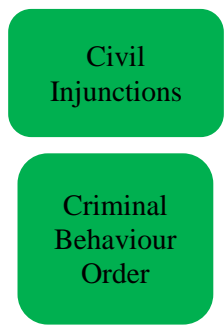
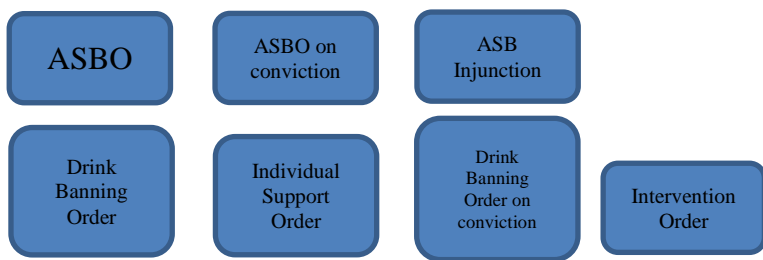
Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014

Changes in powers – 19 down to 6

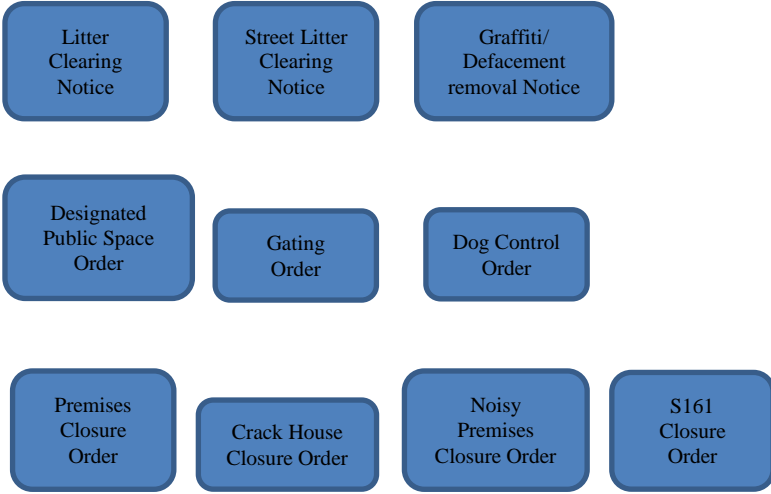

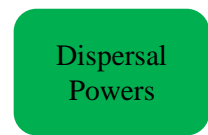

Report – The City Bridge Trust Committee Partnership with Buttle UK

To be presented on Thursday, 15th January 2015

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the
City of London in Common Council assembled.*

SUMMARY

1. In November 2013, your City Bridge Trust Committee approved a grant of £470,000 over 18 months to enable Buttle UK to establish a hardship fund - known as the Anchor Project - for families, to help them re-build their lives following domestic violence, supporting them to resettle and live independently. This paper now proposes that the Court of Common Council approves a grant of £634,000 to continue the Project over a further 18 months, providing three years' support in total.

MAIN REPORT

Background

1. Following the City Bridge Trust's 2012/13 Quinquennial Review, a number of partnership programmes were approved, one of which was with Buttle UK. In November 2013, your City Bridge Trust Committee approved a grant of £470,000 over 18 months to enable Buttle UK to establish a hardship fund - the Anchor Project - for families to help them re-build their lives following domestic violence.
2. The original proposal was for a three-year programme of work; however, as this was a new way of working for the Trust, funds were committed for 18 months initially to enable the referral network to become established and to gauge likely demand. The City Bridge Trust Committee now proposes that the Court of Common Council approves a grant of £634,000 to continue the Project over a further 18 months, providing three years' support in total.

Current Position

3. Buttle UK has designed the Anchor Project to offer a holistic package of support for families affected by domestic violence, combining practical and emotional support, provided by its network of referral agencies, and administering cash grants of up to £2,000. A more child-centred approach is being employed by referral agencies and,

in order to try and reinforce this, Buttle UK has begun discussions with The Women's Aid National Training Centre to investigate the possibility of raising awareness more widely through a training programme. Buttle UK is also in the process of inviting 15 – 20 individuals to form an advisory group; the Deputy Chief Grants Officer will attend this Group; reporting back to your City Bridge Trust Committee.

4. An independent evaluator has been appointed to evaluate the initiative over its three-year duration. The evaluation will measure the outcomes for participating children and consider the relationship between these outcomes and the support they have received via the project. It will focus particularly on the role of financial/material support combined with multi-agency support. It is proposed that, once the evaluation has been completed at the end of the three years, Buttle UK and City Bridge Trust hold a joint conference to share the evaluation findings, with the expectation that a new model of support for children and their families affected by domestic abuse can be presented.
5. Over the coming months, Buttle UK aims to increase the rate of grant-making in order to award grants to at least 350 families (and, therefore, achieve an estimated reach of over 600 children); complete the external evaluation to understand and illustrate the impact of Anchor grants on children's social, emotional and behavioural well-being; and to work on a programme of dissemination activities to share what has been learned, all with the aim of changing long-term practice around how the needs of children in these circumstances are assessed and how they are met; this would be in conjunction with the Trust.

Proposal

6. That the Court of Common Council approves a grant of £634,000 over 18 months to continue the Anchor Project, which supports families in London who have experienced domestic violence to resettle and live independently.

Financial Implications

7. The total cost of this project over three years is £1,086,375. Your Committee is recommending that 50% of the funding requirement be approved for Year 2 (£210,000), plus the total amount required for Year 3 (£424,000), making a total of £634,000.

Conclusion

8. The Anchor Project is complementing the City Bridge Trust's 'Making London Safer' programme, by providing the support needed for families, escaping domestic violence, to re-settle and live independently. The Deputy Chief Grants Officer will attend the Advisory Group, and it is proposed that a progress report on the Anchor Project is brought to your City Bridge Trust Committee in 6 months' time.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.
