1. APOLOGIES

Apologies were received from John Scott, Jeremy Simons, Susan Kirby, Harriet Cullen and Diana Gore.

2. MEMBERS' DECLARATIONS UNDER THE CODE OF CONDUCT IN RESPECT OF ITEMS ON THE AGENDA

3. MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on the 16th September 2014 were approved subject to David Wight being added in attendance.

4. KEATS HOUSE PROGRESS REPORT

The Committee received a report of the Principal Curator, Heritage and Libraries summarising achievements and developments at Keats House during the six months since the last Consultative Committee meeting.

The Principal Curator at Keats House advised that the visitor figures were generally positive and nearly identical to the previous year although there had been a dip during October to December which could not be explained. It was hoped that the House refurbishment accompanied with the PR campaign would increase visitor numbers. Visitor figures for January were incomplete at the time the report was published.

The Principal Curator was currently planning for the Keats Festival which would take place from the 29th May to the 7 June 2015. She had been advised by the Public Relations team to align the House refurbishment launch with the Keats Festival to increase interest and promote the House. Additionally, Keats House

were charging for more events, including a musical concert, as suggested in a previous meeting. A few tickets had been sold for the concert and Members would be updated on its success at the next meeting. A Member from Keats Community Library offered to promote the House to Primary School's within the area.

The Principal Curator informed Members that the cost of venue hire had been increased to better reflect costs incurred during the hire. The increase did not have a detrimental effect on the hiring of Keats House as it had been used for a number of wakes, as well as music lessons and other private events.

A Member reiterated comments from previous meetings regarding fundraising initiatives such as selling plants and erecting a donation box in the garden. It was agreed that these were not priorities for fundraising for Keats House.

Keats House Poet in Residence

The Principal Curator suggested approaching Michael Rosen as Keats House Poet in Residence. He was a well-known children's poet and would generate good publicity for the House. The Committee agreed that Michael Rosen should be approached.

Maintenance Issues in Keats Library

The Committee were informed that there were ongoing maintenance in Keats Library issues such as water leakage from the roof and broken light bulbs. These issues had been raised through the relevant procedure and were still waiting to be resolved. The Chairman informed the Committee that she would follow up the issue with the Assistant Director of Corporate Property and Facilities Management.

Summary

This report summarises achievements and developments at Keats House since the last Consultative Committee meeting in February 2015

Recommendation(s)

Main Report

Interpretation project

- A major highlight of this year has been the completion of a project to reinterpret Keats House and improve the visitor experience, funded by Arts Council England.
- More original items from the museum collection are on display and new interpretation has been introduced to bring the house to life through text, audio, film and interactive exhibits.
- The new displays were launched by Hampstead resident and Keats enthusiast, Nancy Dell'Olio in May 2015, gaining significant press and media coverage. Evaluation and visitor tracking are still ongoing. However anecdotal feedback from visitors has been excellent.

Visitor figures

- Total visitor numbers including the garden for January July 2015 were 19,803 compared with 16,223 for the same period in 2014, an increase of 22%. Some of this increase is likely due to an improvement in the method for counting garden visitors, along with improved signage indicating that the garden is open to the public.
- Total visitor numbers excluding the garden in January July 2015 were 12,258 compared with 12,124 for the same period in 2014, an increase of 1%.
- General visitors to the house/museum in January July 2015 were 6,600 compared with 6,858 for the same period in 2014, a decrease of 3.8%. This was offset by more people coming for education and private events.
- Keats House withdrew from the National Trust Partnership scheme in January 2015. It was anticipated that this would lead to a reduction in the number of general visitors, but it was hoped that income from admissions would increase. The Principal Curator intends to monitor this situation closely to be able to make an informed decision as to whether to return to the NT scheme in January 2017.
- The Principal Curator is in correspondence with the London Pass and hopes to negotiate membership of the scheme, which will target a new tourist audience. Other members include Tower Bridge, Charles Dickens Museum, Handel House Museum and Benjamin Franklin House.
- As requested by the Committee, visitor figures for other historic and literary houses are presented below. These have been obtained through the Literary Houses Group and London Shh.

Events

- The events programme continues to attract a large and diverse audience. From January July 2015 over 2500 people attended 62 events.
- Highlights have included a reading by Pullitzer Prize-winning poet Paul Muldoon, a new series of Indian poetry events in partnership with Vatayan: Poetry on South Bank, and a number of events held in partnership with Poet in the City, including a popular Beat Poets film night.
- The Keats Foundation is generously supporting another year of the Keats House Poets programme, which continues to attract a diverse audience of adults and young people.

Poet in residence

Michael Rosen started as poet in residence in June 2015. His events so far
have been popular, booking up quickly. He is planning to create new work
inspired by the residency and hopes to work with a jazz group from the
Guildhall School of Music and Drama on a poetry and jazz cycle for the 2016
Keats festival. He is also running family events and a series of workshops for
school teachers.

Staff changes

- Camille Poole has joined the team as a part time Information Officer, mainly acting as a weekend duty manager.
- Frankie Kubicki has been promoted to Interpretation Officer whilst Sofie Davis is on maternity leave.

Learning

 School figures continue to increase. For January to July 1349 school students/teachers visited, compared with 1016 last year, an increase of 33%.
 It should be noted that additional funding from the Clore Foundation enabled the part-time Education Officer to work some extra hours during the early part of 2015.

Shop

- The shop performance continues to improve. From January- July 2015 it has taken £12,833 compared with £11,618 for the same period last year.
- New branded merchandise featuring Keats quotes and icons has been designed and produced. New lines include mugs, notebooks, notecards, postcards and a new bag were introduced into the shop in May. This appears to be having a positive effect on sales: souvenir sales for May to July 2015 were £5467 compared with £3413 the previous year.

Venue hire

- Over the past year the team has focused more attention on promoting and facilitating venue hire and this is paying off. During the financial year 2014-15 the house raised £11,900 from private hire.
- The lack of a premises licence and a catering service continue to be obstacles to fully developing the private hire business.

Grants

 Keats House has been awarded a grant of £500 by Share London to provide performance training to volunteer tour guides and poetry ambassadors.

Fundraising

 Our fundraising programme with local residents has earned £8,900 to date, thanks to the intense dedication of the team. We now have 10 Patrons, 7 Champions and 16 Supporters.

Building maintenance

- Major repairs to the Library roof were completed in August 2015.
- Repairs to the conservatory have been approved by the City Surveyor's team and are booked for October 2015.
