Bills

European Union (Withdrawal) Bill

The Bill will repeal the European Communities Act 1972, bringing to an end the status of EU law within the British legal system, and will adopt the provisions of existing EU law into UK law. It provides a framework for making necessary modifications to the adopted EU law as a consequence of the UK's withdrawal, to be done through a large volume of subsequent regulations.

Telecommunications Infrastructure (Relief from Non-Domestic Rates) Bill

The Bill will grant full relief from business rates for new fibre communications infrastructure in relation to a five-year period beginning in April 2017.

Statutory Instruments Date in force

The School Teachers' Pay and Conditions Order 2017, S.I. No. 811 The Order gives effect to revised terms and conditions (including remuneration levels) for teachers in maintained schools for the new academic year. Changes include a 2% uplift to the main pay range.

1 September 2017

The Co-ordination of Regulatory Enforcement Regulations 2017, S.I. No. 835

1 October 2017

The Regulations set out details of the revised 'primary authority' scheme, whereby a single local authority (including the Common Council acting in that capacity) can take the lead on advising a business about regulatory compliance, with its advice then taken in to account by other relevant local authorities. For instance, the Regulations specify the role of national regulators in supporting primary authorities, and set out the process to be followed when there is a dispute about proposed enforcement action.

The Caseins and Caseinates (England) Regulations 2017, S.I. No. 848 The Regulations implement revised EU rules governing the use of caseins and caseinates—forms of milk protein—in food. They will be enforced by food authorities, including the Common Council acting in that capacity.

Whereupon the Lord Mayor declared Deputy Tom Hoffman to be appointed to Age UK London.

11. Questions City Workforce

Deputy Brian Mooney asked a question of the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee concerning the composition of the City workforce, with particular reference to the new City of London Jobs leaflet. This was one of a new range of products being produced to provide succinct and accessible information on financial and professional services and other priority areas for the City Corporation. Responding, the Chairman confirmed that none of the employees currently based in the City had been born in Antarctica and advised that the wording on the leaflet would be altered to remove any scope for future confusion.

In response to a supplementary question from Deputy Mooney, the Chairman updated Members on the work the City Corporation was engaged in to inform the Brexit negotiations, as well as to promote the City around the world. She also outlined significant work with partners that was underway, to seek to ensure that the City's pre-eminence as a financial and professional services hub was maintained post-Brexit, with the size its workforce preserved or increased in years to come.

Diversity

Prem Goyal asked a question of the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee regarding the City Corporation's approach to diversity. In reply, the Chairman set out the robust internal policies and procedures in place in support of the City Corporation's commitment to equality and inclusion, as well as referencing the various staff networks and the significant efforts to increase the diversity of the Court through the recent City-wide elections. She also detailed the external activities the City Corporation was engaged in to spread its values and best practice across other City businesses and employers, such as the Power of Diversity breakfast series, utilising its 'soft power' to influence others positively.

The Sheriffs' Breakfast

Prem Goyal asked a question of the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee concerning the funding of, and guest list for, the Sheriffs' Breakfast. Replying, the Chairman noted that funding from City Cash was used for a wide range of events each year with a variety of purposes, from furthering specific UK and City business priorities to events with a wider social and cultural purpose. On each occasion, the precise composition of the guest list would depend on the nature and purpose of the event and, in the case of the Sheriffs' Breakfast, the guest list was likely to be very different from, for example, an event aimed at promoting a particular business sector, or fostering relations with a particular community or country.

Although records were not kept of the ethnicity and socio-economic status of guests at past events, the City Corporation aimed to provide events during the course of a year which would attract a wide and diverse range of guests and securing a suitable balance on the composition of guests at City hosted events to reflect the changing nature of the City, is something that the Corporation was pursuing proactively.

In response to a supplementary question from Caroline Addy, the Chairman reiterated the City Corporation's commitments in respect of diversity and confirmed that, should any organisation with which it was connected be acting in a manner contrary to these values, then the relationship with such associations would be examined and appropriate action taken.

In reply to a further supplementary question from Prem Goyal concerning a specific experience with an external organisation, the Chairman explained that she was not aware of the details of this case and was therefore not able to speak on this matter at this time.

Aldermanic Elections

Prem Goyal asked a question of the Chairman of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen relative to steps taken to increase the diversity of candidates standing in Aldermanic elections. Responding, the Chairman commended the City Corporation's efforts in respect of the recent City-wide elections, which proved very successful and had provided a number of points of learning which could be drawn on for future Aldermanic elections. He also observed that diversity had been a central theme in all its forms for the past four Lord Mayors and was pleased to note a recent increase in the diversity of candidates at elections.

In response to a supplementary question from Mr Goyal concerning expenses associated with being an Alderman, the Chairman clarified that there was no formal or mandatory cash contribution required to serve as an Alderman. However, there were a number of expenses that Aldermen had, by convention, borne themselves, such as purchasing their own robes and ceremonial clothing, often from retiring Aldermen. He confirmed that all such arrangements were freely explained to serious candidates who enquired before standing for election.

Bank Junction

James Tumbridge asked a question of the Deputy Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee concerning the pedestrianisaton of Bank Junction, following reference made at a recent committee meeting to the effect that officers were working towards this outcome as a long-term aim.

The Deputy Chairman prefaced his reply by informing the Court that the Chairman was currently engaged elsewhere on City Corporation business, hence his providing the response on this occasion. He then explained that officers were currently exploring four different options for the long-term future of Bank Junction, in accordance with the instructions of the relevant committees. One of these options was the full pedestrianisation of the Junction; however, in working up the agreed options, officers were very clear that none of them might ultimately prove technically viable or be agreed by Members. He also reminded Members that the

experimental precursor scheme was still ongoing, the outcomes of which would help to inform any option finalised for Member consideration.

Responding to a supplementary question from Mr Tumbridge, the Deputy Chairman undertook to remind officers of the distinction between developing options for Members' consideration and acting to implement these options. He also made clear to officers and Members that any decision on the long-term future of the Junction would be a matter for the appropriate committees and, ultimately, the Court of Common Council to determine.

Project Servator

Deputy Edward Lord asked a question of the Chairman of the Police Committee seeking clarification about Project Servator and a recent operation near the Millennium Bridge. The Chairman, responding, provided a brief outline of the nature of Project Servator and detailed the powers under which officers were stopping people, as well as the way in which those stopped were identified. He confirmed that those who were stopped were told of their rights and that the stops were fully compliant with Code A of the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984.

Applications for the Use of Guildhall

The arrangements for approving applications for the use of Guildhall had last been considered by the Court of Common Council on 21 June 2001. At that time, the Court had agreed to delegate the approval of such applications to the then City Lands and Bridge House Estates Committee. This Committee was no longer in existence and responsibility for the approval of applications had since transferred to the Policy and Resources Committee, via its Hospitality Working Party.

Notwithstanding this, it had been customary to submit the details of applications for the use of Guildhall to the Court for information. However, in the interests of efficiency, the Policy and Resources Committee and its Hospitality Working Party now considered the practice of sending details of those applications for the use of Guildhall which were not felt to be significant should be discontinued. This was supported on the basis that no such application had been the subject of any questioning in at least the past ten years.

It was therefore recommended that, going forward, details of only the more significant applications for the use of Guildhall be reported to the Court.

Resolved – That only details of the more significant applications for the use of Guildhall be reported to the Court henceforth.

(A) City of London Police: Annual Report 2016/17

The Annual Report, setting out the achievements and performance of the City of London Police over the past financial year, was submitted to the Court for information.

The Chairman introduced the item to the Court and provided a comprehensive overview of the City Police's achievements over the year, as well as a summary of the constructive challenge provided by the Police Committee across the period.

(B) Appointment of Independent External Member to the Police Committee

The constitution of the Police Committee allows for the recruitment of two external individuals (i.e. not Members of the Common Council) onto the Committee, through an open process. In May 2017, the second and final term of one of these external Members of the Committee, Helen Marshall, had expired. As a result, two rounds of recruitment were undertaken in order fill this vacancy, in accordance with the Committee's membership scheme (as specified in its Terms of Reference).

A selection panel was established and the post openly advertised. All applications were considered and six candidates who met the eligibility criteria were interviewed on 8 August 2017. Following deliberations, the panel was pleased to recommend one candidate for appointment to the position and the Court's approval was now sought to the appointment of the successful candidate, Mr Andrew Lentin, as an external Member of the Police Committee for a four-year term commencing 21 September 2017.

Resolved – That approval be given to the appointment of Mr Andrew Lentin to the Police Committee for a four-year term, commencing on 21 September 2017.

Report – Policy and Resources Committee Overseas Engagement

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2017

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The Policy and Resources Committee is responsible for any policy decisions on the City of London Corporation's overseas engagement activities. A review of the City Corporation's international engagement has recently been undertaken which identified the strategic priorities for influencing policy/regulation and supporting trade/investment. These priorities have now been reflected in the draft travel schedule for the Chairman of Policy and Resources and Lord Mayor for 2017/18 (attached as an Appendix). Engagement is now more strategic, joined-up and complementary. The Policy Chairman and Senior Alderman Below The Chair (SABTAC) will present it jointly to internal stakeholders, business and government.

RECOMMENDATION

Members are asked to note the report, and the attached draft travel schedule.

MAIN REPORT

Strategic Priorities

- 1. The Economic Development Office and Mansion House have been reviewing the City Corporation's international engagement on behalf of the Policy Committee, looking to identify priority countries and cities from the perspectives of both policy/regulation and export/investment. The underlying objective is to retain and enhance the prosperity and competitiveness of the City of London and the UK's financial and professional services industry. The challenges and opportunities of Brexit have sharpened this exercise. Alignment with the wider efforts of government and business has been a priority.
- 2. The results are not unexpected. Established partners such as the US, Western Europe, Japan and the Gulf remain important on all fronts. China and India are crucial future markets and regulatory stakeholders. The Commonwealth is growing in importance, both traditional partners such as Canada and Australia and new players in Africa and Asia. Overall there is a strong case for engagement with over 30 countries reflecting the City's global reach.

Complementary Programmes

3. In general the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee will lead on international engagement policy, regulation and key long-term relationships and the Lord Mayor will lead on export/investment. Because of the importance to the City of the regulatory dialogue with the US generally and with Europe over

Brexit, the Policy Chairman will usually lead on engagement in US and Europe. But the Lord Mayor will, on a case-by-case basis, undertake some US/Europe visits with an export-investment focus. Both the Policy Chairman and Lord Mayor will visit China and India because of their future importance and the wide agenda in these countries. The overall aim is for complementary programmes which cover the priority countries, avoid duplication, and build on the activity of officers - including the Special Adviser for Asia and the Special Representative to the EU – to deliver long-term engagement with these markets.

4. This approach has been fed into the Lord Mayor's MVAC process and the Policy Chairman's draft travel programme. The Policy Chairman and SABTAC have consulted closely on the attached schedule for 2017/18. The Continuum have also been involved, as this schedule is intended to be the basis for future programmes.

Communicating the New Approach

- 5. The Policy Chairman and SABTAC are keen to communicate this new approach to key stakeholders, to illustrate the Corporation's strategic ambitions, joined-up approach and alignment with wider UK activity. To that end the following activity is planned for the autumn:
 - Internal Stakeholders: papers to the Public Relations and Economic Development Sub-Committee, Policy and Resources Committee, the Court of Common Council and Court of Aldermen
 - Business: a joint Policy Chairman/SABTAC letter to key business leaders and trade bodies (post Mayoral election)
 - Government: joint Policy Chairman/SABTAC calls on Financial and Common Wealth Office and other Ministers, supported by joint letters (post Mayor election)

RECOMMENDATION

6. We **recommend** that the report be received.

Report – Hospitality Working Party of the Policy and Resources Committee

Applications for Hospitality

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2017

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

(i) Early Evening Reception to launch the Fields of Battle – Lands of Peace: Peace and Reconciliation exhibition

From 30 April to 30 May 2018, an outdoor photographic exhibition, *Fields of Battle - Lands of Peace: Peace and Reconciliation* will be displayed in the Guildhall Yard. The exhibition will recognise the support of over fifty nations that were involved in the Allied war effort, with photographs focusing on the battlefields of the First World War as they are today, together with archive pictures, maps and historical text. The Foreign and Commonwealth Office is assisting the exhibition.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception to launch the start of the exhibition. Guests attending the reception would include representatives from the countries featured in the exhibition, historians with an interest in the First World War, representatives from the City's Privileged Regiments, the Museum of London, the Imperial War Museum, London Metropolitan Archives, Parliamentarians, students from the City Academies and Schools, and Members with relevant interests.

It is therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception, with arrangements made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

The host element would be the Hospitality Working Party, the Culture Heritage & Libraries Committee, and Members with relevant interests.

(ii) Early Evening Reception in support of a First World War Commemorative Exhibition in Guildhall Yard

The Royal Parks and the Royal Parks Guild are holding a series of events to commemorate their involvement in the First World War, and to mark the contribution made by men and women who worked in British parks and gardens and who lost their lives in the conflict. One of the proposed projects is a commemorative installation, to be delivered in partnership with the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, which is to be located in Guildhall Yard from 3 to 13 April 2018.

The City Corporation has been involved in commemorating a number of First World War anniversaries and has a strong commitment to recognising the contribution made to our country by the Armed Forces. It is therefore proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception in support of this installation.

Guests at the reception would include representatives from the Livery Companies, the City's Privileged Regiments, the Museum of London, the Royal Horticultural Society, the Royal Parks, Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport, Parliamentarians, City staff who have served in the armed forces, students from the City Academies and Schools, and Members with relevant interests.

It is therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception, with arrangements made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

The host element would be the Hospitality Working Party, the Open Spaces & City Gardens Committee, and Members with relevant interests.

Report – Planning and Transportation Committee Tudor Street/New Bridge Street – Alternative Layout Update

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2017

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The City Corporation agreed to accept and support Transport for London's (TfL's) proposal for Cycle Super Highways (CSH) within the City at its Policy and Resources Committee meeting on the 19 February 2015. TfL later set out proposals in relation to the design detail of how the North/South CSH would impact on local streets, including the Tudor Street/New Bridge Street junction. These were agreed by the Streets and Walkways Sub-Committee on 22 February 2016, having first deferred the decision to facilitate further local consultation. Thereafter, TfL proceeded to implement their scheme with immediate effect.

In March 2016, the Streets and Walkways Sub-Committee decision was 'called-in' and was considered by the Court of Common Council at its meeting of 21 April 2016, when the Streets and Walkways Sub-Committee decision was overturned. Despite this, TfL proceeded to deliver their CSH scheme at Tudor Street through a Works Permit issued in late 2015 and an Experimental Order which the City Corporation was unable to prevent (as this Order related to construction and movement on New Bridge Street, for which TfL are the Highway Authority). The impact of this Experimental Order on Tudor Street was that vehicles were prevented entering from New Bridge Street. The pre-existing restriction, limiting Tudor Street egress to left turning vehicles only, was retained.

Officers were consequently instructed to work with TfL, the Temples and their transport consultant to establish if a more effective scheme could be developed.

At its meeting on 12 January 2017, the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee advised the Court of Common Council that TfL had agreed to work with the City Corporation to progress an alternative Tudor Street/New Bridge Street Junction layout and that a scheme had been agreed in principle by TfL which would improve egress by introducing the option of a right turn. The Court consequently approved this alternative layout, but noted that it would be subject to detailed design including safety assessments and traffic modelling. Unfortunately, it transpired that the approved layout proved to be undeliverable for TfL on safety grounds.

TfL were committed to developing an alternative layout that would deliver the same benefits as the layout agreed by the Court of Common Council. They have, therefore, been working closely with City Corporation officers and the consultant engaged by the Temples (Vectos) to establish a viable scheme. A number of different layouts have now been considered in some detail but it is TfL's view that only one of these appears to be acceptable. Other layouts have been discounted, as TfL consider they would result in increased road danger or excessive congestion. The preferred draft layout is shown in Appendix 1.

The Court's approval is now sought for officers to work with TfL to confirm whether this new alternative layout is viable through detailed design and modelling. However, Members should note that, if it is found to be so, then the cost would be in excess of £2.3M, for which funding has not currently been identified.

TfL advise that, subject to final design and modelling demonstrating that the new layout is viable, funding being identified, and the scheme being supported by consultation, then it could potentially be implemented from late 2018.

RECOMMENDATION

The Court of Common Council is **recommended** to:

- agree that officers should continue to work with TfL and representatives of the Temples to establish the viability of the new layout (see Appendix 1) through detailed design and traffic modelling; and
- instruct officers to investigate possible funding options for the scheme.

MAIN REPORT

Background

- In response to the number of cyclists killed or seriously injured on London's streets, the Mayor of London announced his intention to build a Cycle Super Highway (CSH) network, physically separating cyclists from other traffic. His proposals included an East/West and North/South CSH, both of which would travel through the City.
- 2. On 19 February 2015, the City Corporation's Policy and Resources Committee agreed to accept and support the Mayor's initiative.
- The North/South route was designed to run on the west side of New Bridge Street and consequently impacted on side roads, including Tudor Street, which it proposed to close to motor vehicles for both access and egress onto New Bridge Street.
- 4. At its meeting on 22 February 2016, the Streets and Walkways Sub-Committee agreed to make an Experimental Traffic Order to enable TfL's delivery of their proposals. In particular this included preventing access and egress from Tudor Street to New Bridge Street for all vehicles other than cyclists.
- 5. Immediately on receipt of the decision TfL began implementation of their scheme.

- 6. Pursuant to Standing Order No. 9, this decision was subsequently 'called-in' for further consideration by the Court of Common Council and, on 21 April, the Court decided to overturn the Sub-Committee's decision. Despite this, TfL proceeded with their CSH by moving from a permanent to an experimental Traffic Order, meaning that pre-implementation consultation was not necessary. Whilst they could not now completely close Tudor Street, they were able to prohibit vehicles on New Bridge Street turning into Tudor Street. This in turn facilitated the build of the CSH at the junction.
- 7. TfL were able to implement their Experimental Order as they, and not the City Corporation, are the Highway Authority for New Bridge Street. They had also already had a Works Permit issued to them in late 2015
- 8. There followed a meeting, chaired by the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee, between local ward Members, TfL, and local stakeholders, at which TfL undertook to investigate whether the Tudor Street/New Bridge Street junction could be improved in terms of safety and access/egress. This led to officers and TfL, along with traffic consultants, Vectos (engaged by the Temples), investigating a revised design.
- 9. At its meeting on 12 January 2017, the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee advised the Court of Common Council that TfL had agreed to work with the City Corporation to progress an alternative Tudor Street/New Bridge Street Junction layout and that a scheme had been agreed in principle by TfL which would improve egress by introducing the option of a right turn. The Court of Common Council consequently approved:
 - the alternative layout, with officers instructed to continue to work with TfL to progress this;
 - a total estimated cost of £195,000, of which £175,000 would be a contribution towards TfL's costs in delivering the alternative layout; and
 - the delivery of the mitigation measures (subject to the resolution of any objections arising from the statutory public consultation).
- 10. The Court of Common Council was advised that the alternative layout was subject to detailed design including safety assessments and traffic modelling. Ultimately the approved layout proved to be undeliverable for TfL on safety grounds.
- 11. Later that month it became apparent that this layout was not deliverable, as it introduced additional road danger. Officers, Vectos and TfL then engaged on further discussions to design a new layout that would still deliver the benefits of the layout approved by the Court. Some eight layouts were explored; however, all but one were considered unsuitable by TfL largely on the grounds of increased road danger.

Current Position

12. There is now only one layout (see Appendix 1) that TfL is prepared to develop and take forward to detailed design and traffic modelling. Vectos and City

Corporation officers have been involved in the early evaluation and, subject to TfL's final tests, consider that this new layout appears to be viable. The scheme includes:

- a. Signalising the Tudor Street/New Bridge Street junction to enable traffic to exit left and right out of Tudor Street;
- b. A new pedestrian crossing across Tudor Street, relocating the existing crossing on New Bridge Street by Bridewell Place further south;
- c. Closing Bridewell Place to motor vehicles at New Bridge Street but incorporating access and egress for pedals cyclists; and moving northbound access for motor vehicles into the area to the Tudor Street junction;
- d. Removing the bus stop currently located on New Bridge Street, south of Tudor Street and replacing it with two new stops, one located opposite Bridewell Place and the other, on the north side of Blackfriars Bridge;
- e. Additional waiting and loading restrictions in Tudor Street to ensure the junction does not get obstructed;
- f. Additional loading bay(s) along New Bridge Street;
- g. Re-instating the original parking bays and a relaxation of the waiting and loading restrictions in Bridewell Place.
- 13. To confirm scheme viability, TfL now must take the layout through their formal assessment processes including detailed design and modelling work. It is expected this should be completed and an answer known by early 2018.
- 14. TfL advise that this new layout will cost in the order of £2.3m. Funding has not yet been identified.
- 15. In the event that TfL consider this scheme viable, it should be noted that it would still have to be subject to a statutory consultation process before it could be finally approved.
- 16. Assuming the detailed design and modelling shows that the new scheme is viable, funding is identified, and the scheme is supported through the consultation processes, TfL have advised that it could potentially be implemented from late 2018.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

17. No safety audit has been carried out for this new layout. It is therefore not possible, at this stage, to predict whether it would contribute towards the City's road danger reduction targets.

Implications

18. Under section 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (RTRA), the City Corporation, as highways authority for the City's roads, must exercise its powers under the RTRA so as to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic including pedestrians, and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway. These powers must be exercised so far as practicable having regard to the following matters:-

- the desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises;
- the effect on the amenities of any locality affected including the regulation and restriction of heavy commercial traffic so as to preserve or improve amenity;
- the national air quality strategy;
- facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and securing the safety and convenience of their passengers;
- any other matters appearing to the City to be relevant.
- 19. It should be noted that Transport for London is the strategic Highway Authority for New Bridge Street and that this is a TfL project, albeit one encouraged and supported by the City Corporation. The new alternative layout is therefore wholly reliant on their support and their various approval processes. They will need to exercise their powers in relation to changes on their network and consider any objections or representations as part of that process.
- 20. The City Corporation would need to exercise its powers under S.6 and S.45 of the RTRA to introduce the waiting and loading restrictions, changes to parking bays and traffic movements within our streets (including the closure of Bridewell Place) necessary to support and facilitate the introduction of the new layout. As part of this, statutory public consultation will be carried out and any outstanding material objections with respect to the City's streets would be reported back to Committee for resolution.

Conclusion

21. In view of the current situation, the Court is asked to agree to officers continuing to work with TfL and representatives of the Temples to establish the viability of the proposed new layout at Appendix 1, through detailed design and traffic modelling. The Court is also recommended to instruct officers to investigate possible funding options for this new layout.

Report – Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama

Proposed Quorum Change

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2017

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

Over the last calendar year, the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama has been considering its compliance with *The Higher Education Code of Governance ("The Code")* and related matters. As a result of these deliberations, the Board is recommending a change to its existing quorum in order to better comply with the Code and to reflect best practice in the Higher Education sector.

The Policy and Resources Committee has been consulted and endorsed the recommendation at its September meeting; the Court is consequently now asked to approve a proposed change to the quorum of the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama such that the attendance of at least three co-opted Governors is now required, in addition to the seven Common Council Governors currently needed.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Terms of Reference and Instrument and Articles of Government of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama be amended, such that the quorum consists of any seven Common Council Governors <u>plus three co-opted Governors</u>" (as set out at Appendix 1).

MAIN REPORT

Background

- 1. The Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, through its Governance and Effectiveness Committee, regularly reviews any necessary governance changes to ensure that the Guildhall School reflects best practice in the Higher Education (HE) sector as far as possible, given its unique circumstances and relationship with the City of London Corporation.
- 2. The Governance and Effectiveness Committee of the Guildhall School's Board is chaired by Sir Andrew Burns, a Co-opted Governor on the Guildhall School Board, former Chairman of the Council of Royal Holloway, University of London, Chairman of the Committee of University Chairs and one of the UK's leading experts on university governance.

- 3. Over the last calendar year, the Governance and Effectiveness Committee has been considering the Board's compliance with The Higher Education Code of Governance ("The Code") and related matters.
- 4. By visibly adopting the Code, governing bodies demonstrate leadership and stewardship. Governing bodies are asked to provide an explanation of where a whole or primary element or supporting 'must' statement is inappropriate to their governance arrangements.

Current Position

- 5. The Board of Governors is generally compliant with the Code, except in those areas where the School's unique status as a Department of the City of London and the consequential governance and practical support arrangements for governance are not compatible.
- 6. To date, the School have sought to explain where the unique nature of their ownership by the City of London Corporation makes some statements within the Code inappropriate. However, it is also recognised that there are some 'quick wins' in terms of how the School might be *more* compliant in certain areas quorum being perhaps the most obvious of these.
- 7. Within the School's current statement of compliance is reference to the need to revisit the quoracy requirements of the Board.
- 8. The Governance and Effectiveness Committee and, indeed, the full Board, have expressed the desire for all Board Governors to be treated as equal. The current quoracy requirement of the Board (viz. "any seven Common Council Governors") requires only Common Council Governors to be present in order for important strategic decisions to be legitimately made at a Board meeting. This has, at times, been difficult to achieve in the past year and also does not reflect an equality of Board membership.

Proposals

- 9. The Board of Governors recommends that the quoracy requirement should be more inclusive of non-Common Council Governors as a move towards equalising the status of members of the Board.
- 10. There are other Committees where a majority of Common Councilmen, together with external members, is required to establish a quorum but external members are also explicitly referred to. An example of this is the City's Audit and Risk Management Committee whose quorum is "5 Members at least 3 of which must be elected by the Court of Common Council and at least 1 external representative".
- 11. The Board, therefore, recommends to the Court of Common Council that the quorum requirement for the Board be amended to read:
 - "The quorum consists of any seven Common Council Governors plus three co-opted Governors".

- 12. Changes to the Terms of Reference also require corresponding amendments to the Board's Instrument & Articles of Government, specifically Article 5 in this instance.
- 13. The Remembrancer has advised that Privy Council approval is required for this amendment; this will be sought as soon as practicable should the Court agree to amend the Terms of Reference and Instrument & Articles of Government.

Conclusion

14. The proposal regarding quorum set out within this report reflects the Board of Governors' desire to reflect good practice within Higher Education whilst also being mindful of the Guildhall School's unique relationship with the City of London Corporation and the desire to not, in any way, diminish the responsibility/number of Common Council Governors required to achieve a quorum.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE GUILDHALL SCHOOL OF MUSIC & DRAMA

1. Constitution

A Non-Ward Committee consisting of,

- 11 Members elected by the Court of Common Council for a term of three years (renewable twice) at least one of whom shall have fewer than five years' service on the Court at the time of their appointment
- the Principal of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama
- one member of the Guildhall School academic staff to be elected by the Academic staff for a term of three years (renewable twice)
- one member of the Guildhall School administrative staff to be elected by such staff for a term of three years (renewable twice)
- one Guildhall student representative who shall normally be the President of the Students' Union
- up to six co-opted non-City of London Corporation Governors with appropriate expertise for a term of three years (renewable twice)

None of the appointed Governors shall serve on the Board for more than a maximum of nine years.

The Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Board shall be elected from the City Corporation Members.

The Chairman of the Barbican Centre Board, the Chairman of the Culture, Heritage & Libraries Committee and one representative of the Centre for Young Musicians shall be permitted to attend the Board in a non-voting, advisory capacity.

Quorum

The quorum consists of any seven Common Council Governors plus three co-opted Governors.

Appointments to the City of London Academies Trust

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2017

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

Due to a potential conflict of interest, the current Chairman of the Education Board has not taken up the role of Company Member and Trustee¹ of the City of London Academies Trust. However it has not been possible to make an appointment in the room of the Education Board Chairman as the January 2016 resolution of the Court is explicit that the Education Board Chairman should perform both of these roles. Therefore it is recommended that the January 2016 resolution should be adjusted to permit a representative to be appointed to those roles in the room of any Member who is not able to serve.

RECOMMENDATION

The Court of Common Council is **recommended** to:

amend the January 2016 resolution of the Court of Common Council to permit a representative/nominee of the Chairman/Deputy Chairman of the Policy Committee and the Education Board to serve as Company Member/Trustee of the City of London Academies Trust where the original candidate is not able to serve.

MAIN REPORT

Background

- At the meeting of the Court of Common Council on 14 January 2016, it was 1. resolved that the following appointments be made to the City of London Academies Trust.
 - a. Up to four Company Members, to be the Chairman and a Deputy Chairman of the Policy Committee, and the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Education Board.
 - b. Up to six Directors/Trustees to consist of two Directors/Trustees nominated by the Policy Committee, two Directors/Trustees nominated by the Education Board, and the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Education Board.

¹ Company Members are responsible for safeguarding the ethos and objects of a company: they have the power to appoint and remove Company Trustees. Trustees are responsible for carrying out the business of the Trust e.g. the management of its academies.

c. The City of London Corporation be appointed as a corporate members with the Town Clerk appointed for that purpose.

Current Position

- 2. The current Chairman of the Education Board has been unable to take up an appointment with the City of London Academies Trust due to a potential conflict of interest with an existing role with another academy trust.
- Therefore, to allow for a City Corporation Member to be appointed in the room
 of the Education Board Chairman and to introduce some flexibility into the
 appointments to the City of London Academies Trust more generally, it is
 proposed that the January 2016 resolution of the Court of Common Council be
 amended (amendments in bold) to,
 - a. Up to four Company Members, to be:
 - i. the Chairman and a Deputy Chairman of the Policy Committee, or their representatives,
 - ii. the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Education Board, or their representatives.
 - b. Up to six Directors/Trustees, to consist of:
 - i. two Directors/Trustees nominated by the Policy Committee,
 - ii. two Directors/Trustees nominated by the Education Board,
 - iii. the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Education Board or their representatives.
 - c. The City of London Corporation be appointed as a corporate members with the Town Clerk appointed for that purpose.
