Blackfriars Bridge

Andrew McMurtrie asked a question of the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee regarding Blackfriars Bridge.

Responding, the Chairman noted that Blackfriars Bridge was overdue for re-painting as the City had been investigating problems with the parapet, an issue responsible for the majority of the rust-staining that was evident. These investigations had taken some time due to access restrictions caused by a combination of Thameslink, Cycle Superhighway, and Thames Tideway activities. However, he was pleased to report that the investigations were now complete and that a solution to the parapet issues had been identified. It was expected that works would commence in April 2019 and last two to three years. This was a consequence of the need to co-ordinate works with Thames Tideway and the Port of London Authority, to programme safe navigation and working for span closures, as well as with TfL for highway space and access.

In relation to costs, the Chairman noted that this would be dependent on the various options selected by Members and the outcome of procurement exercises. However, he was happy to provide any interested Member with a copy of the relevant committee report, which provided some detail about potential costings.

Idling Vehicles

Alderman William Russell asked a question of the Chairman of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee concerning idling vehicles.

Replying, the Chairman outlined the significant activity currently undertaken in respect of idling vehicles, noting that the primary focus was to drive behavioural change to prevent idling from occurring in the first instance. This included, as well as enforcement action, publicity campaigns, leafleting, an on-street presence, and "idling vehicle action days". Work carried out to prevent vehicle idling also included responding to specific complaints of idling vehicles, placing signs in hotspot areas, writing directly to companies whose drivers were observed leaving engines idling unnecessarily, and working directly with the taxi trade, local businesses and the construction industry to gain their support for no vehicle idling at their sites. Such activity had received wide and positive media coverage, with evidence demonstrating that the campaign was effective and had reduced the number of vehicles with idling engines within the City.

Noting that the London Borough of Southwark had recently introduced an £80 Penalty Charge Notice for idling vehicles, the Chairman cautioned that this was not

as simple a solution as it might sound, with Southwark having only been able to issue one notice, which had then been withdrawn on appeal. He added that City Corporation staff were currently authorised to issue Fixed Penalty Notices for unnecessary engine idling; however, due to the wording of the regulations and the statutory guidance in place, these were very difficult to issue. This was an issue for all local authorities, hence the focus on behaviour change in the City.

The Chairman emphasised the importance of this issue and reassured Members that the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee would continue to take a close interest in the matter. Notwithstanding the work undertaken to prevent idling vehicles to date, he would be asking officers to consider whether the current approach continued to be the most effective and what further work might be carried out to enhance the efficacy of the City Corporation's efforts.

Royal Wedding

Applications for Hospitality

(A) Early evening reception at the Museum of London to mark the centenary of women's suffrage

2018 marked the 100th anniversary of the Representation of the People Act 1918, which enabled all men and some women over the age of 30 to vote for the first time.

A number of activities had been planned by the City Corporation to mark the

occasion under the umbrella programme 'Women: work and power'. These activities were largely aimed at engaging members of the public. In addition, the London Metropolitan Archives, Barbican Centre and Museum of London would be running their own programme of events throughout the year.

It was therefore proposed that the City Corporation host an early evening reception jointly with the Museum of London. This occasion would provide the City Corporation with an opportunity to mark the centenary of women's suffrage and celebrate women's role in culture and the arts. It would also provide an opportunity to invite Members and senior representatives from cultural and creative industries, City businesses and political figures from central and local government and enable further engagement with opinion formers about the City Corporation's Culture Mile initiative.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception, with arrangements made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

This would be a full Court event.

Resolved – That hospitality be granted for an early evening reception, with arrangements made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

(B) Armed Forces Flag Day 2018

The Armed Forces Flag Day forms part of a week of activities across the country to raise public awareness of the contribution made by the Armed Forces. Armed Forces Flag Day was established to provide an opportunity to show support for members of the Armed Forces and Service families.

To mark this occasion, and in line with previous years, it was proposed that the City Corporation hosts a flag-raising ceremony in Guildhall Yard during the afternoon of Monday 25 June, followed by light refreshments in the Old Library.

This event would provide an opportunity for the City to show its support for the Armed Forces and raise awareness of the contribution made to our country by those who were currently serving or had previously served in the Forces.

Guests would include serving and retired military personnel, reservists, cadets, Masters and Clerks of Livery Companies, school children from the City's schools and representatives from the City's Privileged Regiments. The Election of Sheriffs was to take place on the same day and was expected to result in a larger audience for the ceremony.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a flag-raising ceremony to mark Armed Forces Flag Day, followed by light refreshments, and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

This would be a full Court event.

(C) Early evening welcome reception for the Australian British Fintech Cyber Catalyst

The Australian British Fintech Cyber Catalyst conference was to take place in London from 2 – 5 July. The conference aimed to build links between Australia and the UK in the Fintech and cyber sectors.

In 2016, Australia and New Zealand were identified as priority markets for the City Corporation and Her Majesty's Government, resulting in them being included in the Lord Mayor's International Visits Programme for the next 3 years. The intention was to promote trade between, and investment in, the three countries. In February 2018 the Lord Mayor led a delegation of senior business leaders on a visit to Australia and New Zealand.

It was therefore proposed that the City Corporation hosts a short presentation followed by an early evening reception in the Livery Hall at the end of the first day of the Australian British Fintech Cyber Catalyst. This would provide an opportunity for the City Corporation to welcome the delegation to London, build on the relationships formed during the Lord Mayor's visit, and to be updated on any progress since the Lord Mayor's visit.

Guests would include representatives from the Australian British Chamber of Commerce, members of the Lord Mayor's overseas delegation, key Australian and City Stakeholders, representatives from the cyber and fintech industry and government representatives.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the Australian British FinTech Cyber Catalyst and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within the approved parameters.

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Resolutions from the Annual Wardmotes

To be presented on Thursday, 17th May 2018

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the
City of London in Common Council assembled.*

The Resolutions from the Annual Wardmotes are set out below for the consideration of the Court:-

From the Ward of Aldersgate

- (i) “That the citizens of Tudor Rose Court in Aldersgate are sorely troubled by being bitten by mosquitoes. These creatures are a health hazard, as well as a serious nuisance. They have been identified as *Culex Pipiens*, and possibly the sub-type *Culex Pipiens Molestus*, commonly known as the London Underground mosquito. What action is the City of London Corporation taking to determine the sub-type of these mosquitoes, which will help determine the source of these pests, and what action is the City taking to ensure these pests are eliminated?”
- (ii) “That this Wardmote requests that the City of London Corporation, as landlords, urgently investigates the original intentions of the City when first developing Tudor Rose Court as Sheltered Housing, and the legal position of the present holders of the Head Lease, Hanover, to ensure that the new tenancy agreements do not contravene such intentions, and to take all possible measures to ensure that tenants do not live in fear of losing their homes due to increase in service charges.”

From the Ward of Aldgate

- (i) “That this Wardmote asks that the Court of Common Councilmen do consider the traffic situation around Fenchurch Street Station and in particular the taxi parking/queuing in Fenchurch Street between Fenchurch Place and Lloyds Avenue to include considering reversing the flow of traffic in Fenchurch Street to address traffic flow, environmental and health and safety concerns.”
- (ii) “That this Wardmote asks that the Court of Common Councilmen reconsiders the resolution passed at the Wardmote on 22 March 2017 that this Wardmote deplores the state of broadband connections for both residential and existing business customers and requires the Corporation to take urgent action to address this.”
- (iii) “That this Wardmote asks that the Court of Common Councilmen considers that the location of the motorcycle parking bay on Creechurch Lane for relocation back to its original position as had been understood would occur following completion of construction works.”

Ward of Cripplegate

“This Wardmote deplores the shameful condition of the windows and other fabric of the Grade II Listed Golden Lane Estate and calls upon the City of London Corporation to undertake urgent action to remedy clear and obvious wants of repair, which have been evident since at least 2008. In particular the window replacement programme should be brought forward to commence in 6 months and to complete to a high standard within a further 18 months and not by 2021.”

Following their consideration at the Grand Court of Wardmote, these Resolutions will have informally been referred to officers of the relevant Service Committees, so as to assist them in responding without delay following their formal consideration by the Court of Common Council and its relevant Committees.)

Statutory Instruments

Date in Force

The Children and Social Work Act 2017 (Commencement No. 4 and Transitional and Saving Provisions) Regulations 2018, S.I. No. 497

29 June 2018

The Regulations apply to the Common Council in its capacity as a local authority and bring into force provisions of the Children and Social Work Act 2017 relating to the safeguarding of children.

The Animal Welfare (Licensing of Activities Involving Animals) (England) Regulations 2018, S.I. No. 486

1 October 2018

The Regulations apply to the Common Council in its capacity as a local authority. They introduce an updated licensing system for the sale of pets, the boarding of cats or dogs, hiring of horses, dog breeding, and keeping or training of animals for exhibition.

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Report – Policy and Resources Committee

Common Hall: Election of Lord Mayor 2019

To be presented on Thursday, 17th May 2018

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the
City of London in Common Council assembled.*

SUMMARY

The dates of Common Hall are fixed as Midsummers' Day (for the election of Sheriffs) and Michaelmas Day (for the election of Lord Mayor). Provision does exist to vary these dates in the event that either falls on a Saturday or Sunday, in which case the relevant Common Hall is moved to the Monday immediately following.

There is also, however, provision within Acts of Common Council to reschedule Common Hall in the event that it falls on the same date as a major religious festival, provided a notice period of at least one year is provided. It has been observed that the Election of Lord Mayor in 2019 falls on the same date as Rosh Hashanah, a significant Jewish religious festival; consequently, there is scope for the provisions of the relevant Act of Common Council to be invoked and the date to be moved. In the event that it is determined that the election should be moved, a formal resolution by the Court of Common Council is required.

Responsibility for overseeing arrangements for Common Hall rests with the Livery Committee, which has been consulted and has confirmed it would endorse such a rescheduling, should this be the will of the Court of Common Council. The Policy and Resources Committee and General Purposes Committee of Aldermen have also endorsed this change.

RECOMMENDATION

Members are asked to resolve that the election of Lord Mayor in 2019 should be moved to Wednesday 2 October, to avoid a clash with Rosh Hashanah.

MAIN REPORT

Background

1. Each year, the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs for the year ensuing are elected by the Livery at Common Hall. This is proscribed by primary legislation, with the details governing the specific arrangements set in turn by Act of Common Council.
2. Common Hall meets twice per annum for the purpose of these elections – in June for the Election of Sheriffs, and in September for the Election of Lord Mayor.

Issue

3. The specific date for the Election of Lord Mayor is fixed by Act of Common Council as Michaelmas Day, i.e. 29 September. Similarly, the Election of Sheriffs is also fixed as Midsummers' Day, i.e. 24 June.
4. When either date falls on a weekend, the Act of Common Council of 22 March 1973 provides that:-

1. As from the date of the making and passing of this Act whenever Midsummer Day or Michaelmas Day shall happen to fall upon either a Saturday or a Sunday the election of Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, [...], [...] of this City shall be held and take place on the Monday next immediately following either of those days any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

5. In 2019, Michaelmas Day falls on a Sunday. Normally, the date of the election of Lord Mayor would therefore be moved to Monday 30 September, in accordance with the above section of the 22 March 1973 Act.
6. However, Monday 30 September 2019 is also the date on which Rosh Hashanah (a two-day festival marking Jewish New Year, which begins at dusk on 29 September) falls that year.
7. Again, there is provision within the same Act of Common Council to alter the date of Common Hall, if desired, should the date of the election of Lord Mayor fall on "a major religious festival". The relevant extract is as follows:

5. Notwithstanding the provisions contained in any Act of Common Council (including this Act) relating to the day of election of Lord Mayor or any custom to the contrary it shall be lawful for the Court of Common Council and that Court is hereby empowered in any year in order to avoid an election on the day of any major religious festival to appoint a day for the election of Lord Mayor other than Michaelmas Day by a formal resolution of the Court passed not less than one year before the said day of election.

8. Although immaterial in the context of this report, for the sake of completeness it should be noted that the position is slightly different for the Election of Sheriffs, where there is more flexibility to move the date for any special cause and the formal resolution of the Court does not have to be passed a year in advance. The Act of Common Council of 21 January 1932 provides that:-

3. *[The General day of election of Sheriffs of this City shall be yearly the twenty-fourth day of June, unless the same shall happen to be a Saturday or a Sunday, in which case the election shall be on the Monday then next following.] Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Court of Common Council, and that Court is hereby empowered, in any year for any special cause to appoint a day for the election of Sheriffs and other Officers usually elected on Midsummer Day by the Liverymen of the several Companies of this City in Common Hall assembled other than that above mentioned, by a formal Resolution of the Court.*

Consideration

9. Members' views were therefore sought as to whether the date of the election of Lord Mayor should be moved in 2019. Consideration was particularly given as to the potential impact on those Liverymen who are practicing members of the Jewish faith and whether or not keeping the date as it currently stands might preclude them from exercising their ability to attend and cast their vote.
10. The Great Hall has been reserved for Wednesday 2 October 2019 should the date need to be moved and it is recommended that, should a rescheduling be approved, this be the date on which the Election be held. This would keep it as close as possible to the original date so as to minimise disruption.
11. The Admission of Sheriffs, currently scheduled for 27 September 2019, would remain unchanged.
12. In accordance with the Act of Common Council, any date change to the Election of Lord Mayor must be made by the Common Council through the passing of a formal resolution, not less than one year prior to the scheduled date.
13. Whilst the Livery Committee is responsible for overseeing arrangements for Common Hall, it is not a committee of the Court of Common Council and therefore cannot report to it.
14. Equally, whilst the views of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen are also integral to any final decision, it is also not a body of Common Council and cannot report directly. Therefore, the Policy and Resources Committee, which has responsibility for those matters not specifically allocated to other committees and also considers general electoral matters, was asked to consider this proposal and make the formal recommendation to the Court of Common Council, subject to the views of the other bodies.
15. All three Committees consequently agreed that the date should be moved to 2 October 2019, in view of the likely clash.
16. Whichever the decision, the confirmed date of the Election will be communicated to the wider Livery accordingly.

Conclusion

17. Members are asked to consider the clash of the Election of Lord Mayor in 2019 with Rosh Hashanah and to determine whether the Election should be rescheduled to 2 October 2019.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Report – Hospitality Working Party of the Policy and Resources Committee

Applications for Hospitality

To be presented on Thursday, 17th May 2018

*To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons
of the City of London in Common Council assembled.*

(a) Early Evening reception for the Central London Bench

The City has a long history of association with the administration of justice and, in particular, with the City Magistracy. The City of London Magistrates' Court is housed at 1 Queen Victoria Street, which is owned by the City Corporation and provided to the Ministry of Justice and HM Courts and Tribunal Service (HMCTS). The City Corporation is currently working with HMCTS on a proposal for a new combined court centre in the City of London that would enable all existing Courts in the Square Mile (except the Central Criminal Court) to be consolidated into a new multi-purpose flagship centre with a primary focus on fraud, economic crime and cyber-crime.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception for the Central London Bench. The reception would provide an opportunity to build on the longstanding relationship the City Corporation has with the Central London Bench and to highlight the contribution made by the City Corporation to the administration of justice in London including the proposal for the combined court centre.

Guests would include representatives from the Central London Bench, Government and legal sector organisations such as the Law Society and Bar Council and Members with relevant interests.

It is therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the Central London Bench and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within approved parameters.

The host element would be the Hospitality Working Party, Chairman and Deputy Chairman of Police Committee, Members who are Magistrates on the Central London Bench and Members with relevant interests.

(b) Early evening reception to celebrate the success of ParalympicsGB at the 2018 Winter Paralympic Games

The PyeongChang 2018 Paralympic Winter Games were the most successful in ParalympicsGB's history with one Gold, four Silver and two Bronze medals being awarded.

The City Corporation has been approached by Disability SnowSport UK (DSUK) to host a reception to mark the success of ParalympicsGB in the Winter Paralympic Games. DSUK is the UK national governing body for disabled snow sports.

DSUK aims to provide access to snow sports for disabled people across the UK through activities such as the delivery of adaptable lessons, residential activity weeks throughout Europe and the USA, and the training of instructors and volunteer helpers.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception to celebrate the achievements of ParalympicsGB at the Winter Paralympic Games. The occasion would provide an opportunity for the City Corporation to demonstrate its continuing commitment to sport following the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The reception would also be an opportunity to mark DSUK's renewed focus on grass roots level initiatives.

Guests would include Winter Paralympians, representatives from DSUK, sponsors and partners of ParalympicsGB, representatives from relevant sporting organisations and bodies such as UK Sport, Sport England, the British Paralympic Association and the International Paralympic Committee, Government, GLA and Members with relevant interests.

It is therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception to celebrate the success of ParalympicsGB and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within approved parameters.

The host element would be the Public Relations and Economic Development Sub (Policy and Resources) Committee, Hospitality Working Party and Members with relevant interests.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Report – The City Bridge Trust Committee

City Bridge Trust support for Young Londoners in conjunction with the Greater London Authority

To be presented on Thursday, 17th May 2018

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The City Bridge Trust and its trustee, the City of London Corporation (CoLC) has a long-standing commitment to support work that improves the outcomes for young Londoners. Since the Trust was established in 1995 every major 5-year grants programme that the City Bridge Trust has implemented has incorporated specific funding streams for children and young people; as well as some additional stand-alone initiatives (such as Fear & Fashion, or the current Bridge to Work programme). In February 2018 the Mayor of London announced a £45m fund over a three-year period to support young Londoners by investing in vital services to help vulnerable children and young adults develop, particularly those who have been left behind or marginalised; and by investing in work to prevent them being drawn into crime. This will be known as the Young Londoners Fund (YLF). There is now an opportunity for the City Bridge Trust to help the YLF benefit as many young people as possible. It is proposed that a sum of £1m from the City Bridge Trust 2018/19 grants budget be set aside to work collaboratively with the GLA to fund a range of wrap-around activities to support those organisations which receive funding from the Young Londoners Fund

RECOMMENDATION

The Court is asked, following agreement at the City Bridge Trust Committee meeting on 2 May 2018, to approve the sum of £1m from the 2018/19 CBT grants budget to fund a range of activities to provide additional support to organisations funded through the Mayor of London's Young Londoners Fund and that the Court delegates to the CBT Committee the dispersal of that sum.

MAIN REPORT

Background

1. In February 2018, the Mayor of London announced a £45m fund over a three-year period to support young Londoners. This support would be achieved by investing in vital services to help vulnerable children and young adults to develop, particularly those who have been left behind or marginalised; and by investing in work to prevent them being drawn into crime.
2. The City Bridge Trust has had a long-standing, effective and highly regarded commitment to supporting services and opportunities for young Londoners through its grants and strategic initiatives. The City Bridge Trust also has much

experience of supporting work tackling youth violence – not least through its major multi-year programme launched in 2005 (*Fear & Fashion – Tackling Knife Crime*) which it developed and led with a cohort of other charitable funders.

3. The City of London Corporation also makes significant contribution to the lives of young people – whether through boosting their skills and employability, or through the City’s significant cultural offer and its management of 11,000 acres of green space, providing access to a wide range of sporting opportunities.
4. Of the Mayor’s £45m (to be called the Young Londoners Fund), £15m is earmarked to scale up existing and currently-planned City Hall-funded programmes and projects, many of which are targeted at helping young people caught up in crime (e.g. the Mayor’s Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC) Knife Crime Community Seed Fund; the London Gang Exit Support Service). The Greater London Authority (GLA) is currently finalising the intended outcomes of the Fund, as well as the processes for groups to apply to the £30m pot remaining for new work. In so doing, it has worked closely with the City Bridge Trust, other funders and specialist agencies (such as MOPAC) to help them with both of these aspects.
5. It is likely that many of the new projects to be supported (following an open application process to be made public in late May) will be aimed at helping children and young people to make positive choices and to fulfil their potential, particularly those at risk of getting caught up in crime. It will support a range of education, sport, cultural and other activities for young people aged 10 – 21 and, in many ways, provide a framework for early intervention and action.

How the City Bridge Trust can help

6. The Young Londoners Fund (YLF) is intended as a vehicle for tangible support both for young people at risk and for engaging those who are unable to access positive activities and experiences as important building blocks within their development into adulthood.
7. There is now an opportunity for the City Bridge Trust to help the YLF benefit as many young people as possible. It is proposed that a sum of £1m from the CBT 2018/19 grants budget be set aside to work collaboratively with the GLA to fund a range of wrap-around activities to support those organisations which receive funding from the Young Londoners Fund, specifically in areas relating to:
 - Supporting networking/multi-agency coordination
 - Supporting the delivery of high-quality services (e.g. through training; quality mark schemes)
 - Supporting access to safeguarding training and best-practice
 - Supporting the sustainability of the most effective projects
 - Supporting the mental health needs of front-line youth workers
8. In addition, the Trust is uniquely placed to broker access to significant resources within the City of London Corporation “family” (e.g. through its contacts with the corporate and cultural sectors in London; the City of London Police and the Old Bailey; and through the work of the City Academies and other City institutions),

as well as through the total assets at the disposal of the Bridge House Estates Charity (including access to the philanthropic sector). Equally, the City of London Corporation has an important standing within the local government network which may prove to be a valuable resource and conduit of good practice.

9. This proposal aligns with the City Corporation's Corporate Plan for 2018-23, in its vision to support a diverse and sustainable London, by strengthening the character, capacity and connections of London for the benefit of people who live, learn, work and visit here; and support the City Corporation's strategic aim to contribute to a flourishing society, through the following outcomes in the Plan:
 - a) Outcome 1: People are safe and feel safe
 - b) Outcome 3: People have equal opportunities to enrich their lives and reach their full potential.
 - c) Outcome 4: Communities are cohesive and have the facilities they need
10. This initiative provides an opportunity for City Bridge Trust to build on its long-standing work supporting young Londoners and to apply its total assets approach (i.e. calling on the combined financial and non-financial assets of the Trust, the Bridge House Estates Charity; and the City of London Corporation) to add significant value to a major and much-needed scheme.

Conclusion

11. This report requests that the Court of Common Council approves the sum of £1m from the 2018/19 CBT grants budget to fund a range of activities to provide additional support to organisations funded through the Mayor of London's Young Londoners Fund and that the dispersal of the £1m funds be delegated to the CBT Committee.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.
