Bensted-Smith, N to the Chair of the Policy and Resources Committee

100 Women for the Freedom

Nicholas Bensted-Smith asked a question of the Chair of the Policy and Resources Committee concerning the recent initiative to celebrate 100 years of women's suffrage.

In response, the Chair paid tribute to all officers and Members involved in the 100 Women for the Freedom campaign which had celebrated women from all walks of life with links with the City. The Chair highlighted the different ways in which the City Corporation was celebrating the achievements of women; for example, the City Arts Initiative was currently drawing up recommendations to improve the recognition of women across the City's Public Realm and the Fearless Girl Statue

had recently been unveiled in Paternoster Square.

ESG Rating

Fairweather, A to the Chair of the Policy and Resources Committee Anne Fairweather asked a question of the Chair of the Policy and Resources Committee concerning the steps being taken by the City Corporation to ensure it upheld the highest Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) standards.

Responding, the Chair advised that the City Corporation had a Responsible Business Strategy which set out the organisation's priorities for ESG standards. The priorities within the strategy included responsible procurement, responsible investment, fighting climate change, reducing waste in plastics and packaging, and improving air quality.

The Chair also provided an outline of the different ways in which the City Corporation had reviewed its practices to ensure they continued to be fit for purpose. She referred to a response which the Chairman of the Investment Committee had previously provided to the Court in 2018, which detailed how the City Corporation's fund managers were ensuring best practise with ESG; she also highlighted how the Economic Development Office was evolving the work of the Innovation, Inclusion and Growth team from corporate social responsibility to an Environment, Social and Governance approach.

Sayed, R to the Deputy Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee

Electric Vehicle Charging Points

Ruby Sayed asked a question of the Deputy Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee in relation to the issue of air pollution within the City, querying the work taking place to increase the number of Electric Vehicle (EV) charging points and the creation of charging hubs within the City to support and encourage both private and commercial EV usage.

The Deputy Chairman advised that the current policy on the provision of EV charging points sought to meet the needs of vehicles serving the Square Mile without generating any additional vehicle trips. The policy ensured that charge points were only installed in locations that had minimal impact on the public realm and were therefore installed in suitable off-street locations.

He advised that there were 50, 7kiloWatt, standard speed charge points installed in the City Corporation's public car parks and 22 in the Barbican to meet the needs of residents, small freight vehicles, and private cars. In addition, work was taking place with TfL to install charging points that would primarily be used by taxis. The Deputy Chairman provided an overview of the different sites were there were plans to install and increase charge points for electric vehicles.

The Deputy Chairman explained that the Transport Strategy would soon be presented to the Court for Members' consideration and this would include a proposal to produce an EV Charging Action Plan by December 2019. In developing the plan, the City Corporation would consider and consult on the different charging needs of all users and would include a comprehensive timeline and strategy for implementation.

In response to a supplementary question from Ruby Sayed which asked for a

comprehensive timeline and strategy, the Deputy Chairman explained that all the recommended actions in the 2018 Zero Emissions Report, relevant to Transport were currently in progress, and the proposals in the City's draft Transport Strategy would go further towards achieving a reduction in transport related emissions. He added that the Policy and Resources Committee had recently approved a new policy on the City Corporation's own fleet which required Zero Emission Capable vehicles to be considered first when replacement or retrofit of a vehicle was required, therefore accelerating the transition to zero emission of the Corporation's own fleet.

Responding a further supplementary question from Deputy John Tomlinson concerning air pollution at Beech Street, the Deputy Chairman gave assurance that active conversations were taking place with the Chairman of Planning and Transportation, the Chair of Policy and Resources, and TfL, looking at work which could be carried out and where improvements could be made.

City Fund 2019/20 Budget Report and Medium Term Financial Strategy

The Court considered a report of the Finance Committee presenting the overall financial position of the City Fund (i.e. the City Corporation's finances relating to Local Government, Police and Port Health services). The medium-term financial challenge facing the Corporation's City Fund reflected, uniquely:

- external factors, such as potential major changes to business rate income and
 - government support, which could lead to a significant drop in income.
- the increased funding requirement flowing from the adoption of a major projects
 programme in addition to pressures across a range of existing revenue and

programme, in addition to pressures across a range of existing revenue and capital budgets.

The scale of these changes would become clearer during the next year, following the Spending Review and reviews of business rates and council tax; these would have an impact from 2020/21 onwards.

The Chairman spoke to introduce the budget and clarified a number of elements, following which Members took the opportunity to ask questions. In response, the Chairman agreed that communication and transparency concerning any potential changes to business rates and council tax would be essential.

Resolved – That the report be agreed to and the Court do pass a Resolution in the following terms:-

- 1. That for the 2019/20 financial year the Court of Common Council approve;
 - the Premium multiplier on the Non-Domestic Rate and Small Business Rate multipliers be set at 0.006 (an increase of 0.001 on the present multiplier) to enable the City to continue to support the City of London Police, security and contingency planning activity within the Square Mile at an enhanced level;
 - an increase of 4.99% in the 'relevant basic amount' of Council Tax of £894.28 includes a 2% increase for Adult Social Care for a Band D property (excluding the GLA precept);
 - the overall financial framework and the revised Medium Term Financial Strategy for the City Fund; and
 - the City Fund Net Budget Requirement of £153,884,727

Council Tax

- It be noted that in 2012 the Finance Committee delegated the calculation of the Council Tax Base to the Chamberlain and the Chamberlain has calculated the following amounts for the year 2019/20 in accordance with Section 31B of the Local Government Finance Act 1992:
 - (a)7,785.03 being the amount calculated by the Chamberlain (as delegated by the Finance Committee), in accordance with the Local Authorities (Calculation of Council Tax Base) (England) Regulations 2012, as the City's Council Tax Base for the year; this amount includes a calculation of the amount of council tax reduction; and

 - dwellings in Class B as defined in the Council Tax (Prescribed Classes of Dwellings) (England) Regulations 2003 prescribed by the Secretary of State under the provisions of Section 11A of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 should be nil;
 - ii. dwellings in Class C as defined in the Council Tax (Prescribed Classes of Dwellings) (England) Regulations 2003 prescribed by the Secretary of State under the provisions of Section 11A of the Local Government Finance Act 1992:

- 8. The Common Council of the City of London determines that for 2019/20 a long-term empty property premium is levied under the provisions of Section 11B of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 at the maximum rate in accordance with legislation. (For 2019/20 this will result in an additional levy of 100% i.e. a council tax charge of 200% for applicable vacant dwellings).
- 9. The Common Council of the City of London hereby determines that its relevant basic amount of council tax for 2019/20, calculated in accordance with Section 52ZX of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 is not excessive in accordance with the Referendums Relating to Council Tax Increases (Principles) (England) Report 2019/20.

Council Tax Reduction (formerly Council Tax Benefit)

10. It be noted that at the Court of Common Council meeting in January 2017 Members approved the Council Tax Reduction Scheme for 2017/18 and future years to be the same as the scheme for 2016/17. There were no proposals to make any specific amendments to the Council Tax Reduction Scheme for that or future years, beyond keeping the scheme in line with Housing Benefit.

Effectively, therefore, the City's Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme for 2019/20 will remain the same as was administered in 2016/17, 2017/18 and 2018/19 subject to the annual uprating of non-dependent income and deductions, and income levels relating to Alternative Council Tax Reduction, or any other uprating as it applies to working age claimants, adjusted in line with inflation levels by reference to relevant annual uprating in the Housing Benefit Scheme or The Prescribed Council Tax Reduction Scheme for Pensioners.

Non Domestic Rates

11. The Common Council of the City of London being a special authority in accordance with Section 144(6) of the Local Government Finance Act 1988 hereby sets for the chargeable financial year beginning with 1st April 2019, a Non-Domestic Rating Multiplier of 0.510 and a Small Business Non-Domestic

- Rating Multiplier of 0.497 in accordance with Part II of the Schedule 7 of the said Act. (Both multipliers are inclusive of the City business rate premium of 0.006).
- 12. In addition, the levying by the Greater London Authority of a Business Rate Supplement in 2019/20 of 0.020 (i.e. 2.0p in the £) on hereditaments with a rateable value greater than £70,000, to finance its contribution to Crossrail, be noted.
- 13. A copy of the said Council Taxes and the Non-Domestic Rating Multipliers, signed by the Town Clerk, be deposited in the offices of the Town Clerk in the said City, and advertised within 21 days from the date of the Court's decision, in at least one newspaper circulating in the area of the Common Council.

Capital Expenditure and Financing for the Year 2019/20

- 14. The City Fund capital budget is approved, and its final financing be determined by the Chamberlain, apart from in regard to any possible borrowing options.
- 15. For the purpose of Section 3(1) of the Local Government Act 2003, for the financial years 2019/20 to 2021/22, the Court of Common Council hereby determines that at this stage the amount of money (referred to as the "Authorised Limit"), which is the maximum amount which the City may have outstanding by way of external borrowing, shall be £513,379,000.
- 16. For the purpose of Section 21(A) of the Local Government Act 2003, for the financial year 2019/20, the Court of Common Council hereby determines that the prudent amount of Minimum Revenue Provision is £1,152,000 using the asset life method over the useful economic life of the relevant assets and which equals the amount of deferred income released from the premiums received for the sale of long leases in accordance with the Minimum Revenue Provision Policy at Appendix F.
- 17. Any potential external borrowing requirement and associated implications will be subject to a further report to Finance Committee and the Court of Common Council.
- 18. The Chamberlain be authorised to lend surplus monies on the basis set out in the Annual Investment Strategy, with an absolute limit of £300m for maturities in excess of 364 days.

(B) Revenue and Capital Budgets 2018/19 and 2019/20 City's Cash and Bridge House Estates

The Court was presented with a report which summarised the revenue and capital budgets for each of the City's three main funds, City Fund, City's Cash and Bridge House Estates together with the budgets for central support services within Guildhall Administration (which initially 'holds' such costs before these are wholly apportioned). The report accompanied the Summary Budget Book which included all the City's budgets at a summary level in a single document and was available in the Members' Reading Room and on the City Corporation's website.

The Court was **recommended** to approve the revenue and capital budgets for City's Cash, Bridge House Estates and Guildhall Administration for the financial year 2019/20 (the budgets for City Fund having already been considered under part A above).

Resolved - That the Court of Common Council:-

- Note the latest revenue budgets for 2018/19.
- Agree the 2019/20 revenue budgets, including the following measures:
 - Efficiency Savings: Maintain the 2% efficiency saving across all Corporation departments, which together with the pay and inflation uplift of 2% would result in flat cash budgets.
 - Additional resource requests: to establish an in-year provision pending further consideration by the Resource Allocation Sub Committee.

- Agree the Capital Budgets, as set out in the Summary Budget Book.
- Medium Term Corporate Plan Alignment and Financial Sustainability
 - Revenue: Establish a fundamental review of priorities to align resources to the Corporate Plan and deliver a sustainable mediumterm financial plan and receive a report on the framework and timing in March;
 - Capital: cash limits for the major projects and explore options for further streamlining, joint ventures/private sector capital, a process for prioritising other capital projects, and the disposal of non-income earning surplus operational property as identified from the operational property review and approved by the Policy and Resources Committee.

Further resolved - That the thanks of the Court be given to the Chairman of the Finance Committee for his introduction to the budget reports before the Court this day and that a copy be circulated to every Member in the usual way.

Report of Urgent Action Taken: London Councils Grant Scheme 2019/20 Levy The Court received a report advising of action taken under urgency procedures regarding the issue of annual levies for subscriptions to the constituent councils of the London Councils Grant Scheme. Having received confirmation from London Councils that the budget had been agreed by over two thirds of the constituent councils, the approval of the Court was required under urgency procedures to issue the levies before the statutory deadline of 15 February 2019.

Resolved – That the action taken under urgency procedures be noted.

(A) High Sheriffs Reception

The office of High Sheriff is a non-political Royal appointment. There are 55 High Sheriffs who serve the counties of England and Wales with each appointment lasting a year. The City of London was granted the right to elect its own sheriff in a charter of 1130, a right affirmed by King Stephen in 1141.

It was proposed that the City Corporation host an early evening reception for the High Sheriffs at the Old Bailey on Wednesday 29th May 2019. The reception would represent an opportunity to enhance the City's relationships with the High Sheriffs, highlight the activities of the City's Sheriffs and promote the City Corporation's aims and objectives to regional representatives.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the High Sheriffs' Association.

Resolved – That that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the High Sheriffs' Association at the Old Bailey, and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within approved parameters.

(B) Armed Forces Flag Day

Armed Forces Flag Day forms part of a week of activities across the country to raise public awareness of the contribution made by the Armed Forces. Armed Forces Flag Day was established to provide an opportunity to show support for members of the Armed Forces and Service families.

To mark this occasion, and in line with previous years, it was proposed that the City Corporation host a flag-raising ceremony in Guildhall Yard during the afternoon of Monday 24th June 2019, followed by light refreshments in the Old Library.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a flag-raising ceremony to mark Armed Forces Flag Day.

Resolved – That hospitality be granted for a flag-raising ceremony to mark Armed Forces Flag Day, followed by light refreshments, and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash and within approved parameters.

(C) Central London Bench Reception

The City has a long history of association with the justice system and, in particular, with the City Magistracy, including by the provision of the City of London's Magistrates' Court. The City Corporation is currently working with HMCTS on the proposal for a new combined court centre in the City of London that would enable all existing courts in the Square Mile (except the Central Criminal Court) to be consolidated into a new multi-purpose flagship centre with a primary focus on fraud, economic crime and cyber-crime.

It was proposed that the City Corporation host an early evening reception for the Central London Bench. The reception would provide an opportunity to build on the longstanding relationship the City Corporation has with the Central London Bench and to highlight the contribution made by the City Corporation to the administration of justice in London, including the proposed combined court centre.

It was therefore **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the Central London Bench.

Resolved – That hospitality be granted for an early evening reception for the Central London Bench and that arrangement be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash within approved parameters.

(D) Report of Urgent Action Taken: Beasts of London Reception

In accordance with Standing Order No. 19, urgent authority was sought to host an early evening reception at the Museum of London for up to 250 guests to mark the opening of the 'Beasts of London' exhibition.

The Museum of London, in partnership with the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, will open a new exhibition in April 2019 entitled 'Beasts of London'. The exhibition will focus on the history of humans and animals living side by side in London and explore the impact that the modern urban environment has on animals.

Following the decision of the Hospitality Working Party on 24th January, it became evident that waiting for a Court of Common Council decision on 7th March would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place for this event. Approval was therefore sought and obtained under urgency procedures and it was **recommended** that this urgent action be noted.

Resolved – That the action taken under urgency procedures be noted.

(E) Report of Urgent Action Taken: The Lord Mayor's Big Curry Lunch

The Lord Mayor's Big Curry Lunch was launched in 2008 and since its inception has raised £1.9m for the Army Benevolent Fund, the Soldiers' Charity, the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity, and the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund. The lunch is hosted by the Lord Mayor and attended by a Member of the Royal Family.

In order to demonstrate the City's continuing commitment to the Armed Forces, and to mark the 75th Anniversary of the Army Benevolent Fund, it has been agreed that the City Corporation will meet the cost of the use of Guildhall for this occasion with event related costs being met from the hospitality budget.

Following the decision of the Hospitality Working Party on 24th January, it became evident that waiting for a Court of Common Council decision on 7th March would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place for this event. Approval was therefore sought and obtained under urgency procedures and it is **recommended** that this urgent action be noted.

Resolved – That the action taken under urgency procedures be noted.

Draft Pay Policy Statement

The Localism Act 2011 requires the City of London Corporation to prepare and publish a Pay Policy Statement setting out its approach to pay for the most senior and junior members of staff. This must be agreed each year by the full Court of Common Council.

The statement, having been updated for 2019/20 and approved by both the Establishment Committee and Policy and Resources Committee, was therefore presented to the Court of Common Council with the **recommendation** that it be approved.

Resolved – that the draft Pay Policy Statement for 2019/20, as set out in the Appendix to the report, be approved.

Honorary Freedom Update

The Chairman of the Freedom Applications Committee provided an oral update in respect of the Motion passed at the last meeting of the Court, relative to the commencement of the process to revoke the Honorary Freedom granted to Aung San Suu Ky in May 2017.

The Freedom Applications Committee had begun the process by dispatching a letter to the Honorary Freeman informing her of the proposal and the rationale,

inviting her comments on it. A response was awaited. The Committee would consider, in due course, the next steps in the process in light of any response received, or none.

22a. **STANDARDS COMMITTEE**

(A) Appointment of Co-opted Member

The Standards Committee comprises sixteen Members, four of whom are co-opted and must not be members of the Court of Common Council or employees of the City Corporation. Whilst Co-opted Members are no longer a statutory requirement and have no formal vote, following the introduction of the Localism Act 2011, the City of London Corporation has agreed to the inclusion of Co-opted Members on the Committee to maximise the breadth of knowledge and experience available.

A vacancy for one co-opted Member had arisen and following a recruitment exercise Nicholas Cooke Q.C. had been nominated by the Selection Panel to serve on the Standards Committee.

Resolved – That the Court approve the Selection Panel's recommendation that Nicholas Cooke Q.C. be appointed to serve as a Co-opted Member of the Standards Committee for an initial two-year term (in order to better regulate the terms of office of Co-opted Members of the Standards Committee) expiring in March 2021 be approved. It was noted that, thereafter, Mr Cooke Q.C. would be eligible for re-appointment for a further, full, four-year term.

The Chairman thanked the Court for approving the recommendation to appoint Nicholas Cooke Q.C. to the Committee and provided an update in respect of Coopted Member Mark Greenburgh who had recently been found to have breached Principle Six of the Solicitors' Regulation Authority Rules 2011. The Court was advised that the remarks made did not breach the Members' code of conduct, Mr Greenburgh had been transparent throughout the process and this was a matter for the Standards Committee consider now that the hearing had concluded.

22b. STANDARDS COMMITTEE

(B) Dispensations - Policy and Guidance

In July 2018, the Town Clerk authorised the establishment of a Dispensations (Standards) Working Party under the urgency provisions of Standing Order No. 41(a). The Working Party had since met regularly to consider dispensation policy and associated issues. Feedback had been invited and facilitated in various ways from all Members and Co-opted Members throughout the very detailed drafting of new documentation.

The Court considered a report which set out the final details of this future policy and guidance on dispensations, as well as the revised dispensation request application form, all of which came in to effect as of 1 March 2019.

Discussion ensued during which the following comments were made:

- The Chairman advised there were no plans at this stage to review dispensations already granted.
- The Chairman, responding to a request from a Member, agreed to ask officers to include links to current guidance and relevant legislation within the Dispensations documents.
- A number of Members sought clarity in relation to the question of council tax and the requirement for those who paid it to seek a dispensation. Reference was made to paragraph 17 of the Policy and guidance on the granting of dispensations under the Localism Act 2011 and the Members' Code of Conduct and the position elsewhere, as well as the guidance provided by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government. Notwithstanding the latter arrangements, the Chairman advised that the ability to seek a dispensation was provided for to offer an additional level of comfort, should any Member personally deem it helpful.
- Members commented on best practice, advising that where Members had an interest, it would be prudent that they excuse themselves from discussion relating to that interest and recuse themselves from meetings where appropriate.

Upon the Question being put, the Lord Mayor declared the Motion to be carried.

Education, Culture and Skills Strategies

The Court received a report which outlined the background to the City of London Corporation's proposed Education, Skills and Cultural and Creative Learning Strategies 2019-2023. It described the process through which the suite of strategies has been developed by the Education Board and briefly highlighted key priorities within the strategies, namely: excellence and exceptionality; broad and balanced curriculum; fusion learning; aspiration and links to the world of work; and accessibility and social mobility. It was **recommended** that the Court endorse the suite of strategies.

The Chairman, introducing the report, invited all Members to a briefing on the strategies taking place on 23 April 2019.

It was therefore **recommended** the Court approve indemnifying Members of the Boards against any such personal liability as defined in the report.

The Non-Domestic Rating (Rates Retention and Levy and Safety Net) (Amendment) and (Levy Account: Basis of Distribution) Regulations 2019 S.I. No. 709

The Regulations make changes to the operation of the business rates retention scheme to provide for the retention of 75% of business rates. The Regulations apply to the Court of Common Council in its capacity as a local authority.

A considerable number of statutory instruments have been made which relate to the UK's withdrawal from the European Union. These SIs make technical changes to update English law as a consequence of the UK's withdrawal from the EU. Subject matters include financial services, data protection, agriculture, animal products, food and customs.

- 1. The format of this paper shows the constitution of each Committee, followed by the proposed membership and, lastly, its terms of reference.
- 2. Against the names of Common Councilmen are one or more numbers. A number shown *without brackets* reflects the total number of years that a Member has served on the Committee since first elected to the Court, including 2019/20. Numbers *in brackets* apply only to Committees for which the Court makes an appointment for a four year period, and indicate which year of the period that Member is entering in 2019. (In the case of the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama and the Barbican Centre Board, as well as the Audit & Risk Management Committee as of April 2017, appointments are for a three-year period).
- N.B. Terms associated with membership of the Board of Governors of the three independent City Schools run from July, to coincide with the academic year. Appointments and changes to the numbers indicating service for Common Councilmen therefore take place at July's meeting of the Court. Please note that appointment to the School Boards is subject to satisfactory completion of Disclosure & Barring Service Checks.

Nominations

- 3. Nominations for appointments on Ward Committees have been submitted in accordance with Standing Order No. 23(5).
- 4. Where a Ward chooses not to make a nomination to a Ward Committee or pair with another Ward, the vacancy shall be advertised to all Members and, on the basis of the nominations received, the appointment made by the Court.
- 5. Where a vacancy exists on a Ward Committee, an interim ward pairing option may be exercised (in accordance with the agreed ward pairing arrangements) until the replacement ward representative is agreed subsequent to the election of a new Common Councilman for the Ward.

Compliance with Standing Orders

6. Each Committee or Board, in carrying out the functions and responsibilities delegated to it by the Court of Common Council, shall do so in compliance with the City Corporation's Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and such other requirements as the City Corporation may determine. This includes Committees or Boards with different constitutional arrangements and/or extended delegations, such as the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama (which operates under a separate Instrument and Articles of Government in accordance with section 29 of the Further and Higher Education Act 1992) and the Police Committee (which has vested in it the powers and duties of the Court of Common Council as Police Authority for the City of London by virtue of the City of London Police Act 1839, together with other relevant legislation, save the appointment of the Commissioner of Police).

Terms of Reference and Delegation

- 7. The Court of Common Council may discharge its functions and responsibilities through delegation to the several committees and through delegation to officers, in accordance with the Framework for Accountability and Delegation (agreed by the Court in January 2005).
- 8. Committees have delegated authority to discharge their functions as set out in their terms of reference and in accordance with Standing Orders. Where Committees have requested amendments to their Terms of Reference, the proposed amendments are set out in red text with proposed deletions struck through. The affected Committees are the Investment, Capital Buildings, Police, Culture Heritage & Libraries, Community & Children's Services, Freedom Applications, and City Bridge Trust Committees, along with the Boards of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama and the City of London School for Girls, and the Education Board.

In addition, the Policy and Resources Committee is also recommending a change to the Markets Committee's Terms of Reference, deleting an amendment which was inserted through the 2018 White Paper. This is in order to mitigate against a lack of clarity and some confusion that has resulted from the change over the past year in respect of the Markets Consolidation Programme.

- 9. Lands and/or property in the purview of committees shall be managed and maintained by the relevant committee.
- 10. Committees may also choose to delegate the exercise of their functions to sub-committees and to officers.

Matters of Policy and/or Strategic Importance

11. The creation of a new, or the amendment of an existing, corporate or strategic policy, or other matters of corporate or strategic importance, should be referred by committees to the Policy & Resources Committee for consideration prior to the matter being referred, as necessary, to the Court of Common Council.

Chief Commoner – Attendance at Committee Meetings

12. The Chief Commoner shall have the ability to attend any City Corporation Committee meeting and to speak at such meetings.

Matters of Dispute

13. The Policy & Resources Committee shall attempt to resolve matters of dispute between individual committees, reporting as necessary to the Court of Common Council.

Sub-Committees

Efficiency & Performance

The Efficiency & Performance Sub Committee was created in 2011 to scrutinise plans for efficiency and performance across all of the City Corporation's departments and the City of London Police. It supports officers to drive value for money in areas such as third-party contracts, budgeting and facilities/asset management, and promotes effective planning - both on a departmental basis and for the Corporation as a whole.

Finance Grants Oversight & Performance

The Finance Grants Oversight and Performance Sub Committee provides strategic oversight of the City of London Corporation's Central Grants Programme, including reviewing progress, performance, impact against outcomes, and risks for all grants.

Information Technology

Corporate Assets

The Corporate Asset Sub Committee is responsible for the effective and sustainable management and strategic plans for the City of London Corporation's operational property portfolio; this includes the monitoring of capital projects, acquisitions and disposals, and the upkeep, maintenance and, where appropriate, furnishing for operational properties (including the Guildhall Complex). In addition, the Sub Committee is responsible for strategies, performance, and monitoring initiatives in relation to energy usage, and for monitoring and advising on bids for Heritage Lottery funding.

I have significant experience for this: An accountant by training, I have successfully turned around two businesses in the last 10 years – latterly as CEO. I previously served as a special constable for 12 years.

<u>Item 13 (q) TWO Members on the Barbican Centre Board</u>

George Abrahams

As Members may know as well as being a lover of the arts in most if not all of its forms, I also bring my business and commercial experience to the table.

I have hands on experience in business Start Ups, turn around and managed shutdowns.

I tick at least 6 of the 8 bullet points on the criteria requested by the Barbican Centre as well as the GSMD. I am commercially minded and believe in pushing the boundaries of art forms but not at the total expense of benefactors and self funding should play its part.

I would hope my experience would be beneficial to both committees.

Deputy Kevin Everett

In asking for Members' support, I would like to outline my experience which will be of assistance to the work of the Board. I served as Chairman of the Development Board of the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (RADA) during the Chairmanship of the Academy of Lord Richard Attenborough. I have been on the Board of the GSMD for 5 years sitting on the Finance and Remuneration Committees. Culture and Arts are behind London being the greatest City in the world, we need to maintain that position. It is my intention to make Culture a key theme next year and shine a light on how the Barbican is a critical part of the City's and the United Kingdom's cultural offering.

Item 13 (s) EIGHT Members on the Standards Committee

Randall Anderson

I am running for the Standards Committee because I would like to assist the committee to achieve the correct balance between strong adherence to standards and democratic representation of the people of the City. The standards regime brought into effect by the Localism Act 2011 provides extensive authority for local governments to provide dispensations tailored to their unique circumstances. The City has a unique democratic structure and therefore needs a unique set of dispensations. These should certainly continue to uphold our values on conflict of interest, but they must also ensure representation.

*Christopher Boden

The City Corporation is an anachronistic anomaly in Local Government. We survive and prosper by making ourselves useful and relevant, to the City and beyond. Transparent maintenance of the highest standards of Member behaviour is crucial if we are to fend off those who'd be only too keen to see the Corporation abolished. I trust that I've served on the Standards Committee with honesty, with fairness and without prejudice. I'm also the Standards Committee Vice-Chairman for the District Council where I live, providing the Corporation's Standards Committee with a helpful if different perspective when dealing with matters of Member conduct.

Mark Bostock

We all know about the Standards Committee's problems, which have been entirely of its own making. I believe that a fresh approach is needed to the work of this committee. If elected to it, I am willing to spend the time needed to get things right.

Henry Colthurst

Conflicts must be managed transparently. Illegal behaviour should be appropriately sanctioned. But whatever our individual views on any topic, it is critically important that elected representatives should feel able to exercise the fundamental right of free speech for which many of our fathers and grandfathers gave their lives. I would like to bring independence of judgment, pragmatism of approach and hopefully a chunk of common sense to workings of the Standards Committee.

Mary Durcan

I've been a Member for two years and now believe it is time to widen my horizons and become involved with the workings and policies of the Corporation. I was a senior manager in a large NHS institution with responsibility for budgets and staff. I was also a magistrate for 30 years. I am sure that my experience will assist in my understanding of the high standards of conduct required by Members. I believe in working collegiately and challenging decisions and ideas where necessary. I am enthusiastic about making a constructive contribution to the work of the Standards Committee and would welcome your support.

*Michael Hudson

In common with the Chairman and several other members of the Standards Committee I am resigning and seeking re-election. There have been criticisms of the Standards Committee in the Court and this step gives the Court an opportunity to express confidence in Committee members or elect others in whom they do have confidence.

I hope I have the confidence of the Court and that you will re-elect me.

I have experience hearing complaints against Members and of representing clients before Disciplinary panels. I have also used my knowledge of the standards regime (which is based on statute) drafting dispensation applications.

*Deputy Jamie Ingham Clark

I have served the Standards Committee for the last three years with a 100% attendance record, despite the unusually busy time for the committee. During my career as a compliance officer I have been very cognisant of the need to interpret the applicable laws, rules and regulations in an unbiased way and to apply them fairly. In that time, I have also recognised the need to be scrupulous in following due process. This experience I have applied in your Standards Committee and I now seek a renewed term of office to exercise the Court's terms of reference for that Committee.

Vivienne Littlechild

I have served on the Court for 17 years. I was a Magistrate for 12 years. I worked in law for 30+ years, mostly in criminal law but managed other matters such as family issues. I have also been a Samaritan. I currently Chair the Guildhall School of Music & Drama and previously chaired Culture, Heritage & Libraries. I believe I would be able to contribute appropriately on Standards and my experience would serve me well on Standards.

Natasha Lloyd-Owen

I am seeking election because I believe the activities of the Standards Committee over the next four years present a crucial opportunity to reduce the anxiety and uncertainty that many members feel around the dispensation policy and to secure the confidence of residents, who expect that their elected representatives will be able to speak and vote on local issues.

I would relish the opportunity to use my skills and experience as a barrister (interpreting legislation, and representing the interests of others whilst operating within a code of conduct) to contribute to and reform the committee's work at this pivotal time.

*Oliver Lodge

In the light of widely-circulated and persistent criticism of the Standards Committee and of me personally, along with many other members of the Committee, I have decided to stand down and offer myself for re-election. I am confident that most Members recognise that the difficult decisions which must be made by the Committee, and which directly affect Members, must be taken with great care and independence. I hope that, in re-electing me and other Committee members, the Court will give its full backing and support to the Committee and reject the slurs and innuendos that have been levelled at it.

*Deputy Edward Lord

Serving on the Standards Committee does not always make you popular, but in seeking re-election for two final years, I hope that colleagues will recognise that I bring significant personal integrity to the role as well as detailed knowledge of the Corporation's procedures and the general law on ethical standards in local government. As a former Chair of the Committee, I hope that my experience and continuity of knowledge will be of benefit, as will my pragmatism and understanding as a longstanding City resident of the need to hear local voices, in setting future policy and guidance. Andrew Mayer

The purpose of an effective standards regime is to deal effectively with issues of alleged misconduct, ensure fair treatment for all involved, and to uphold the reputation of the City as an organisation that acts properly, without prejudice to its own. Evidently this has been a difficult year, and we can do better. With some 20 years of experience in disciplinary roles in voluntary and private sector bodies, most recently handling sensitive regulatory complaints, managing and improving conduct policy, I hope to contribute positively to that improvement.

Barbara Newman

During my year as Chief I had experience of dealing with Members in connection with disputes. I understand completely the need for the public to be reassured we all observe our Code of Conduct and the law and, in my 30 years as a Common Councilman, have not heard of an allegation of self-interest being made against any one of our Members. However, in the City's North-West I'm hearing residents feel disenfranchised by the way applications for dispensations made by their representatives have been dealt with. We must take note of these concerns. CoCo has asked Standards to act more permissively when considering applications to speak and vote and I would bear this in mind without losing sight of our Code and the legal position.

William Pimlott

The Standards Committee ought to aid members to clarify their interests in relation to the business of the court, not impede their activities and attempts to represent their constituents. I am standing for the Standards Committee to try and bring simplicity, clarity and common sense to the Standards process.

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Report – Hospitality Working Party of the Policy and Resources Committee

Applications for Hospitality

To be presented on Thursday, 25th April 2019

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

(a) Pride Flag Raising

This year the Pride in London Parade will take place on Saturday 6th July. As in previous years, the Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport's advice to Government Departments is for the Rainbow Flag to be flown for a week, this year from 1st July until sundown on 6th July.

It is proposed that the Pride Flag fly at Guildhall in line with Government advice and that the City Corporation hosts a flag raising in Guildhall Yard followed by an early evening reception in the Crypts. The event will provide an opportunity for the City Corporation to show its commitment to promoting diversity and inclusion both internally and more widely across the City.

Guests would include the LGBTQ+ Pride organising committee, representatives from the City Corporation's Pride LGBTQ+ networks and from businesses and firms within the City. Members will be asked to indicate to the Remembrancer's Office if they wish to attend.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

The host element will be Hospitality Working Party, Establishment Committee and Members with relevant interests.

(b) 200th Anniversary of the Foundation of Singapore

In June 2019 the Deputy Prime Minister of the Republic of Singapore, Mr Tharman Shanmugaratnam, will be in the UK on an official visit to mark the 200th anniversary of the founding of Singapore by Sir Stamford Raffles.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts a business conference followed by a lunchtime reception to mark this anniversary. Following consultation with the Singapore High Commission, it is proposed that following the conference, the Deputy Prime Minister be awarded the Freedom of the City and that this be followed by a small lunch attended by senior representatives from the City business community with significant interests in Singapore and representatives from the High Commission.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a lunchtime reception for attendees at the business conference and a small lunch following the Deputy Prime Minister's Freedom and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to met from City's Cash within approved parameters.

The host element will be Policy and Resources Committee and Members with relevant business interests.

(c) 125th Anniversary of Tower Bridge

2019 marks the 125th anniversary of Tower Bridge. The Bridge is one of five Thames bridges maintained and supported by Bridge House Estates and is of particular importance to Bridge House Estates and the City Corporation given its status as a world-famous landmark.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception at Tower Bridge to mark the anniversary. The reception will provide an opportunity to demonstrate the City Corporation's commitment to promoting London's heritage, as well as raising awareness of the work of Bridge House Estates and City Bridge Trust.

Guests would include representatives from Bridge House Estates and City Bridge Trust, the cultural sector, central and local government and Livery Companies.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception and that arrangements be made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

The host element will be Hospitality Working Party, Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee, City Bridge Trust and Members with relevant interests.

(d) Illuminated River Project

Illuminated River is a project to light fifteen of central London's bridges, from Albert Bridge to Tower Bridge. The project will be launched in July of this year with the lighting of the first four bridges – London Bridge, Southwark Bridge, Cannon Street Railway Bridge and Millennium Bridge. The Illuminated River project has more than twenty partners and stakeholders, including the City Corporation which has provided a contribution towards initial funding of the project.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an evening reception prior to the launch of the project.

Guests would include Illuminated River partners, board members, funders, artists and architects involved in the project, individuals from the arts and culture sector, and others with relevant interests.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an evening reception and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters

This would be a full Court event.

(e) Industry and Parliament Trust Programme 2019

Engagement with parliamentarians within the Palace of Westminster is a valuable means of highlighting matters of interest to the City and its stakeholders.

It is proposed that in 2019 the City Corporation collaborates with the Industry and Parliament Trust on a series of six meetings. Guests and speakers would include a City representative such as the Lord Mayor or Policy Chair, parliamentarians, policy makers and prominent business, academic and industry representatives.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash within approved parameters.

(f) Greenwich+Docklands International Festival early evening reception

The Greenwich+Docklands International Festival is a free outdoor performing arts and theatre festival which takes place every June in Greenwich, Docklands and Tower Hamlets.

Forming part of the "Fantastic Feats: the Building of London" programme, this year the festival will feature its first outdoor performance in Guildhall Yard. It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception ahead of the performance in Guildhall Yard. The reception will provide an opportunity to highlight the City Corporation's involvement in the festival and showcase the City's contribution to London's cultural activities.

Guests would include outdoor art professionals, international and UK based artists, sponsors of the festival, local authority representatives, and cultural and heritage institutions.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

This would be a full Court event.

(g) Iftar following an interfaith group discussion at St Paul's Cathedral

The Naz Legacy Foundation, a not for profit organisation that aims to promote excellence in education and positive integration, are planning an interfaith group discussion to take place at St Paul's Cathedral on the evening of 7th May. The aim of the discussion will be to focus on London as a dynamic and multi-faith city. The event is planned to take place during Ramadan and to conclude with an Iftar, the evening meal with which Muslims end the daily Ramadan fast.

It is proposed that the City Corporations hosts an Iftar in partnership with the Naz Legacy Foundation following the interfaith group discussion.

Guests would include the Bishop of London and other senior representatives from faith communities. The guest list would focus mainly on young adults and would include City professionals, young people representing each of the London boroughs, and representatives from the City Corporation's staff multifaith network and the City's faith

communities.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an Iftar following an interfaith group discussion at St Paul's Cathedral and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

The host element will be Hospitality Working Party, Establishment Committee, Benefices Sub-Committee and Members' Diversity Working Party.

(h) National Houses in Multiple Occupation Network Reception

The Department of Markets and Consumer Protection will be hosting a conference on 16th May in collaboration with the National Houses in Multiple Occupation Network in the Livery Hall. The conference will focus on new legislation, guidance and good practice affecting Houses in Multiple Occupation.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception at the conclusion of the conference. The reception would provide an opportunity for the City Corporation to engage with representatives from across the UK and to highlight the work of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee.

Guests would include conference delegates, relevant guests from London Boroughs and representatives from the London Fire and Rescue Services and Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for an early evening reception and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee; the costs to met from City's Cash within approved parameters. The host element will be Port Health and Environmental Services Committee, Community and Children's Services Committee and Members with relevant interests.

(i) Social Impact Investment Implementation Taskforce

In March 2018 the Prime Minister commissioned an industry taskforce, the Social Impact Investment Implementation Taskforce, to take forward proposals on social impact investing.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts a panel discussion followed by a reception to mark the closing of the Social Impact Investment Implementation Taskforce.

Guests at the event would include members of the Taskforce, the National Advisory Board for Impact Investing, and senior representatives and practitioners from the savings, investment and social sectors including pension funds, charitable foundations, banks and regulators.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a panel discussion followed by a reception, and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; costs to be met from City's Cash within approved parameters. The host element will be Policy and Resources Committee, Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen of the Finance Committee, Investment Committee, Social Investment Board, City Bridge Trust Committee and Members with relevant interests.

(j) 125th Anniversary of the Bar Council

The General Council of the Bar was founded in 1894 to represent barristers in England and Wales. It aims to promote the Bar's specialist advocacy and advisory services, fair access to justice and high standards of ethics, equality and diversity across the profession.

2019 additionally marks 100 years since the Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act 1919. The Act removed disqualification from any public office or any civil profession, including the legal profession, by reason of sex or marriage.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts a lecture and question and answer session to mark the anniversary of the foundation of the Bar Council, followed by an early evening reception and a small private dinner. The lecture would be given by Lady Justice Heather Hallett, who was appointed the first female Chairman of the Bar Council in 1998 and is currently Vice President of the Court of Appeal Criminal Division.

The event would present an opportunity to build on the relationship between the City Corporation and the legal profession. Guests at the reception would include members of the Bar Council, the legal profession, the judiciary, Government and legal sector organisations, and Members with relevant interests.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a lecture, early evening reception and small dinner, and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Policy and Resources Committee; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

The host element will be Policy and Resources Committee and Members with relevant interests.

(k) 25th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women by the Church of England

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the first women being ordained as priests by the Church of England. Many events are being held across the country to mark the anniversary of the ordination of women, including a reception at Lambeth Palace hosted by the Archbishop of Canterbury and a service at St Paul's Cathedral due to take place in June.

It is proposed that to mark this anniversary the City Corporation hosts a keynote address and question and answer session with the Bishop of London, followed by an early evening reception and a small private dinner.

The event would present an opportunity further to develop the City's relationship with the Diocese of London. It would also provide an opportunity to demonstrate the City Corporation's commitment to promoting equality and diversity.

It is **recommended** that hospitality be granted for a keynote address, early evening reception and small dinner, and that arrangements are made under the auspices of the Hospitality Working Party; the costs to be met from City's Cash within agreed parameters.

The host element will be Hospitality Working Party, Benefices Sub-Committee and Members with relevant interests.

(I) Report of Urgent Action Taken: Let's Talk exhibition and early evening reception

In accordance with Standing Order No. 19 urgent authority was sought to host an early evening reception on 13th May to launch the Let's Talk exhibition in Guildhall Yard. The exhibition is intended to encourage people to talk more openly about mental health through a combination of photography and illustration.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts an early evening reception to launch the exhibition. The reception will provide an opportunity to demonstrate the City Corporation's commitment to promoting positive mental wellbeing, as well as raising awareness of factors affecting mental health. Arrangements will be made under the auspices of the Community and Children's Services Committee. This would be a full Court event.

Following the decision of Hospitality Working Party on 28th February, it became evident that waiting for a Court of Common Council decision on 25th April would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place for this event. Approval was therefore sort and obtained under urgency procedures and it is recommended that this urgent action be noted.

(m) Report of Urgent Action Taken: Fantastic Feats and the London Festival of Architecture launch and early evening reception

In accordance with Standing Order No. 19 urgent authority was sought for the City Corporation to co-host an early evening reception on 31st May to launch "Fantastic Feats: the building of London" public events programme and the London Festival of Architecture.

This year the City Corporation will launch a major six-month programme of outdoor events entitled "Fantastic Feats: the Building of London". The launch of Fantastic Feats coincides with the London Festival of Architecture, an annual month-long architectural festival taking place in June. The Festival is the world's largest annual architectural event.

It is proposed that the City Corporation co-hosts with the Festival a reception to launch Fantastic Feats and the Festival of Architecture. Arrangements will be made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee. The host element will be Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee, Hospitality Working Party, Planning and Transportation Committee and Members with relevant interests.

Following the decision of Hospitality Working Party, it became evident that waiting for a Court of Common Council decision on 25th April would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place for this event. Approval was therefore sort and obtained under urgency procedures and it is recommended that this urgent action be noted.

(n) Report of Urgent Action Taken: Private view for the launch of the Architecture in London exhibition

In accordance with Standing Order No. 19 urgent authority was sought to host a private view in Guildhall Art Gallery on 3rd June to mark the launch of the Architecture in London exhibition.

Guildhall Art Gallery's main exhibition in 2019, Architecture in London, will explore the depiction of London's buildings in art, and how they have served as a source of inspiration to artists over the centuries.

It is proposed that the City Corporation hosts a private view. This will provide an opportunity to promote the exhibition and thank supporters and contributors, as well as showcase the City Corporation's contribution to London's cultural life. Arrangements for the exhibition will be made under the auspices of the Culture, Heritage and Libraries Committee. This would be a full Court event.

Following the decision of Hospitality Working Party on 28th February, it became evident that waiting for a Court of Common Council decision on 25th April would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place for this event. Approval was therefore sort and obtained under urgency procedures and it is recommended that this urgent action be noted.

(o) Report of Urgent Action Taken: Early evening reception to mark the transfer of the 'AIDS since the 80s' archive to the London Metropolitan Archives.

In accordance with Standing Order No. 19, urgent authority was sought to host an early evening reception on 20th March to mark the transfer of the archive.

The 'AIDS in the 80s' archive is a digital collection of over 100 film interviews with individuals affected by the AIDS epidemic in the 1980s and 1990s. The archive was formally deposited at the London Metropolitan Archives in March.

The City Corporation hosted an early evening reception on Wednesday 20th March 2019 to mark the transfer of the archive. The reception provided an opportunity to recognise the importance of the project and to highlight the collection as a resource for the public.

Following the decision of Policy and Resources Committee to endorse the application, it became evident that waiting for Court of Common Council approval on 7th March would not allow sufficient time for arrangements to be put in place. Approval was therefore sort and obtained under urgency procedures and it is recommended that this urgent action be noted.

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Report – Establishment Committee Amendment to Protocol on Member/Officer Relations

To be presented on Thursday, 25th April 2019

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

At its meeting of 25 January 2019, your Standards Committee recommended amending the Protocol on Member/Officer Relations to clarify dispute procedures available to an Officer who might be dissatisfied with the conduct or behaviour of a Member. The revised wording also acknowledges that the Aldermanic Chairmen perform a similar role to the Chief Commoner in relation to the welfare and conduct of Aldermen.

Your Establishment Committee subsequently considered these amendments at its meeting of 26 February 2019 and agreed to the proposed changes for subsequent approval by Members of the Court of Common Council.

The proposed revisions by your Standards Committee and endorsed by your Establishment Committee provide further clarity to the Protocol on Member/Officer Relations

The amendments to the Protocol on Member/Officer Relations, subject to your approval, are as follows:

Introduction

- Responsibility for upholding the Protocol rests with the Chief Commoner and the Aldermanic Chairmen
- 12) Procedure for Officers:-
- 3(a) If an Officer is dissatisfied with the conduct or behaviour of a Member, they are encouraged to raise the matter should be raised with the appropriate Chief Officer or the Town Clerk with a view to seeking to resolve their concerns informally if possible. This may result in the matter being referred to the Chief Commoner or one of the Aldermanic Chairmen where appropriate.
- (b) An Officer also has the same right as any other person under the Localism Act 2011 to make a complaint to the Standards Committee where they consider that there has been a breach of the Members' Code of Conduct.

The amendments to the Protocol are set out in italics above and are shown in the full Protocol attached at Appendix 1 for Member's information.

The Member/Officer Protocol was last considered and with amendments approved by the Court of Common Council in December 2016.

RECOMMENDATION

It is **recommended** that the Court approves the amendments to the Protocol on Member/Officer Relations.

PROTOCOL ON MEMBER / OFFICER RELATIONS

1. Introduction

- (1) The purpose of the Protocol, which was approved by the Court of Common Council on 13 April 2006, is to provide a guide to working relationships between Members of the Court (including co-opted Members) and Officers, and is in addition to any statutory requirements governing such relationships. The Protocol applies whether such relationships are in the context of the City's role as a local authority, police authority, port health authority or in any of its other roles.
- (2) Although it does not form part of the Members' or Employees' Codes of Conduct, the Protocol should be viewed in conjunction with those documents.
- (3) Responsibility for upholding the Protocol rests with the Chief Commoner and the Aldermanic Chairmen and, when necessary, the Standards Committee in relation to Members, and with the Town Clerk in relation to Officers.

2. Principles Underlying Member / Officer Relations

- (1) Good administration and effective decision-making are dependent upon the maintenance of successful working relationships between Members and Officers, based on mutual trust, respect and an understanding of respective roles and responsibilities. These relationships, and the trust which underpins them, should not be abused or compromised.
- (2) Whilst it is acceptable for Members, particularly Committee Chairmen as part of their leadership role, to offer guidance to Officers, they must not do anything which compromises or which is likely to compromise the impartiality of those who work for, or on behalf of, the authority. It is the responsibility of Officers to provide clear, impartial advice upon which Members may make decisions.
- (3) In addition to avoiding actual impropriety, Members and Officers should also seek to avoid situations which might give rise to the suspicion and/or appearance of improper conduct.

3. Role of Members

- (1) Members are subject to:-
 - (a) the Corporation's Code of Conduct; and,
 - (b) Standing Orders of the Court of Common Council.
- (2) Members have four main areas of responsibility:-
 - (a) determining the policy and strategic direction of the Corporation
 - (b) monitoring and reviewing the performance of the Corporation in implementing that policy and delivering services
 - (c) representing the Corporation externally
 - (d) representing their constituents and stakeholders

- (3) It is not the role of Members to involve themselves in the detail of day to day management of the Corporation's services.
- (4) Members are required to take the advice of Officers into account in reaching a decision on a matter and must respect the Officers' responsibility to provide impartial advice, guidance and information.
- (5) The power to make decisions for the discharge of the authority's functions lies with the Court of Common Council and the properly constituted committees and sub-committees. A Member acting in an individual capacity cannot exercise any lawful authority and Members in general must operate through the Court of Common Council and its committees and sub committees. Members acting individually may not legally commit the Corporation.
- (6) Whilst individual Chairmen are in the same constitutional position as all other Members, having no legal authority to make executive decisions, they have certain other powers (e.g. the control and conduct of meetings) as well as a broader leadership role. Chief Officers are required to consult Chairmen (and Deputy Chairmen) before certain delegated powers are exercised.
- (7) Leading Members i.e. the Lord Mayor, the Chairman of the Policy & Resources Committee, the Chief Commoner and other Committee Chairmen (or Deputy Chairmen with the agreement of, or in the absence of, the relevant Chairman) can speak for the Corporation on matters appropriate to their roles and in accordance with the policy of the Corporation. Arrangements for media interviews and the issue of press releases will be made through or in agreement with the Public Relations Office.
- (8) Whilst all other Members have opportunities to promote the work of the Corporation with the people they meet and when entertaining on behalf of the Corporation, they cannot act as spokesmen for the Corporation.

4. Role of Officers

- (1) Officers are subject to:
 - (a) the Corporation's Code of Conduct:
 - (b) Standing Orders of the Court of Common Council;
 - (c) Financial Regulations; and,
 - (d) other instructions and professional guidelines relevant to their duties.
- (2) The primary role of Officers is to provide impartial advice, guidance and information to Members, and to implement promptly and efficiently the policies determined by the Court of Common Council and its various committees. Certain Officers have specific statutory responsibilities.
- (3) Officers must recognise the right of Members, as elected representatives, to determine the policy of the authority and must not act in any way to undermine that right.

(4) Officers serve the Corporation as a whole and must carry out the work of the Corporation under the direction and control of the Court of Common Council and the properly constituted committees and sub-committees.

5. Expectations

- (1) Members have a right to expect from Officers:-
 - (a) commitment to the Corporation as a whole
 - (b) a working partnership
 - (c) an understanding of, and support for, respective roles, workloads and pressures
 - (d) timely response to enquiries and complaints and the efficient execution of decisions
 - (e) impartial, professional advice and guidance
 - (f) regular, up to date information on matters appropriate and relevant to their needs, having regard to any individual responsibilities that they have and positions they hold
 - (g) respect, dignity and courtesy
 - (h) integrity, mutual support and appropriate confidentiality
 - (i) not to have personal issues raised with them outside the agreed procedures
 - (k) that they will not use their relationship with Members to advance their personal interests or to influence decisions improperly
 - (I) compliance at all times with the relevant Code of Conduct
 - (m) Commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion in their relationship with Members and colleagues
- (2) Officers have a right to expect from Members:-
 - (a) a working partnership
 - (b) an understanding of, and support for, respective roles, workloads and pressures
 - (c) leadership and policy direction
 - (d) respect, dignity and courtesy
 - (e) integrity, mutual support and appropriate confidentiality
 - (f) not to be subject to bullying or to be placed under undue pressure and, in this respect, Members should have regard to the seniority of Officers in their dealings with them ie. they should not engage junior officers in discussions and requests more properly directed at senior officers
 - (g) that they will not use their relationship with Officers to advance their personal interests or to influence decisions improperly
 - (h) compliance at all times with the relevant Code of Conduct
 - (i) Commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion in their relationship with Officers and colleagues

6. Members in the Ward Role

Members will, through their work with their electorate and stakeholders, need to contact Officers to obtain information on behalf of their constituents and others. This is perfectly in order and from time to time it may be appropriate for Officers to reply to constituents etc. on behalf of, or at the request of, Members.

7. Correspondence and Communications

Members may contact (i.e. by letter, e-mail, fax, telephone) Officers to seek advice, guidance or information. Whatever method of communication is used, Members should receive an acknowledgement as soon as possible, but in any event within 2 working days, and a full response as soon as possible thereafter within 10 working days of receipt of the request. If for any reason this is not possible, a holding reply setting out the reasons for the delay should be sent as soon as possible following the acknowledgement, but in any event before the expiry of the 10 working days.

8. Limitations on Behaviour

The separate roles of Members and Officers necessarily impose limitations upon behaviour. By way of illustration:-

- (1) personal relationships between Members and Officers going beyond normal working relationships can confuse/obscure the separate roles and interfere with the proper discharge of the authority's functions, not least in creating the perception in others that a particular Member or Officer may secure advantageous treatment;
- (2) the need to maintain and recognise the separate roles means that there are limits to the matters on which Members may seek the advice of Officers;
- (3) relationships with particular individuals should not be such as to create a suspicion/perception that an Officer favours a particular Member above others.

9. Reports

- (1) Chairmen of committees or sub-committees may, on behalf of the committees or sub-committees concerned, make reasonable requests to Chief Officers or other Officers to prepare written reports on matters relating to the authority for consideration at Member-level. Such requests should not seek confidential information (e.g. relating to case work or personal details of applicants for services).
- (2) Any disagreement relating to such a request (e.g. if the Chief Officer concerned considers that the cost of providing the information or the nature of the request is unreasonable) should be referred to the Town Clerk.

10. Members' Access to Documents and Information

- (1) Members' rights of access to documents and information are governed by the common law and statute. Members have such access to documents and information that is reasonably necessary to enable them properly to perform their duties as elected representatives.
- (2) Generally, information should, therefore, be made available to Members on request unless there is a justifiable legal or other reason for declining access.
- (3) Standing Order No. 42 sets out the detail on Members' access to documents.

(4) If the information is not readily available or will require significant resources to produce, Officers should seek the guidance of their Chief Officer before taking steps to provide information that has been requested.

11. Other Members of Corporation Committees

Co-opted Members of the various committees, the Verderers serving on the Epping Forest & Commons Committee and the Independent Members of the Standards Committee are entitled to receive documents and information relating to their appointments in the same way as if they were elected Members.

12. Dispute Procedures

- (1) The overriding objective in any dispute is to achieve a satisfactory resolution through informal channels. However, it has to be recognised that this might not always be possible.
- (2) Procedure for Members:-
 - (a) If a Member is dissatisfied with the conduct, behaviour or performance of an Officer, the matter should be raised with the appropriate Chief Officer.
 - (b) If the employee concerned is a Chief Officer, the matter should be raised with the Town Clerk. (In the case of the Town Clerk there is a separate procedure.)
 - (c) If the matter cannot be resolved informally, it may be necessary to resort to the Corporation's Disciplinary Procedure.

(3) Procedure for Officers:-

- (a) If an Officer is dissatisfied with the conduct or behaviour of a Member, they are encouraged to raise the matter should be raised with the appropriate Chief Officer or the Town Clerk with a view to seeking to resolve their concerns informally if possible. This may result in the matter being referred to the Chief Commoner or one of the Aldermanic Chairmen where appropriate.
- (a)(b) An Officer also has the same right as any other person under the Localism Act 2011 to make a complaint to the Standards Committee where they consider that there has been a breach of the Members' Code of Conduct.

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Report – Education Board

Appointment of Governor to Prior Weston Primary School

To be presented on Thursday, 25th April 2019

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The City of London Corporation holds responsibility for the appointment of a number of Governors to the several City Academies, as well as a number of other schools and educational institutions.

Your Education Board has recently considered one of these vacancies and recommends that the Court of Common Council grants approval to reappoint Jeremy Mayhew CC to the Board of Governors of Prior Weston Primary School.

RECOMMENDATION

We **recommend** that:

• Jeremy Mayhew be appointed to the Board of Governors of Prior Weston Primary School for a term of four years, expiring on 24 April 2023.

MAIN REPORT

Background

- 1. The Education Board was brought into being at the meeting of the Court of Common Council on 1st May 2014, where it was granted a remit to oversee the City of London Corporation's education portfolio and the implementation of the City of London Education Strategy 2013-2015.
- 2. Part of the Education Board's remit is to be responsible for the oversight and monitoring of the City of London's sponsorship of its Academies, including recommending to the Court of Common Council the appointment of Governors. Similarly, the Education Board is responsible for recommending to the Court of Common Council candidates for appointment as the City of London Corporation's representative on school governing bodies where nomination rights are granted, and which do not fall within the remit of any other committee.

Current position

- 3. Jeremy Mayhew CC had been appointed to the Board of Governors of Prior Weston Primary School in Islington by the Court of Common Council in September 2014 for a term ending 1 February 2019. Following an expression of his willingness to stand for a further period, the Prior Weston Primary School Board of Governors recommended the reappointment of Jeremy Mayhew CC for a four-year term at its February 2019 meeting, noting that Jeremy Mayhew CC provided invaluable financial input and acted as a key source of communication with the City of London Corporation.
- 4. The vacancy was considered by the Town Clerk in consultation with the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Education Board under Standing Order 41(a). Members of the Education Board were afforded one week to comment on the appointment before it was to be approved under Urgent Authority. No objections were received.

Conclusion

5. This report accordingly **recommends** the appointment of Jeremy Mayhew to Prior Weston Primary School for a term of four years, ending 24 April 2023.
