13 PLANNING AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (Michael Welbank, Deputy)

16 April 2013

A) Bank Area Enhancement Strategy

Your Committee seeks approval for the adoption of the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy which sets out the City's vision for road danger reduction and transportation and public realm improvements in the bank area over the next 5-10 years. It provides a framework for ensuring that works are co-ordinated and improvements are prioritised to make the best use of available funds. A separately printed and circulated report has been submitted thereon.

A copy of the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy has been made available in the Members' Reading Room and we **recommend** its adoption.

B) City of London Parking Service Contracts

Your Committees have considered and approved a proposal concerning the contracts for the provision of the City of London Corporation's parking service and we seek approval to the principle of dividing the tendering of parking related functions into two lots: on-street and off-street and for the re-tendering of on-street parking and for a new contract start date for the off-street contract. We are also seeking approval for the extension of the current Airport Parking Company of America (APCOA) contract for the operation of the coach park and six car parks and the extension of the Vinci Park contracts for on-street parking, vehicle clamping and removal and cash collection to enable tendering for the new method to start at the same time.

We submit a printed and circulated report thereon and **recommend** approval thereof.

14 POLICE COMMITTEE (Henry Pollard, Deputy)

19 April 2013

Appointment of External Members

The constitution of the Police Committee allows for the recruitment of two external individuals (ie. not Members of the Common Council) onto the Committee, through an open process.

A Selection Panel was set up to oversee the process and comprised the Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Committee, Alderman Gowman, and Cllr Paul Murphy, the former Chairman of the Greater Manchester Police Authority. The vacancies were advertised in the press and, following the guidance of our Equalities Manager, we publicised the vacancies in innovative ways, using interest-group websites, social media and email networks. This ensured that the most diverse group of eligible people possible was reached.

All applications were considered by the Panel for the purposes of short-listing and three applicants were interviewed, including two of the existing members. Following deliberations, the panel is pleased to recommend that the two incumbents, namely Helen Marshall and Don Randall, be re-appointed to these roles.

Helen Marshall is a partner in Bingham McCutchen, based in Lothbury. As a solicitor, she has demonstrated an active interest in law enforcement and policing issues. She trained at Kingsley Napley, a recognised criminal litigation practice,

specialising in criminal defence work.

Don Randall MBE is a former City of London police officer who became Head of Security for JP Morgan and is now the Head of Security at the Bank of England. In his application, Mr Randall demonstrated an impressive record of involvement in policing matters in the City of London.

It is recommended that Helen Marshall be re-appointed to serve a four year, non-renewable term and Don Randall be re-appointed to serve a two-year, also non-renewable term. In making this recommendation, Panel hoped to achieve a balance of change and continuity by making two separately-timed appointments.

The two External Members have made an invaluable contribution to the proceedings of the Police Committee over the past four years and we would be pleased to secure the continuation of their voluntary and much valued services. On behalf of the Selection Panel, we **recommend** the re-appointment of Helen Marshall and Don Randall as External Members of the Police Committee until 16 May 2017 and 16 May 2015, respectively.

15 HOSPITALITY WORKING PARTY OF THE POLICY AND RESOURCES COMMITTEE

(George Marr Flemington Gillon, Chief Commoner)

19 April 2013

(A) 150th Anniversary of the London Underground

2013 marks the 150th Anniversary of the creation of the London Underground transport system.

The City of London Corporation played an important part in the origin of the underground network. It was Charles Pearson, a Common Councilman and later City Solicitor, who, with the support of the City Corporation, advocated the creation of an underground railway. Pearson foresaw that the underground would improve the social conditions of City workers by enabling them to commute into London at affordable rates from cheaper, better quality, housing outside the City. In 1854, as a result of Pearson's efforts, a Private Bill for the Metropolitan Railway between Paddington and Farringdon was passed. Pearson continued to promote the project and helped to raise the £1 million of capital needed. The City Corporation also contributed by buying £200,000 worth of stock and sold the required land around the new Farringdon Road to the railway company at a reduced cost.

In light of the City's connection with the origins of the network, and the importance of the continued improvement of the system to the future success of the City, it is proposed that the City of London Corporation joins with Transport for London (TfL) and the London Transport Museum to mark the 150th anniversary by hosting a panel discussion chaired by the Lord Mayor, with anticipated speakers including a Government Minister, a representative of the Mayor's Office, a representative of TfL and a transport historian, to be followed by an early evening reception.

It is hoped that a variety of London Underground related exhibits will be displayed around Guildhall for guests to view following the conclusion of the panel

discussion. These exhibits would be provided by the LMA and London Transport Museum. It is anticipated that the guest list for the reception would include politicians from local authorities who have the London Underground network within their constituencies, MPs and Peers, civil servants, transport and passenger associations, executives from the Crossrail project, City practitioners, diplomats and other TfL stakeholders.

We **recommend** that a number of guests, as mentioned above, be invited to attend the discussion and reception on 17 October 2013 and that the arrangements be left in the hands of the Policy and Resources Committee with the cost being met from within the approved cost parameters.

(This would be a Committee event)

(B) Milton Court - Opening

On 26th September 2013, the City Corporation will mark the opening of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama's (GSMD) new premises at Milton Court.

The GSMD is one of the world's leading conservatoires and drama schools. It attracts over 800 full-time students from 60 countries and counts Sir George Martin, Sir James Galway and Daniel Craig among its alumni. Construction of the new Milton Court premises began in 2010, with the cost of development being met by private donors, Heron International and the City of London Corporation. Milton Court will provide state-of-the-art performance and teaching spaces, including a 608-seater concert hall, 227-seat theatre, three major rehearsal studios and a TV studio suite.

To mark the opening of the building it is proposed that the City of London Corporation hosts a reception at Milton Court immediately following a concert featuring students and alumni of the School. This will provide guests with an opportunity to tour both front and back of house facilities.

Guests at the reception will include a senior member of the Royal Family; the Lord Mayor, major donors; patrons and trustees; the Board of Governors; senior representatives of London's creative and academic sectors; the press; and international GSMD contacts. The occasion is also timely given the current Lord Mayor's commitment to the City as a global centre for the arts and in the light of concerns regarding the impact of funding cuts on the arts sector.

We **recommend** that hospitality be granted and that arrangements be left in the hands of the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama; the cost to be met from City's Cash, within the approved cost parameters.

Annual Appointment of Committees

This day the Court proceeded to the annual appointment of Committees. Resolved – That the several Committees be appointed until the first meeting of the Court in May 2014, and that the terms of reference and constitutions be also approved.

Notes:

- 1. The format of this paper shows the constitution of each Committee, followed by the proposed membership and, lastly, its terms of reference.
- 2. Against the names of Common Councilmen are one or more numbers. A number shown *without brackets* reflects the total number of years that a Member has served on the Committee since first elected to the Court, including 2013/14. Numbers *in brackets* apply only to Committees for which the Court makes an appointment for a four year period, and indicate which year of the period that Member is entering in 2013. (In the case of the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama and the Barbican Centre Board, appointments are for a three year period).

Nominations

- 3. Nominations for appointments on Ward Committees have been submitted in accordance with Standing Order No. 23(5).
- 4. Where a Ward chooses not to make a nomination to a Ward Committee or pair with another Ward, the vacancy shall be advertised to all Members and, on the basis of the nominations received, the appointment made by the Court.

5. Where a vacancy exists on a Ward Committee, an interim ward pairing option may be exercised (in accordance with the agreed ward pairing arrangements) until the replacement ward representative is agreed subsequent to the election of a new Common Councilman for the Ward.

Compliance with Standing Orders

6. Each Committee or Board, in carrying out the functions and responsibilities delegated to it by the Court of Common Council, shall do so in compliance with the City Corporation's Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and such other requirements as the City Corporation may determine. This includes Committees or Boards with different constitutional arrangements and/or extended delegations, such as the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama (which operates under a separate Instrument and Articles of Government in accordance with section 29 of the Further and Higher Education Act 1992) and the Police Committee (which has vested in it the powers and duties of the Court of Common Council as Police Authority for the City of London by virtue of the City of London Police Act 1839, together with other relevant legislation, save the appointment of the Commissioner of Police).

Terms of Reference and Delegation

- 7. The Court of Common Council may discharge its functions and responsibilities through delegation to the several committees and through delegation to officers, in accordance with the Framework for Accountability and Delegation (agreed by the Court in January 2005).
- 8. Committees have delegated authority to discharge their functions as set out in their terms of reference and in accordance with Standing Orders.
- 9. Lands and/or property in the purview of committees shall be managed and maintained by the relevant committee.
- 10. Committees may also choose to delegate the exercise of their functions to sub-committees and to officers.

Matters of Policy and/or Strategic Importance

11. The creation of a new, or the amendment of an existing, corporate or strategic policy, or other matters of corporate or strategic importance, should be referred by committees to the Policy & Resources Committee for consideration prior to the matter being referred, as necessary, to the Court of Common Council.

Chief Commoner – Attendance at Committee Meetings

12. The Chief Commoner shall have the ability to attend any City Corporation Committee meeting and to speak at such meetings.

Matters of Dispute

13. The Policy & Resources Committee shall attempt to resolve matters of dispute between individual committees, reporting as necessary to the Court of Common Council.

14. For ease of reference, the Committees have been grouped by function.

In reply the **Chief Commoner** supported the approach of his predecessor for either morning dress or lounge suits to be worn for such presentations and he stated that this may be a matter for the Members' Privileges Sub Committee to consider.

2) Brian Mooney asked a question of the Chairman of the Policy & Resources Committee concerning the take up and turn-out of the business vote at the recent elections.

In reply the **Chairman** reported that according to the City Corporation's official occupier's database, there were 6,798 potential businesses that could have registered to vote in the recent City elections. Of those, 3,954 businesses actually registered, which represents a take-up of almost 60% of the business electorate. Based on that take-up, 19,712 individual business voters could have been registered to vote. The actual number of individual business voters who did, in fact, register was 15,581. This equated to a 79% take-up of eligible business voters.

He added that the overall average turnout across all the contested wards was approximately 30%. The comparable figure in 2009 was 26%. The average turn-out in the predominately business wards, was slightly less at approximately 29%. There was, however, a significant range in turnout between individual predominantly

business wards - for example, in Castle Baynard the turnout was 16%, in Lime Street the figure was about 50% and in Cheap it was in the order of 38%.

The Chairman concluded that the City's emphasis must be on continuing to engage and foster the links that had been built with businesses to sustain the level of interest and increase the numbers further. In particular to encourage businesses to ensure that their voters reflect, so far as is reasonability practicable, the composition of their workforce.

- Splitting of the previous KPP4 into two KPPs, one relating to the City Corporation's work in supporting London's communities (new KPP4) and the other relating to the City Corporation's heritage and cultural offer (new KPP5).
- Rewording and updating the bullet points supporting each KPP.
- Replacement of the **Core Value** "Opportunity and prosperity for all" with a new Core Value "Working in Partnership".

No changes have been made to the Vision or Strategic Aims.

(C) Queen Elizabeth Prize for Engineering (QEPE) – report of action taken under urgency procedures.

20 March 2013

The Queen Elizabeth Prize for Engineering (QEPE) is a new global engineering prize aiming to recognise individuals of any nationality, working independently or as part of a team, directly responsible for advancing the application of engineering knowledge. The winners, which include the British internet pioneer Sir Tim Berners-Lee, will each receive a trophy, a share of the £1m prize and will be invited to attend an award ceremony in London on 25th June 2013. The biennial award has attracted significant media attention since its official launch in November 2011 by the Prime Minister, Deputy Prime Minister and Leader of the Opposition. The

award attracted nominations from more than 30 countries and the QEPE are keen to promote the inaugural award in the hope of it becoming the pre-eminent award in its field.

We considered that the City Corporation should support this event, which is to be held on 25th June 2013, by inviting the prize winners, together with Chief Executive Officers of the corporate sponsors; prominent City figures; government officials and policy makers and some leading business, academic and industry representatives to a luncheon in the Crypts. Report – Policy & Resources Committee in consultation with the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen Bill for an Act of Common Council: Aldermanic Eligibility

To be presented on Thursday 16th May 2013

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY AND REPORT

- 1. On 25th April 2013 the Court of Common Council approved a report establishing an alternative route to quality for election as an Aldermanic candidate together with a number of other supporting measurers. A Bill for an Act of Common Council enabling an alternative route was also received for its first and second reading. The purpose of this report is to note the introduction of these measures and to receive the Bill for its third and final reading.
- 2. Currently, to become an Alderman, candidates must be a Justice of the Peace or be considered suitable by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for Justices of the Peace for appointment as a Justice of the Peace for the Central London Local Justices Area. The Working Party established to review the criteria for eligibility, considered carefully whether this link with the magistracy should be retained, because it was felt that the magistracy, as a pre-election qualification, had prevented candidates who might have otherwise been suitable for the office of Alderman and beyond from standing for election. A number of people who had expressed an interest in standing for office over the last 12 months were unsuccessful in the application process to become a magistrate.
- 3. Having looked at a number of options, the Working Party recommended that an alternative pre-election qualification should be introduced in addition to the magistracy. Retaining the magistracy will mean that candidates for the office of Alderman will have a choice of which route to go down when standing for election either by being qualified as a magistrate or by satisfying a new and objective set of criteria.

- 4. It is proposed that Aldermanic candidates who choose not to become a magistrate can qualify for election, provided they satisfy criteria which includes their not having been convicted of an imprisonable offence (even if they were not actually imprisoned or the conviction has been spent) or having been the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order etc. This is based on criteria applicable to candidates standing for election as Police & Crime Commissioners (PCC), which is relevant, bearing in mind that the Lord Mayor is head of the City Corporation including in its capacity as a Police Authority (ie: equivalent to a PCC) and similar provisions apply generally to local councillors elsewhere. The Working Party believes that these represent legitimate and defensible pre-election conditions to impose on Aldermanic candidates, who might go on to become elected to the high office of Lord Mayor.
- 5. This change would require an Act of Common Council and a Draft Bill for an Act is attached at Appendix D.
- 6. The Working Party has also highlighted the advantages of Members (both Aldermen and Common Councilmen), together with the Livery, being proactive in consistently identifying and encouraging individuals who have the attributes and qualities to be an Aldermen. Finally, the report submits an opinion of the Law Officers (Appendix E) concerning the retirement age for Aldermen which concludes that whilst the current convention of retirement at 70 can be continued under both existing and proposed arrangements it would not be possible to impose a legally binding retirement age without an act of Parliament.

Your Policy & Resources Committee agrees with the Working Party in its findings and proposals and, together with the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen, it **recommends** that:

- (a) the current pre-election qualification for Aldermanic candidates relating to the magistracy be retained and that approval be given to the introduction of alternative pre-election conditions similar to those imposed on candidates standing for election as Police & Crime Commissioners as proposed in Appendix C, on the basis that candidates can choose to satisfy either criteria in order to qualify for election;
- (b) the Bill for an Act of Common Council be approved in the form attached (Appendix D);
- (c) the proposals outlined for helping candidates to be better prepared for the application process to become a magistrate be endorsed and the production of guidance for candidates be approved (subject to it being seen by the Bench Chairman/Advisory Committee); and
- (d) views expressed about Members and the Livery informally identifying and encouraging individuals to stand for election as Aldermen be endorsed, with the job specification being reviewed and made publicly available.

Main Report

Background

- 1. The General Purposes Committee of Aldermen and the Policy & Resouces Committee jointly established a working party to carry out a review of the critieria for eligibility to become an Alderman. The last time this was reviewed was in 2005/06 as part of the comprehensive review of the Mayoralty and it was considered timely for a further review to take place. It was agreed that the review would include consideration of the current links with the magistracy and issues surrounding pre-election qualifications for Aldermen.
- 2. The working party (whose constitution and terms of reference are contained in Appendix A) met on two occasions and has now concluded its work. The Working party's findings and recommendations contained in this report are those of the Working Party.

Current Position

- 3. The City Corporation's electoral system is unique, pre-dating Parliament and reflecting the City's history, traditions and unique demography. An Act of Parliament of 1394 provides that Aldermen must be "sufficient Persons of the City of London" and an Act of Common Council of 1714 requires candidates to be "able and sufficient" citizens. The Court of Aldermen retains, although does not exercise, the customary right to determine whether a person returned by the electorate as an Alderman Elect is a fit and proper person and qualified for the office of Alderman.
- 4. To qualify for the office of Alderman a person must:
 - be aged 18 years or over
 - be a British subject
 - be an able and sufficient citizen and Freeman of the City of London
 - not already an Alderman of another Ward
 - not be disqualified for any other reason, for example, by reason of conviction for an offence relating to a disclosable pecuniary interest

and must either be:

- a justice of the peace, or
- at the time of nomination and election, considered suitable by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for justices of peace for appointment as a justice of the peace for the Central London Local Justices Area (previously the City Bench).
- 5. Further details, including the processes involved, are set out in Appendix B.
- 6. In addition, there is also an entirely voluntary pre-election advisory process that does not affect the requirements referred to above. The object of the process is to provide those who are interested in serving as an Alderman with an opportunity to meet a small panel of senior City Corporation people

- (including senior Aldermen and the Chairman of the Policy & Resources Committee) with whom they can explore further the role and the likely expectations of them if elected and if they wish to progress to the higher offices of Sheriff and Lord Mayor.
- 7. It should be noted that other than the current general necessity under an Act of Common Council for all Aldermen to be JPs, there is no specific legal requirement for holders of the offices of Sheriff or Lord Mayor to be magistrates.

The Need for Review

- 8. A number of Aldermanic vacancies have arisen in the last 12 months or so. A large proportion of those that expressed an interested in standing were, however, unsuccessful in the application process to become a magistrate. In the light of this, the question was raised of whether having the magistracy as a pre-election qualification, has prevented candidates who may otherwise have been suitable for the office of Alderman and beyond, from standing for election.
- 9. This prompted the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen to call for a review of the link with the magistracy as a requirement for election as an Alderman, including severing the link altogether, on the basis that it could be preventing otherwise suitable Aldermanic candidates coming forward for two reasons:
 - individuals are deterred as a result of the time commitment involved. (It should be noted that there is an agreement to confine Aldermen to minimum sittings which is not a usual arrangement); and/or
 - by their being unwilling or unable to gain approval as potential magistrates from the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee.
- 10. If, for whatever reason, approvals by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee become too difficult, a real concern would arise that either the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee was determining who might become Aldermen or that sooner or later the number of candidates for the office of Lord Mayor and/or Sheriff would become less than desirable.

Options for Change

- 11. In view of the position outlined above, the Working Party looked at a number of options for changing the current pre-election requirement. The options included, amongst others, maintaining the status quo, the introduction of a mentoring process (to help candidates familiarise themselves with the expectations of the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee), the removal of the requirement for candidates to be JPs, the election of 25 Aldermen by Common Councilmen from amongst the Common Council and the introduction of an alternative pre-election requirement.
- 12. The Working Party did not support any option requiring primary legislation. This would be necessary if, for example, it were decided to change radically the election process to one whereby Aldermen are elected by Common

Councilmen from amongst the Common Council. Nor was the Working Party minded to break the link with the magistracy which has existed for some considerable time and still fulfills a valuable role in the pre-election process. It was, however, accepted that simply maintaining the staus quo would not address the issues referred to above.

- 13. Having given careful and detailed consideration to the various options, the Working Party concluded that introducing alternative pre-election requirements for Aldermanic candidates was the most practical and appropriate solution. Advice from leading counsel confirmed that it would be lawful to have a suitability condition and a pre-election screening process for Aldermanic candidates as an alternative to the magistracy, providing such a process was "transparent, fully reasoned and rigorously confined to suitability in relevant respects and in accordance with objective and publicised criteria".
- 14. Detailed consideration was given to possible criteria that could be used for assessing candidates to ensure their suitability for the Office which included asking questions concerned with probity and achievment in public service. The Working Party was, however, concious of the need for objectivity and felt that assessing candidates on subjective criteria such as how successful they have been in their career or in any charitable activity with which they are invovled was not sustainable and would be open to challenge.
- 15. The Working Party, therefore, concluded that, <u>as an alternative to the existing pre-election qualification (the magistracy)</u>, Aldermanic candidates should be also be eligible to stand for office provided they meet objective criteria that are transparent, fully reasoned and publicly available. It would be open to individuals to choose whether to qualify for election by becoming a magistrate or by satisfying the proposed new criteria; a failure to meet one or the other would render them ineligible for election.

New Criteria

- 16. An advantage of the magistracy as a pre-election qualification is the test applied to help ensure that applicants are of good character (it is unlikely that an individual will be taken on as a JP if they have been found guilty of a serious crime, found guilty of a number of minor offences, banned from driving in the past 5 to 10 years or declared bankrupt). This is an objective test which is a principal factor in determining whether someone is 'able and sufficient' to become an Alderman and potentially Lord Mayor.
- 17. Under the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011, there are a number of disqualifications that apply to candidates for the new role of Police & Crime Commissioner; for example, having ever been convicted of an imprisonable offence (even if not actually imprisoned or the conviction spent) or being subject of a bankruptcy retriction order. Whilst the requirement to have a PCC does not apply in London, arguably the Lord Mayor can be considered an equivalent in view of his or her role as head of the City Corporation including in its capacity as a Police Authority.

- 18. This view was reinforced recently by the Home Secretary. A statutory procedure has been put in place to enable those elected as PCCs together with the Deputy London Mayor responsible for the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime to receive sensitive information governed by the Official Secrets Act. To put the City in the same position as the rest of the country, the Lord Mayor and the Chairman of the Police Committee as recipients of such information were designated as representatives of the Court in respect of information covered by the Act.
- 19. Introducing similar criteria (ie: persons are disqualified from standing for election as Alderman if on the day of their nomination and on the day of election they have ever been convicted of an imprisonable offence even if they were not actually imprisoned or the conviction has been spent or if they are subject of a debt relief restrictions order or interim debt relief restrictions order, a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order, or a debt relief restrictions undertaking which covers corrupt or illegal electoral practices and offences relating to donations), would have the following advantages:
 - They would be legitimate and defensible pre-election conditions to impose on Aldermanic candidates who might go on to become elected to the high office of Lord Mayor;
 - they would be transparent, objective and sustainable tests;
 - they would help to satisfy the requirement to establish whether a candidate is able and sufficient;
 - they would not involve any primary legislation and implementation would be dependent on an Act of Common Council.
- 20. Under this arrangement and as stated above, candidates would be able to choose whether to qualify for election as a justice of the peace or alternatively, qualify on the basis that they meet the above critieria. A full set of the proposed qualifications and disqualifications for being eligible to stand for election is set out in Appendix C.
- 21. Individuals cannot also stand for election to be a PCC if they have been disqualified under the Representation of the People Act 1983 (which covers corrupt or illegal electoral practices and offences relating to donations). The Working Party asked for this disqualification to also apply to Aldermanic candidates, which it does in any event.
- 22. In order for these new arrangments to take effect, it will be necessary for an Act of Common Council to be passed and a draft Bill for an Act is attached at Appendix D. If approved by the Court of Common Council for a first and second time on 25 April 2013, the Bill will be read for a third and final time on 16 May 2013.
- 23. In drafting the Bill, the opportunity has been taken to make consequential amendments the current arrangements in one or two areas to help simplify and improve the process. Candidates who opt to qualify through the magistracy route will, in future, be expected to be appointed as a JP in advance of their candidature rather than seek appointment at the time of a

vacancy (there will be no need for candidates to be considered suitable specifically by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for justices of peace for appointment as a justice of the peace for the Central London Local Justices Area). This will avoid the sometimes lengthy delays to the election process that can occur. In addition, candidates are currently required to meet the Recorder of London to gain a better understanding of the role of Alderman. We believe that this is no longer an essential part of the process since there are now other informal methods, such as briefings, available to people wishing to learn more about the role.

Tenure of Office

24. Currently, Aldermen are elected for life (but submit themselves for re-election every six years). The Court of Aldermen has, however, adopted a covention whereby Aldermen retire at the age of 70, which is broadly the age limit at which a person can no longer serve as a magistrate. This is an entirely voluntary arrangement. The Law Officers have been asked by the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen to consider whether it would be lawful to impose a compulsory retirement age on Aldermen by an Act of Common Council. The Officers have concluded that whilst the current convention of retirement at 70 can be continued under both existing and proposed arrangements it would not be possible to impose a legally binding retirement age without an act of Parliament. A copy of the opinion is attached at Appendix E.

The Impact of change for on-going elections

- 25. At the time of writing, Notices of Aldermanic Vacancies have been published in respect of the Wards of Lime Street, Bassishaw, Farringdon Without and Broad Street (although the latter is less well-advanced in the process than the other three). Notices of Elections in these four Wards have not, to-date, been published.
- 26. Subject to Members approving the recommendations in this report, the earliest that the new arrangements could be brought into effect is by an Act of Common Council passed on 16 May 2013 and the new provisions will not be applied to elections for which a Notice of Ward Election has already been issued.

Helping Candidates to be Prepared

27. Bearing in mind that a number of applicants to become a magistrate had been unsuccessful in recent times, the Working Party is of the view that, for candidates choosing to qualify for election in this way, the provision of some guidance to assist in them in preparing for the application process may enhance their chance of success. Draft notes have been prepared based on publicly available sources of information with the aim of offering some form of objective guidance to applicants to help them appreciate the qualities and understanding that the Advisory Committee is looking for from potential

- magistrates. This would be on the basis that the guidance and support would be publicly available. The guidance is being produced and can be made available to those enquiring.
- 28. The advantage of this proposal is that it is a relatively simple and straightforward way of improving the chances of success by applicants to become a magistrate, thereby helping candidates for election as Aldermen meet the required criteria. Any additional advice or guidance that may be provided by Members would be a matter for them and would not be provided by the City Corporation.

Encouraging Individuals to Stand

- 29. In the absence of any pre-election criteria that includes subjective tests such as the success of a candidate in their chosen career, there is no means of being able to take into account an individual's suitability for the position of Alderman or indeed Lord Mayor, in terms of their experience or understanding of the role.
- 30. The Working Party agreed that one way to help ensure that candidates with the experience, aptitude and qualities necessary to undertake the role is for Members (both Aldermen and Common Councilmmen) and the Livery to be proactive in identifying and encouraging such individuals to come forward. Members are often best placed through their networks and contacts to know people that have a thorough understanding of the City, a willingness to make a commitment to public service and all the qualities necessary to make a good Alderman and potentially a Lord Mayor.
- 31. Having a dedicated and consistent approach would help ensure that whenever there is a vacancy there are individuals willing to stand for election that Members consider have the qualities to be an Alderman.

Conclusion

- 32. The Working Party concluded that the current sole pre-election qualification (the magistracy) is not sustainable and alternative options for an objective and defensible criteria and test for becoming an Alderman have been investigated.
- 33. The magistracy as a pre-election qualification is currently a key test to help establish whether Aldermanic candidates are of good character (it is unlikely that an individual will be taken on as a JP if they have been found guilty of a serious crime, found guilty of a number of minor offences, banned from driving in the past 5 to 10 years or declared bankrupt). The proposal contained in this report is for an alternative test to the magistracy as a pre-election qualification. Individuals wishing to stand for election will be able to choose whether to qualify by a) becoming a JP, or b) by satisfying objective criteria that would otherwise disqualify them including whether they have ever been convicted of an imprisonable offence even if they were not actually imprisoned or the conviction has been spent or if they are subject of a bankruptcy

retriction order etc. This new criteria is based on the conditions that govern the election of Police and Crime Commissioners which is relevant bearing in mind the position of the Lord Mayor as head of the City Corporation including in its capacity as a Police Authority.

34. Finally, the advantages of Members (both Aldermen and Common Councilmen) being proactive in consistently identifying and encouraging individuals who have the attributes and qualities to be an Aldermen have been highlighted.

The Working Party's terms of reference are:

"To undertake a review of the criteria for eligibility to become an Alderman"

The requirements to become an Alderman

Chancellor's Advisory Committee.

1. To qualify for the office of Alderman a person must be:
□ aged 18 years or over
□ a British subject
$\hfill\Box$ an able and sufficient citizen and Freeman of the City of London
□ not already an Alderman of another Ward
□ not be disqualified for any other reason
and must either be:
□ a justice of the peace, or
□ at the time of nomination and election, considered suitable by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for justices of peace for appointment as a justice of the peace for the Central London Local Justices Area (previously it was the City Bench).
2. There is no requirement to reside within the Ward for which the candidate seeks election and no requirement that the person is an owner or occupier of premises within the City.
3. Candidates who are not already a justice of the peace for the Central London Local Justices Area must:
give signed written notice of intention to apply to the Advisory Committee, to the Town Clerk within 20 working days of the Notice of Vacancy.
contact the Secretary to the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee to obtain forms of application to be a justice of the peace for the Central London Loca Justices Area. The application should be made as soon as possible but in any event by not later than 27 working days if the Notice of Vacancy by which date forms should have been returned, fully completed, to the Secretary to the Advisory Committee.
4. Candidates who are already a justice of the peace for the Central London Local Justices. Area, bench, do not have to take any action with regard to the Lord

- 5. If no signed written notification of an intention to make an application to the Advisory Committee is received by the Town Clerk by the relevant date, the Wardmote and possible poll will take place within 42 working days.
- 6. If signed written notification of an intention to make an application to the Advisory Committee is received by the Town Clerk by the relevant date then the Wardmote will not take place until all applications have been dealt with by the Advisory Committee and when notification has been received by the Town Clerk of all relevant decisions, or notification has been received that candidates have withdrawn or are not otherwise proceeding.
- 7. In cases where the Town Clerk is notified by the Advisory Committee that a Candidate has not been approved by the Lord Chancellor as suitable to become a Justice of the Peace, the Town Clerk will write to the Candidate and ask for them to confirm in writing, within seven days, whether they intend to appeal the decision in respect of this particular election.
- 8. If a Candidate decides to appeal the decision in respect of this particular election, the Wardmote and possible poll will be delayed while the appeal is heard under whatever process has been set up by the Ministry of Justice.
- 9. If a candidate decides not to appeal against the decision in respect of this particular election, the election process will continue in accordance with the election timetable. The Candidate may however still appeal against the decision if they wish to secure approval for future Aldermanic elections.

Proposed Qualifications and Disqualifications for standing as an Alderman

- 1. To qualify for the office of Alderman, a person must, at the date of nomination and on the day of election:
 - be aged 18 years or over; and
 - be a British Subject;
 - be an able and sufficient citizen and Freeman of the City of London;
 - not already an Alderman in another Ward;
 - not be disqualified for any other reason;

and either

• A justice of the peace

<u>or</u>

- A person is qualified for office of Alderman provided that they are not or have never been:
 - i. convicted of an imprisonable offence (even if they were not actually imprisoned or the conviction has been spent) and
 - ii. the subject of a debt relief restrictions order or interim debt relief restrictions order, a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order, or a debt relief restrictions undertaking.

Note: the proposed new disqualifications are highlighted in italic font – all other qualifications and disqualifications are pre-existing.

A BILL

For an Act of Common Council to -

Make further provision for the qualification of candidates for the office of Alderman of the City of London.

WHEREAS:-

- (1) From time immemorial there has existed and still exists in the City of London ("the City") a Common Council consisting of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons in Common Council assembled and the Common Council have made, passed, ordained and established divers Acts, Ordinances, Rules, Orders and Regulations for the regulation and good government of the City and its Liberties as to them from time to time has been found necessary and expedient;
- (2) It is a qualification for election to the office of Alderman of the said City that candidates must be suitable for appointment as justices of the peace on the City bench and it is desirable to provide for an alternative to this qualification, without prejudice to the position of the Lord Mayor as Chief Magistrate of the said City;
- (3) Section 3 of an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 10th day of September 1998 (in section 1 of this Act referred to as "the Act of 1998") as substituted by section 2 of an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 4th day of June 2001 (in section 1 of this Act referred to as "the Act of 2001") made provision as to candidature for the office of Alderman of the said City and it is desirable and in accordance with the purposes hereinbefore recited to amend these provisions;
- (4) It is also desirable to make certain incidental and consequential amendments to the above Acts and to an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 14th day of July 1960 (in section 1 of this Act referred to as "the Act of 1960");
- (5) His late Majesty King Edward the Third by his Charter made and granted to the City in the fifteenth year of his reign afterwards confirmed and ratified by Parliament did (amongst other things) grant that if any customs in the City before that time obtained and used were in any part hard or defective or any things in the City newly arising in which no remedy had been ordained should need amendment the Mayor and Aldermen of the City and their successors with the assent of the Commonalty of the City might put and ordain thereto fit remedy as often as it should seem expedient to them so that such ordinance should be profitable to the King and to the citizens and to

all other liege subjects resorting to the City and agreeable also to reason and good faith.

BE IT THEREFORE and **IT IS HEREBY ENACTED ORDAINED AND ESTABLISHED** by the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Right Worshipful the Aldermen and the Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled and the authority of the same **AS FOLLOWS**:

Interpretation

1. In this Act –

"The Act of 1960" means an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 14th day of July 1960 and entitled "An Act of Common Council to repeal the Acts of Common Council made and passed on the second day of December 1920 and the nineteenth day of September 1957 respectively; to amend the Acts of Common Council made on the tenth day of October 1663; and to make further and better provision governing the election of Aldermen, Common Councilmen and Ward Beadles of the City of London" as amended;

"The Act of 1998" means an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 10th day of September 1998 and entitled "An Act of Common Council to make further provision for the qualification of candidates for the office of Alderman of the City of London and amend further for such purpose an Act of Common Council made and passed on the fourteenth day of July 1960 relating to the election of Aldermen; provide for the approval of persons elected to that office; abolish fines and penalties upon Aldermen and disapply provisions of an Act of Common Council made on the seventeenth day of April 1812; provide for the governance of precedence or seniority of Aldermen and to amend an Act of Common Council made and passed on the twenty-first day of July 1932 relating to the nomination and election of Sheriffs of the City of London; and make further provision for vacancies among and the numbers of Common Councilmen" as amended;

"The Act of 2001" means an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 4th day of June 2001 and entitled "An Act of Common Council to make further provision for the qualification of candidates for the office of Alderman of the City of London; provide further as to the surrender of that office and the effect of such surrender; and make further provision for vacancies among and the numbers of Common Councilmen".

Candidature for the Office of Alderman

- 2. Section 2 of the Act of 2001 (Candidature for the Office of Alderman) is repealed and section 3 of the Act of 1998 (Candidature for the Office of Alderman) shall be omitted and substituted by the following
 - "3. (1) Without prejudice to the provisions of an Act of Common Council made on the fifteenth day of April 1714 (which provide that candidates for the office of Alderman must be of full age, British subjects, able and sufficient Citizens and Freemen of the City and not already Aldermen but are modified by subsection (6) below), such candidates shall at the time of their nomination and election

- satisfy the requirements of either subsection (2) or subsection (3) below, or both.
- (2) Candidates shall satisfy the requirements of this subsection if they are justices of the peace.
- (3) Candidates shall satisfy the requirements of this subsection if they
 - (a) are not the subject of a debt relief restrictions order, an interim debt relief restrictions order, a bankruptcy restrictions order, a bankruptcy restrictions interim order or a debt relief restrictions undertaking, and
 - (b) have not been convicted in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, of any imprisonable offence (whether or not sentenced to a term of imprisonment in respect of the offence).
- (4) Candidates shall, on the request of the Town Clerk, produce such evidence as is necessary to establish to his satisfaction that the condition stated in subsection (1) is met.
- (5) The Town Clerk may disclose for any purposes related to the nomination or election of a candidate for the office of Alderman whether he has seen evidence of the kind to which subsection (4) relates.
- (6) The Act of Common Council made on the fifteenth day of April 1714 referred to in subsection (1) shall apply to Aldermen to whom section 3A(1) of an Act of Common Council made on the 14th day of July 1960 (as amended) relates as if they were not already Aldermen."

Minor, incidental and consequential amendments

- 3. In section 4(i) of the Act of 1998 and section 1 of the Act of 1960 (Interpretation) the following words shall be omitted
 - "Advisory Committee" means the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for justices of the peace in the City of London;
 - "City bench" means the bench of justices of the peace for the City of London;
 - "the Recorder" means the Recorder of London from time to time; and"
- 4. Section 1 of the Act of 1998 (Interpretation) shall be omitted and substituted by the following
 - "1. In this Act –

"bankruptcy restrictions interim order" means a bankruptcy restrictions interim order under paragraph 5 of Schedule 4A to the Insolvency Act 1986 or any reenactment thereof;

"bankruptcy restrictions order" means a bankruptcy restrictions order under paragraph 1 of Schedule 4A to the Insolvency Act 1986 or any re-enactment thereof;

"debt relief restrictions order" means a debt relief restrictions order under paragraph 1 of Schedule 4ZB to the Insolvency Act 1986 or any re-enactment thereof;

"debt relief restrictions undertaking" means a debt relief restrictions undertaking under paragraph 7 of Schedule 4ZB to the Insolvency Act 1986 or any reenactment thereof;

"imprisonable offence" means an offence -

- (a) for which a person who has attained the age of 18 years may be sentenced to a term of imprisonment, or
- (b) for which, in the case of such a person, the sentence is fixed by law as life imprisonment;

"interim debt relief restrictions order" means an interim debt relief restrictions order under paragraph 5 of Schedule 4ZB to the Insolvency Act 1986 or any reenactment thereof; and

"Town Clerk" shall have the meaning set out in Section 4 (Amendment to Procedures for the Election of Aldermen, etc.)."

- 5. Section 4 of the Act of 1960 (Aldermen As to holding of Wardmote) (substituted by section 4(2) of the Act of 2001) shall be omitted and substituted by the following
 - "4. Within forty-two working days next after the holding of such Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen as is referred to in section 3, or in the case of an offer to surrender the Office of Alderman within forty-two working days next after the acceptance by the said Court of the offer to surrender, the Lord Mayor shall cause a wardmote to be summoned and held for the election of an able and sufficient Citizen and Freeman of the said City (either not being an Alderman or being an Alderman to whom section 3A(1) relates) and meeting the condition set out in section 3(1) (Candidature for the Office of Alderman) (as substituted) of an Act of Common Council made and passed on the 10th day of September 1998 to be Alderman of the ward wherein a vacancy for the said Office has arisen as aforesaid and the Lord Mayor shall return such person so elected as aforesaid to the first Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen holden next after seven clear days following such election."
- 6. Section 4A of the Act of 1960 (Provision as to periods for the purposes of Section 4) (substituted by section 4(3) of the Act of 2001) shall be omitted and substituted by the following
 - "4A. In section 4 "working days" shall exclude Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays (whether of a recurring nature or permitted nationally for any specific reason)."

7. Section 4B of the Act of 1960 (Aldermen – as to holding of Wardmote - Supplementary) (inserted by section 4(iv) of the Act of 1998) is repealed.

Commencement and transitional provisions

- 8. (1) Subject to subsections (2) and (3) below, the provisions of this Act shall come into force on the day on which it is made and passed as an Act of Common Council ("the commencement date").
 - (2) The provisions of this Act shall apply to any election for which a precept has been issued but no notice of ward election has been published at the commencement date, except that the period of forty-two working days referred to in section 4 of the Act of 1960 (as substituted by section 5 of this Act), being the period within which the Lord Mayor shall cause a wardmote to be summoned and held, shall commence on the commencement date and the said section 4 shall be construed accordingly.
 - (3) The provisions of this Act shall not apply to any election for which a notice of ward election has been published at the commencement date, but instead any such election shall be conducted as if this Act had not been made and passed as an Act of Common Council.

Retirement Age and Six-yearly Elections for Aldermen of the City of London

Opinion of the Law Officers

- 1. At their meeting on 11 February, 2012, the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen resolved to introduce a pre-election qualification for the office of Alderman as an alternative to the existing requirement that candidates for the office of Alderman must be considered suitable by the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Committee for appointment as a justice of the peace in the City. The alternative pre-election qualification, which will be introduced by Act of Common Council, requires candidates, by application to the Town Clerk, to demonstrate that they satisfy probity and public service requirements which are relevant to the office of Alderman.
- 2. The current convention of a retirement age of 70 for Aldermen is linked to service as a magistrate. The main purpose of this convention is to maintain a reasonable flow of candidates for the office of Lord Mayor. The introduction of an alternative qualification thus raises the question whether a retirement age of 70 can be introduced for all Aldermen, regardless of the route by which they qualified for office.
- 3. Another convention of the Court of Aldermen is that Aldermen surrender office every six years and may seek re-election. The purpose of this convention is to maintain the democratic legitimacy and accountability of the office.
- 4. Aldermen have always held office for life except for a brief period from 1377 to 1394 when a Charter of Edward II declared that aldermen serve for only one year and a later Charter of Richard II provided that they may be re-elected annually. An Act of Parliament of 1394 reinstated the old custom, providing that Aldermen cannot be removed from office "without good and reasonable cause". It is considered that the power of removal conferred by the Act is limited to removal of individual aldermen who fail to meet expected standards of probity or conduct and does not extend to introducing, by Act of Common Council or binding contract, a compulsory retirement age requiring aldermen to resign at a particular age or a requirement to surrender office every six years. Such requirements could only be introduced by a further Act of Parliament.
- 5. Currently, newly-elected Aldermen are asked to sign a letter which confirms that they have read and understood the conventions of the Court of Aldermen. It has been suggested that this position could be strengthened in relation to the conventions referred to above by requesting instead a signed irrevocable deed by which the Alderman resigns on a future date, being the Alderman's 70th birthday. The deed would also commit the Alderman to surrender his or her office at six-yearly intervals.

6. For the reasons given above, execution of such a deed could not be made compulsory and, once executed, it would be binding in honour only. However if the Court of Aldermen is of the view that this would be an improvement on the current position, there is nothing as a matter of law to prevent it. The introduction of an alternative test by which eligibility is established would not prevent the continuation of the convention of retirement at 70.

Report – Planning and Transportation Committee Adoption of Bank Area Enhancement Strategy

To be presented on Thursday, 16th May 2013 To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

This report seeks approval for the adoption of the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy.

The Strategy -

- a) sets out the City's vision for road danger reduction, transportation and public realm improvements in the Bank area over the next 5-10 years; and
- b) provides a framework for ensuring that works are coordinated and improvements are prioritised to make the best use of available funds.

Members can view a copy of the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy along with the consultation results and analysis in the Members' Reading Room.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy be adopted.

MAIN REPORT

Background

- The evaluation of the Bank Area Enhancement Strategy was approved in October 2009 by your Planning and Transportation, Joint Estimates Working Party, Resource Allocation Sub and Policy and Resources Committees.
- 2. The funding bid to develop the Bank Area Strategy was submitted to Transport for London (TfL) through the Major Schemes funding programme. Although TfL agreed in principle that Bank was an important area of work, they were not in a position to provide the funding in the requested financial year because they would be funding Holborn Circus and Aldgate projects.
- 3. Officers considered that the production of the strategy needed to be undertaken before TfL funding would be made available and so Section 106 funds from neighbouring developments have been identified for the production of the strategy and their use was approved by your Planning and Transportation and

Finance Committees in June 2011 and this Court of Common Council in July 2011.

- 4. Your Planning and Transportation Committee approved a two stage public consultation approach for the strategy; the first was undertaken in the autumn of 2011 and the second in October 2012. The results of the consultations lead to five areas of the strategy being amended which included
 - specific changes to Lombard Street;
 - the Alleys and Bank Junction;
 - two areas of modification relating to Conflict (Cycling and Safety as an overall theme); and
 - the night time economy.
- 5. The areas are summarised below -

<u>Lombard Street</u> – This would see improvements to the by-pass routes of the north-south lanes to generally improve the safety of the area and make it predominantly a safe walking and cycling route.

<u>Change Alley</u> – The area would be enlivened by the use of art to encourage pedestrians to use Change Alley and it was hoped that this would then encourage exploration of other alleys.

<u>Conflict Safer Cycling</u> – This area of work had been prompted by a lack of provision for pedestrians and cyclists. Due to the need to improve capacity, improvements would be made to some of the streets; however the traffic demands and the implications for all road users would be carefully reviewed as part of the detail design of the proposals.

Night time economy – This area of work had been promoted by concern around cleansing and antisocial behaviour, particularly in Cornhill and the back of Royal Exchange. Through improvements to the design of the area including lighting and provision of public toilets, issues regarding anti-social behaviour can be addressed. This can be achieved through close working with various stakeholders and ensuring the licensing and planning teams were on board.

6. Projects would be delivered in accordance with their priority level (high medium or low) with some of the high priority schemes being initiated through the project gateway process.

Conclusion

7. It is recommended that the amended Bank Area Enhancement Strategy, which can be found in the Members' Reading Room, be adopted. On adoption, a number of the high priority proposals can be initiated as projects and comments from the consultation will be used to assist and inform the design briefs for individual schemes. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the Enhancement Strategy.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Report – Planning & Transportation Committee

City of London Parking Service Contracts

To be presented on Thursday, 16th May 2013

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

Summary

With the concurrence of the Hampstead Heath, Highgate Wood and Queen's Park, Finance and Markets Committees we seek approval for the principle of dividing the tendering of City of London parking related functions into two lots: on-street and offstreet; and for the re-tendering of on-street parking with new contract start dates for both lots.

We are also seeking approval for the extension of the APCOA (Airport Parking Company of America) contract for the operation of the coach park and six car parks.

The cost of the extensions of the on-street contracts by 3 months exceeds the previously approved provision by more than £500,000. In accordance with procurement regulation 25 this increased contract value must be approved by the Spending Committee, the Committee(s) which considered the Detailed Options Appraisal or Tender Evaluation Report and the Court of Common Council.

The Markets Committee will consider this report at their meeting after the Court papers have been dispatched and its Chairman will update the Court should there be any relevant amendments.

Recommendations

We recommend that approval be given to the:-

- 1. principle of dividing the tendering of parking related functions into two lots: onstreet and off-street, and approving the re-tendering of on-street parking with a new contract start date of 1 March 2014 and 1 December 2014 for off-street contract, and agree the evaluation criteria to be applied in the selection process of 60% Quality and 40% Price for the on-street parking contract;
- 2. extension of the Vinci Park contracts for on-street parking, vehicle clamping & removal and cash collection for a further three months from 30 November 2013 to 28 February 2014; and
- 3. extension of the APCOA contract for the operation of the coach park and six car parks (including Smithfield) from 30 November 2013 to 30 November 2014.

Main Report

Background

- 1. The City of London operates a number of parking-related services, typically provided under separate contracts by a number of different specialist parking service providers. These include:
 - On-street parking enforcement by civil enforcement officers (previously known as parking attendants);
 - On-street clamp and removal of illegally parked vehicles;
 - Cash collection, counting and banking from on-street Pay & Display equipment;
 - Cash collection and enforcement of car parks on Hampstead Heath;
 - Operation of six off-street public car parks and one coach park;
 - Operation of the Barbican Centre car park;
 - Provision and maintenance of car park barrier equipment
- 2. The overall value of these services is in the region of £4.4m pa, with responsibility for delivering them spread across various City departments. The respective contracts have previously been competitively tendered, but typically in separate tender exercises, with five contractors now employed across eight contracts.
- 3. Given this background, a PP2P assessment under the Soft Facilities Management Category Board was conducted to consider whether economies of scale can be made by bringing some or all of these contracts together.

Procurement Strategy

4. In order to facilitate the PP2P review process, the end dates to all these contracts (except barrier equipment maintenance) were harmonised to expire on 30 November 2013. However, after reviewing the market for these services, it is now thought unlikely that bringing all these contracts together into one comprehensive parking contract will deliver best value because very few companies typically provide this breadth of service. For example, NCP used to undertake both on-street enforcement and car park management functions, but then they decided to divide the services into two completely separate companies (NCP and NSL).

5. Taking this into account, it is recommended that these services be retendered in two lots, focusing on on-street and off-street services respectively, namely:

Lot 1

- On-street parking enforcement
- On-street vehicle clamp & removal
- On-street cash collection
- Hampstead Heath cash collection

Lot 2

- DBE's coach and six car parks (including Smithfield)
- Barbican Centre car park
- DBE car park barrier equipment
- Barbican Centre car park barrier equipment
- 6. Although it had been intended to run these tenders concurrently, Lot 2 is still subject to a number of unknowns that currently prevent the tender itself moving forward. These key unknowns include:
 - The car park barrier equipment is now past its working life and starting to fail, but the process to scope the requirements of the new equipment, in particular the Barbican Centre's integrated ticketing system, needs to be undertaken.
 - An overall review of DBE's provision of car parks is about to start, involving the Chamberlain's, City Surveyor's and Markets departments. This will cover questions of viability, profitability, policy provision and longterm redevelopment, and will examine whether the City Corporation should even operate public car parks at all.
 - The City Surveyor is considering closing Whites Row car park as part of the redevelopment of the London Fruit & Wool Exchange, and its future should ideally be resolved before tendering. The potential for redeveloping other car park sites will also need to be considered, along with the transport policy implications of reduced car park provision.
- 7. Given the lengthy prescribed timescale necessary to complete an EU tender (approximately 4 months), and an assessment of the City Corporation's Committee approval requirements, more time is required to complete the retender of both Lots. For Lot 1, a three month extension of the on-street services provided by Vinci Park would provide sufficient time to retender and mobilise the new contract. However, for Lot 2, further additional time is required to allow for the scope of services to be fully defined.

Options

- 8. Three options were considered including:
 - Extend all the contracts by the same duration, and retender them together at a later date;
 - Tender Lot 1 (on street) now; retender Lot 2 (off street) later; and
 - Tender all DBE's current contracts now; tender Barbican Centre later

It is recommended that the second option represents best value to the City Corporation as stated in paragraph 10 below.

Tender Lot 1 (on-street) now; retender Lot 2 (off street) later

9. This would allow the potential savings from Lot 1 to be realised earlier, and it would provide the necessary time to appropriately scope the Lot 2 services, before retendering those together. Of all the synergies between the services, the greatest possibilities are likely to be made from combining the Lot 2 services between DBE and the Barbican Centre. This principle was demonstrated when DBE took over operational management of Smithfield car park on behalf of the Markets Department and operational synergies and contractual savings were made as a result. Therefore, this is the course of action recommended.

Proposals

- 10. In order for the contract to continue, work is already underway within DBE, the Comptroller & City Solicitor's Dept and the PP2P team in order to meet the objective of retendering the Lot 1 services immediately, albeit the contracts with Vinci Park require a further three months beyond the current contract expiry date of 30 November 2013 in order for the tender to be awarded and the new contract mobilised. The tenders will be evaluated on the basis of 60% Quality and 40% Price weighting.
- 11. For Lot 2, the process for resolving the issues noted above is expected to take several months, and a report to Committees outlining the results of the overall review of car parking provision is expected to be brought forward in the Autumn. At that point, a full retender for the combined Lot 2 services would take place.
- 12. In addition, the contract for management of the City's public car parks with Apcoa needs to be extended for up to 12 months. The exact period will be set once the timetable for the car park review is known, but officers will seek to extend the contract under identical terms and conditions as at present, in negotiation with Apcoa. The contract contains a clause to permit an extension of up to five years beyond the initial contract term, which was previously used to enable the current contract term to expire on 30 November 2013. It does not include an option to further extend beyond this period, so an extension will require a waiver of the City's Procurement regulations.
- 13. The extensions sought are the minimum periods which are currently believed to be necessary to achieve the seeking of Best Value bids for each of the two proposed Lots.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

- 14. The proposed strategy is anticipated to deliver efficiency savings and provide long term value for the Corporation. All those contracts that need to be extended will be re-evaluated, in conjunction with the respective contractors, to ensure that any available short-term best value savings can be realised.
- 15. The cost of the extensions of the on-street contracts by 3 months exceeds the previously approved provision by more than £500,000. In accordance with procurement regulation 25 this increased contract value must be approved by the Spending Committee, the Committee(s) which considered the Detailed

Options Appraisal or Tender Evaluation Report and the Court of Common Council.

Implications

- 16. The Vinci Park, Apcoa and OCS contracts are to be extended beyond their original term, but by including them within the corporate wide PP2P process, and by undertaking a full service assessment of the City's car park provision, this will deliver the City's best value obligations.
- 17. The proposed extensions to the Vinci Park and Apcoa contracts will have to be implemented by way of a Deed of Variation, and there is provision under Procurement Regulations 15, 25, and 26 to allow the Spending Committee to waive the requirement to tender and to approve an increase in contract costs.

Conclusion

18. The assessment of parking provision in the City under the PP2P approach is seeking to deliver better connected and more efficient services, and the approach outlined here of a two stage tender, separating on-street and off-street lots respectively will best achieve this.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.
