### Aims of your organisation:

- 1) To provide high quality information and advocacy services, tailored to the specific needs of refugees and asylum seekers, to ensure people understand and can access their rights and entitlements.
- 2) To offer a range of learning opportunities and environments which build people's confidence, knowledge, skills and personal autonomy.
- 3) To provide spaces, activities and opportunities that facilitate the development of supportive relationships, communities and networks, and contribute to improved wellbeing.
- 4) To participate in networks, awareness raising and advocacy initiatives which aims to make policy, practice and attitudes more refugee friendly.
- 5) To strengthen our organisation.

### Main activities of your organisation:

CARAS primarily works with women and unaccompanied children who have sought refuge in the UK. In 2016, more than 300 adults and children attended CARAS seeking a safe and welcoming community, and we currently welcome over 100 beneficiaries each month. We provide a range of direct services, which are continually shaped by beneficiary needs:

- ? Adult and families' support: an advocacy service providing support for practical problems around housing, welfare, and employment; home-visiting relationships for the particularly isolated and vulnerable; a women's drop-in with crèche, including ESOL, shared lunch, and workshops; and family activities during school holidays.
- ? Youth support services: targeted support for young refugees and asylum seekers, prioritising the needs of unaccompanied asylum-seeking children. This includes weekly youth club, study group and teen ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages); one-to-one support; a Saturday drop-In with ESOL and life skills; and youth advocacy and casework.

#### **Summary of grant request**

We are requesting funding from City Bridge Trust to provide ESOL for 210 women and men of refugee background over three years. These classes will be attended by adults who are unable to access college courses due to extreme social isolation, a lack of appropriate places within reach, childcare needs, and factors relating to their forced displacement. Our classes support refugee adults into mainstream ESOL provision where possible.

For 48 weeks each year, we will provide one 2-hour class for a mixed group. For 38 weeks of the year we will provide one standalone 2-hour class for women, independent of women?s drop-in. This amounts to 172 hours of teaching over 12 months: lessons devised and supervised by our qualified ESOL coordinator and delivered with the support of qualified ESOL teachers who volunteer their time, and the support of other volunteers. (We do not require an ESOL qualification to be a volunteer in the classroom, but all lessons are led and supervised by qualified teachers.) Within each group session, classes will be delivered at a range of levels, with an overarching focus on developing English for practical situations.

CARAS is based in Tooting, close to London's asylum processing hub in Croydon. There are very few entry level classes available for adult asylum seekers. Crèche provision and an option for women-only classes, which is vital to enabling many women to participate in classes, is virtually non-existent. Our assessments and consultations consistently raise ESOL as the number one beneficiary need. With the support of City Bridge Trust, CARAS will secure this essential bridge to meaningful community life for the next three years, ensuring that the newest members of our community are given assistance into mainstream services and education.

The project aims are: improved communicative English language skills: measured by evaluation and self-reported level of confidence to use English in everyday situations. Reduced Isolation in the wider community: measured by self-reported Isolation, number of friends made, and engagement with the community. Increased participation in mainstream educational provision: measured by number of people newly accessing college places/training schemes. Increased access to services: measured by number of people newly accessing mainstream, statutory services and CARAS' other activities.

Our ESOL provision meets the aims of City Bridge Trust in the following ways. We help people to settle and access services: basic English is the first step to understanding London, access services here, and to begin to find a home. At CARAS ESOL recent refugees have opportunities to practise the English they need in order to navigate daily life and common bureaucracy. Individual support is provided to learners as they move on as soon as possible from attending our English classes to access mainstream education, training or work. Since all local college provision for beginners in ESOL has been cut, our classes form a vital stepping stone to mainstream English for many of the new arrivals we support. We help to reduce isolation: Our group classes provide a supportive forum where people from a range of cultural backgrounds come together with a common goal. For many, the classes provide a rare social opportunity and a forum for building friendships and developing local support networks. We encourage greater participation in the wider community: ESOL participants are encouraged to participate in community events, both our own and more widely; volunteers come from all walks of life and the relationships built in our ESOL classes are often the first stage for refugees to become part of the wider community.
