- 1. Apologies The apologies of those Members unable to attend this meeting of the Court were noted.
- 2. Declarations There were no additional declarations.
- 3. Minutes The Town Clerk informed Members of one correction to the Minutes, where Commoners' names had erroneously appeared in the list of Aldermen.

Resolved – that the Minutes of the Court held on 20 July are correctly recorded, as amended.

- 4. Mayoral Engageme nts The Rt Hon. The Lord Mayor took the opportunity to provide Members with an update on his recent activities, including visits to Leeds, Sheffield, Edinburgh and the opening of Bartholomew Fair. The Lord Mayor also took the opportunity to thank the Sheriffs on the occasion of their final Court meeting.
- 5. Policy Statement The Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee took the opportunity to make a statement to the Court.

The Chairman reflected on the passing of Mark Bostock, Common Councillor for the Ward of Cripplegate and expressed his deep and heartfelt condolences too Mark's family. In six years on the Court, Mark had been a fierce advocate for residents on his Ward.

The Chairman provided an update on Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC) following the concerning reports in the national news, noting that it was a fast-moving issue which would continue to evolve. Of the City Corporation's Family of Schools, RAAC was only identified in the Girls School. Detailed studies were undertaken in December 2022 and February 2023 by structural engineers. These revealed no significant structural defects. Out of an abundance of caution, some further survey work would take place. He added that, at the Barbican Centre, investigations in 2022 did not find the presence of RAAC. Officers had begun the process of identifying other properties in the rest of the City Corporation's portfolio, this would be completed in the next two weeks. Updates would be reported through an officer working group, the Corporate Health and Safety Board and the relevant service committees in the Corporation.

Turning to another matter, the Chairman noted that it was a significant day for the City of London Corporation, as it published 'Vision for Economic Growth: A Roadmap to Prosperity'. The Chairman looked forward to joining Lord Mayor for the formal launch, following a webinar that morning. 'Vision for Economic Growth' called for Government and regulators to work on a strategy to unlock the financial and professional services sector to support economic growth nationally, make sure British firms can get the support and funding they need to grow, secure the UK as the world's go-to partner for green finance, and boost service exports.

The Chairman recognised it would take hard work and the City Corporation at its convening best to bring private and public sectors together. Members of the Court would need to work together with their own networks and contacts to share the 'Vision for Economic Growth' and the potential of economic investment to the nation.

11. Questions Street Cleansing

Packham, G. Deputy, to the Chairman of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee Deputy Graham Packham noted his pleasure in observing the return of large numbers of visitors to the City over the summer, in particular the area around St Paul's Cathedral. However, he regretted the accumulation of letter in the streets which was both off-putting for visitors and a health hazard. He therefore asked the Chairman of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee if she would ask her Committee's support in making the case for realistic street cleaning funding to be agreed for the next financial year, and in the meantime endeavour to find additional resources to ensure that an acceptable standard of cleaning was reached.

In reply, the Chairman of the Port Health and Environmental Services Committee was committed to delivering standards of street cleanliness commensurate with the

ambitions of Destination City and the expectations of the City's' worker, residential and visitor communities. The City's streets were internally inspected as well as independently monitored for street cleanliness three times a year by Keep Britain Tidy. Levels of cleanliness remained well above those of neighbouring London boroughs, as well as within the agreed parameters set by the Committee. Achieving these outcomes required officers and contractors to deliver as efficient and responsive a service as possible within the overall funding allocation to the Department.

Committee Members were aware of the challenging funding situation across of the City Corporation's several frontline services, and had reluctantly agreed in 2021 to a budget reduction to the street cleansing services to meet savings targets and remain within the allocated budget. These changes were made during the Covid-19 pandemic, but it was always expected that there would be a reappraisal once City emerged from this. It was not currently clear that patterns of footfall and visitor behaviours were very different to the position before the pandemic. As a result, cleansing services were being proactively monitored and reviewed. This included adjusting sweeper timings to adapt to differing footfall volumes and more focus on high profile areas such as transport hubs. One example was at St Paul's Cathedral, where following an increase in littering due to temporary seating, different bin placements had been trialled alongside a dedicated sweeper.

In the context of the Safer City Partnership's activities in this area, cleansing officers were coordinating their efforts in addressing wider elements of anti-social behaviour with the City of London Police and the Licensing Team, adjusting resources to address hotspot areas at peak times. The Policy and Resources Committee had agreed £800,00 from the On Street Parking Reserve to underpin the cleansing service and prevent the need to make further savings. Officers were working closely with Business Improvement Districts to fund enhanced cleansing in key areas. It was crucial to ensure that funds were spent as effectively as possible and targeting interventions for maximum impact and the Committee continue to lobby for adequate future funding.

The Chairman extended her gratitude to Members of the Court and members of the public for sending her details of littering, which she welcomed and passed on to officers as soon as possible, and encouraged to Members to continue.. The Chairman thanked officers and the cleansing team for their hard work in keeping the City's streets clean.

In response to a supplementary question from Deputy Brian Mooney, regarding a comparison between the cleanliness of the Square Mile's streets to their appearance ten years ago, the Chairman undertook to raise Deputy Mooney's comments with officers; similarly, the Chairman would follow-up with officers in relation to a question from Deputy Marianne Fredericks querying when the benefits of increased funding would become apparent.

Tijs Broeke asked a supplementary question, asking the Chairman to consider the provision of additional bins in the City, particularly to accommodate an increase in visitors resulting from Destination City. Replying, the Chairman replied to say that, while the number of bins was reviewed on a regular basis, she was happy to have

further discussions on this matter moving forwards.

Deputy James Thomson asked a final supplementary question regarding the problem of street urination. He asked the Chairman if she would ask officers to work with the City of London Police and civil enforcement officers to consider four possible ways to tackle this issue: the use of public protection orders in affected areas, a review of the usage of existing by-laws and if they were being used appropriately or required strengthening, improved enforcement against street urination, and if public conveniences should be opened in busy locations. Responding, the Chairman acceded to the request to raise the matter.

Remote working

Abrahams, G to the Deputy Chair of the Corporate Services Committee George Abrahams asked a question of the Deputy Chair of the Corporate Services Committee, noting recent information that had been published regarding local authority employees working remotely overseas. He asked the Chair to provide assurance that there were no City Corporation employees doing this, and to also provide assurance that the Corporation's current remote working guidelines were providing value for money for the electorate and rate payers.

The Deputy Chair of the Corporate Services Committee responded to the question, confirming that the City Corporation's workplace attendance policy explicitly prohibited staff from working overseas unless it was for specific business purposes, for instance, supporting the Lord Mayor on his visits abroad. She also observed that it was important not to conflate presenteeism and productivity: working from home did not necessarily result in lost efficiency; equally, being in the office did not equate to hyper-productivity. It was important to consider whether offering a working from home policy allowed the City Corporation to attract staff and the Corporate Services Committee was keeping a close issue on this issue, but the current policy required staff to be in the office two days a week, with members of the Senior Management Team required to be in three days.

Mr Abrahams asked a supplementary question, asking if the current policy should be reviewed given the directive from central government for office-working to return. In reply, the Deputy Chair confirmed that the Committee was keeping, and would continue to keep, the policy under review.

Deputy Natasha Lloyd-Owen asked a supplementary question, observing the benefits of remote working in terms increasing accessibility. She drew a parallel with the potential for committee meetings to be held in the evenings, suggesting that this was another mechanism that might facilitate wider participation, and asked whether the Deputy Chair welcomed the principle of evening meetings to support those who were unable to leave work during the day. In particular, she sought an undertaking that a paper on the subject might be brought forward to the relevant committees by the end of the calendar year. Replying, the Deputy Chair of the Corporate Services Committee noted that this was a complex issue which extended beyond the direct remit of the Corporate Services Committee, and which would ultimately be an issue for the Policy and Resources Committee to consider.

Responding to a supplementary question from Graham Packham, the Deputy Chair, agreed to take back to officers and the committee comments around the importance of face-to-face contact for those with line-management responsibilities and in mentoring roles.

Replying to a further supplementary question from Frances Leach concerning the cost-of-living crisis, the Deputy Chair also agreed to take into consideration the benefits of working from home in that context.

In response to a final supplementary question from Deputy Marianne Fredericks, the Deputy Chair advised that she was ask officers to write to the Member with an update on when the staff cafeteria would be reopened.

12. The Court received a report on measures introduced by Parliament which might have an effect on the services provided by the City Corporation as follows:-

<u>Bills</u>

National Security Act 2023

The Act introduces new measures to modernise existing counter espionage laws to address modern threats. It aims to tackle state1backed sabotage and foreign interference by creating the Foreign Interest Registration Scheme (FIRS). This scheme requires specified individuals in the UK to register certain activities and communications they undertake with foreign governments. The Act creates a criminal offence for a person to carry out "political influence activity" where this arrangement is not registered, and the person knows that the arrangement is not registered. The list of specified individuals who must register certain activities includes the City of London Police Commissioner and Assistant Commissioners, applying the FIRS to the City of London Police in the same way that it applies to the Metropolitan Police. The FIRS does not apply to the Police Authority Board.

Social Housing (Regulation) Act 2023

The Act facilitates a revised approach to regulating social housing landlords on consumer issues such as safety, transparency and tenant engagement, with new enforcement powers. The Act aims to reform the regulatory regime to increase standards for tenants. It applies to the Corporation in its exercise of the functions and duties of a local authority and a local housing authority which is a provider of social housing.

Strikes (Minimum Service Levels) Act 2023

This short framework Act enables Ministers to make regulations setting out the minimum service required during strike action in six areas of the public sector: health services; fire and rescue services; education services; transport services; decommissioning of nuclear installations; and border security. Failure to comply with those regulations may result in the loss by

trade unions of their legal 20th July 2023 protection from liability for inducing workers to take part in the strike, and the loss by employees of their automatic protection from unfair dismissal. Minimum service levels are not defined in the Act but are left to the discretion of the Minister, who must set these out in regulations. The regulations must be approved by both Houses of Parliament and are yet to be drafted.

Statutory Instruments

The Environmental Offences (Fixed Penalties) (Amendment) 31st July 2023 (England) Regulations 2023 No. 770

These Regulations amend Regulations from 2017 to increase the upper limit of fixed penalty notices for littering, graffiti and flyposting offences from £150 to £500. They also amend the Environmental Protection Act 1990 to increase the upper limit of fixed penalty notices for unauthorised deposit of controlled waste and household waste duty of care offences, from £400 to £1000 and £600 respectively.

The Business and Planning Act 2020 (Pavement Licences)10thAugust(Coronavirus) (Amendment) Regulations 2023 No 9002023

In response to the coronavirus pandemic, the Business and Planning Act 2020 made temporary provision for a fast-track process to allow businesses selling food or drink to obtain authorisation from their local authority for the placement of furniture such as tables and chairs on highway adjacent to their premises. The Act provided for such pavement licences to expire by 30th September 2022, and this was extended by Regulations to 30th September 2023. These Regulations further extend the expiry to 30th September 2024. This extension only applies to a pavement licence for which application is made on or after 10th August 2023. The previous date of 30th September 2023 will continue to apply in relation to any pavement licence applied for before 10th August 2023, although the holder of such a licence may be able to apply for a further licence.

For all Members of this Honourable Court, together with those across Mark's many professional and personal networks, Mark will always be remembered with fondness, and I am honoured to have known him, as a friend and a colleague.

The newly formalised role of the Chief within the complaints/standards process means that we need someone who is calm, can mediate, is independent of perceived interest groups or cliques and has a strong understanding of the history and development of the Court over the last two decades.

The role has an important internal function, and I will be always available for both confidential and open discussion, to listen and consider ways to help all members feel fully included in the life, business, and activities of the Court which should embrace the diversity of experience that our members offer. A key role will be making sure that excellent preparations are in place for the induction, guidance, and training of newly elected Councillors in March 2025.

There is also an external facing role - with the Livery, Ward Clubs, Resident Associations and many other partners acting as an ambassador and as a sounding board for everything that we do for the City. Report – Policy and Resources Committee Ward Committee Pairing Arrangements

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October, 2023

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

Committees of the Court of Common Council fall broadly into two general categories in respect of their method of appointment: Ward and non-Ward committees. Ward Committees are structured such that each Ward is entitled to appoint at least one of their Members to serve. The intention of this is to ensure representation from each Ward, such that the whole City is represented.

In 2004 the Court introduced the practice of "pairing" on Ward Committees, which allows geographically adjacent Wards to represent each other's interests, thereby meaning that each Ward was not mandated to appoint an individual from within their own Ward to serve. In addition to pairing, in 2011 the Court introduced the option for Wards to decline to fill vacancies either directly or through pairing, and to open them up to election from amongst the wider Court instead. These processes are governed by Standing Order No. 23.

In April 2023, a large number of Wards attempted to make late changes to their Ward Committee appointments in respect of pairing or opening up vacancies, which may have caused some confusion, particularly amongst those less familiar with the practice.

Your Policy and Resources Committee responded to a request to address concerns arising from this and brings forward a recommendation to change the existing arrangements in order to improve transparency. In doing so, your Committee considered a series of options and ultimately supported the option that allowed for the greatest amount of Ward autonomy. It is therefore proposed that the Standing Orders be revised (Appendix 1) to add a strict deadline for pairing decisions to be made by the Ward Deputy; and remove the provision/requirement for unfilled Ward vacancies to be advertised to the wider Court.

Recommendations

That Members approve changes to Standing Order 23 (Appendix 1), with the effect of:

- 1. adding a strict deadline for pairing decisions to be made; and
- 2. removing the requirement for unfilled Ward vacancies to be advertised to the wider Court.

Background

- MAIN REPORT
- 1. Ward Committees are a longstanding feature of the governance arrangements of the City of London Corporation. They allow for each Ward to make at least one

appointment to that Committee, thereby providing a guaranteed opportunity for every Ward in the City to be represented, should they so wish. Ward Committees generally have remits which cover areas of the Corporation's responsibilities which affect the entire City.

- 2. Whilst there has been a move away from Ward Committees over recent decades, the Court has been clear in its desire to retain the arrangements generally and for specific areas. Today, the remaining Ward Committees are: Finance, Planning & Transportation, Community & Children's Services, Culture Heritage & Libraries, and Port Health & Environmental Services.
- 3. Historically, some Wards usually those with fewer Members sometimes found it challenging to fill all their allocations on Ward Committees whilst also pursuing areas of interest or expertise on non-Ward Committees. This was exacerbated by the introduction of an upper threshold on the number of committees on which any one Member might serve.
- 4. A review was undertaken by the Audit Commission in 2002 which highlighted the burdens on Members through these arrangements as a specific issue and, consequently, in 2004, the system of Ward pairing was introduced, to "reduc[e] the demands placed on Members" in a "voluntary and flexible arrangement". The idea behind this was to allow for Wards which were geographically adjacent and shared characteristics to effectively share the responsibility, such that one Member essentially represented both Wards. This was considered to retain the spirit of ensuring Wards were able to be served by someone they felt would well understand and represent their local area.
- 5. In 2011, it was further decided that, in addition to the option to pair, Wards should have the option to open up the vacancy for appointment to be made by and from amongst the wider Court.
- 6. There are, under current arrangements, three options available in respect of Ward Committees:
 - a. A Ward can fill the vacancy directly;
 - b. A Ward may pair with another Ward, and have that Ward's appointed Member represent both Wards' interests;
 - c. A Ward may relinquish the vacancy altogether and cede it to the Court.

Current Position

- 7. Since the 2011 change, some Wards have continued to elect to use the pairing arrangements, whilst others leave their position unfilled, thus leaving an additional place on the Committee to be appointed to by the Court.
- 8. The appointment process to Ward Committees is set out by Standing Order No 23 and essentially requires the Ward Deputy to make nominations annually, following consultation with their colleagues. This process usually takes place in March of each year. The nominations are then collated and presented to the Court as part of the "White Paper" document, in April of each year, when the committees are constituted.

- 9. Since the introduction of the 2011 change, Ward Deputies are asked to provide their final nominations in good time ahead of publication of the Court's agenda, in order that any vacancies left unfilled (and where pairing is not exercised) can be advertised and nominations placed on the Summons in keeping with the requirements of Standing Orders.
- 10. However, just as individuals standing for non-Ward Committees can withdraw their nominations at any time (including at the April Court meeting itself), the Ward Deputy may also seek to make changes to their submissions at any time. Ultimately, the power to determine whether to accept those changes rests with the Court.
- 11. In previous years there had been very few changes to the initial submissions of Ward Deputies and so this approach presented no major challenges. However, in April 2023, several Wards were making changes well beyond the date outlined for response and then further still, after the Summons had been published. This placed a significant, albeit unintentional, administrative burden on agenda preparations and subsequently impacted the ability to communicate the relevant last minutes changes to the wider Court.
- 12. In addition to all the changes that had taken place ahead of publication, at the Court meeting, the Town Clerk outlined two further amendments to the Summons in relation to the Ward Committee appointments. These amendments were agreed but led to a reduction in the number of Ward Committee vacancies available to the wider Court. This prompted 'on the spot' withdrawals of nominations. It is fair to say the matter caused some confusion and gave rise to concern with the general process of Ward Committee appointments.
- 13. Considering all the above, in the interests of clarity, it is considered beneficial to consider the arrangements for the annual Ward Committee appointments process and whether there is scope for improved procedures to be made for future years.
- 14. Recognising that the purpose of Ward Committees is to allow every Ward to be represented, whilst remaining cognisant of the demands on Members and the limit on the number of Committees on which Members may serve, it can be argued that pairing is and remains a key mechanism through which a Ward can ensure that it obtains its desired representation. Therefore, the options presented to your Policy and Resources Committee were predicated on the retention of the ability to pair. The options included the introduction of a stricter deadline; the removal of the option to "open up" appointments to the wider Court; and a blend of these two options.

Impose a stricter deadline

- 15. Whilst a deadline exists for the nomination of Ward Committee appointments to be submitted to the Town Clerk, this is not a hard deadline strengthened by a Standing Order and therefore operates on the best intentions of Members, with late changes accommodated wherever possible.
- 16. Therefore, one option could be to retain the existing arrangements but with a formal requirement for all Ward Committee appointments, including pairing

decisions, to be made and communicated to the Town Clerk by a fixed date. After this deadline, no changes can be made to the listed names in the papers presented to the Court and it would require a formal Motion to be moved and agreed in order to allow for changes.

- 17. This option would reduce confusion from Members around what vacancies exist on Ward Committees and make clear what ballots were to take place at Court, whilst still retaining the Court's ultimate discretion in this matter. The position would also be consistent with the approach for non-Ward Committee vacancies, whereby vacancies must be advertised by a set date, thereby allowing sufficient time for interested Members to express their interest in any vacancies. In the absence of any nominations by this deadline, the vacancies shall be held unfilled until the next meeting of the Court.
- 18. By fixing the deadline as twelve working days before the meeting, it allows for any vacancies to be advertised two weeks before the meeting, pursuant to Standing Order 25(2). The introduction of this deadline would also help ensure that the final Committee membership was established in time for the first meeting of the Civic Year, at which the Chair and various Sub-Committees are appointed.

Remove the option to "open up" appointments to the wider Court

- 19. Consideration was also given to the removal of the provision whereby, when a Ward does not wish to nominate one of their number to fill a vacancy, nor pair with another Ward, the vacancy is opened up to the Court (i.e., the option introduced in 2011). Instead, the vacancy would simply be left unfilled.
- 20. This would have the benefit of potentially leading to smaller committees, going some modest way towards one of the outcomes of the most recent Governance Review (which recommended a reduction in the number of Members on committees, where possible, down to an optimal size of 10-12).
- 21. However, it was also observed by your Committee that there may be a disadvantage where there is a keen interest in the service area and where such vacancies facilitate their participation. In instances where a committee benefits from having additional enthusiastic and engaged Members with relevant expertise, there was a risk that the removal of this option could limit the opportunities of those Members, to the potential detriment of the committee.
- 22. This observation was considered particularly relevant to your Community and Children's Services Committee.

Increase Ward Choice

- 23. The recommendation before Members today, is a blend of the foregoing options, i.e., to add a provision such that the Ward can decide:
 - whether it wishes to appoint a Member
 - whether it wishes to pair
 - to open their vacancy to the wider Court
 - to choose to leave their Ward unrepresented and not offer the vacancy up, thereby reducing the membership of that Ward Committee by one.

- This option would give the Ward Deputies the ability to choose how they feel their Ward would be best represented at a Ward Committee, and so remain most true to the spirit governing the role of Ward Committees. Standing Order Nos. 23(1-6) would remain unchanged, but Standing Order 23(7) would be amended as set out in Appendix 1. Deletions are indicated by strikethrough text, and additions are all underlined.
- 25. The deadline arrangement would also be necessary in order to help provide clarity to all Members as to a Ward's intention, well ahead of the Court meeting in question. This would be particularly important given the additional variable being introduced.
- 26. In coming to their determination, as with the existing arrangements, Ward Deputies should be encouraged to bear in mind the impact on the Committee in question: any decisions as to nominations, or decisions not to nominate, should take into consideration the balance of skills and expertise of Members willing to serve and the best interests of the Committee. For instance, if a Ward does not wish to appoint to the Finance Committee but there are several Members on the wider Court with relevant expertise, it would be optimal to open up the vacancy to the wider Court.
- 27. Members should note that none of the proposed changes impact the current approach to filling vacancies arising mid-year.

Community and Children's Services Committee

28. In coming to its final determination on Ward Committee arrangements, your Committee instructed officers to bring back further options specifically on the composition of Community and Children's Services Committee, for consideration in the usual committee appointments cycle (i.e. for April 2024).

Conclusion

29. The use of Ward Committees is an established City Corporation convention to ensure balanced representation on key committees from amongst all Wards. Your Policy and Resources Committee considered the process of appointment to these Committees and recommends the adoption of a fixed deadline for nominations, as well as an option for Wards to neither fill allocations nor relinquish them to the Court, in order to provide Wards with maximal flexibility in determining how their interests are best represented on certain committees.

Appendix 1: Revised Standing Order 23

23. Ward Committees

- 1. Ward Committees comprise at least two Aldermen together with a number of Commoners as detailed in Standing Order No. 23(3).
- 2. The Aldermen shall be appointed on the basis of nominations by the Court of Aldermen (notwithstanding SO 23(5)).
- 3. The Commoners shall be appointed on the basis of:
 - a. one Member from each Ward (regardless of whether the Ward has sides) having five or fewer Members;
 - b. two Members from each Ward (regardless of whether the Ward has sides) having six or more Members;
 - c. one Member representing a Ward or Side of Ward that has agreed to pair with another Ward, which is geographically nearby, for the purpose of representation on one or more Ward Committees;
 - d. up to two Members on the Community and Children's Services Committee from Wards with 200 or more residents.
- 4. Wards shall choose whether to nominate a Member(s) to serve on each of the several Ward Committees.
- 5. In the event that a Ward's Common Councillor/s does not wish, for whatever reason, to be nominated to serve on a Ward Committee, the appointment can, if the Ward so chooses and the Alderman is in agreement, be taken by the Alderman of the Ward.
- 6. After consultation with the Members of their Wards, the Deputies of the Ward shall submit the nominations to the Town Clerk subject to the following:
 - a. the term of office of a Member on a Ward Committee is one year;
 - b. a Member who has served four terms on a Ward Committee, separately or consecutively, is not eligible for appointment for a further term whilst there is a Member of the Ward who has not served and wishes to do so, unless the majority of the Members of the Ward so decide.
- 7. If a Ward chooses not to nominate a Member(s) (Common Councillors or the Alderman of the Ward) to serve on a Ward Committee, the Town Clerk shall notify the vacancy to all Members and seek nominations prior to the appointment being made by the Court.
- 7. If a Ward chooses not to nominate a Member(s) (Common Councillors or the Alderman of the Ward) to serve on a Ward Committee, the Ward will notify the Town Clerk by no later than 12 noon, twelve working days before the meeting of the Court:

- a. that they wish for the appointment to remain unfilled, thereby reducing the number of Members on the Committee by the number of unfilled appointments;
- b. that the Town Clerk should notify the vacancy to all Members and seek nominations prior to the appointment being made by the Court.
- 8. <u>All nominations for Ward Committee appointments made as part of the annual appointments process (see: Standing Order 21), including pairing decisions, shall be made and communicated to the Town Clerk by no later than 12 noon, twelve working days before the meeting of the Court, for inclusion in the Summons. After this deadline, no changes can be made to such names listed in the Summons and any amendment shall require the explicit approval of the Court via a Motion (pursuant to Standing Order No. 12(4).</u>

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Report – Policy and Resources Committee Appointment of Independent Persons

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2023

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

Following the submission of Lord Lisvane's Review of the City Corporation's Governance in September 2020, a resolution of the Court of Common Council (8 October 2020) had the effect that consideration of aspects of the Review relating to the Standards Regime would need to be taken first and, as such, following extensive engagement with Members, the Court was able to consider and approve a number of proposals in relation to Standards made by Lord Lisvane at its 14 January 2021 meeting and authorised the Town Clerk to take such actions as were required to give effect to the decisions taken and facilitate their implementation.

Members will recall that nine Members of a new Independent Panel were appointed by the Court in Summer 2021 to oversee the City Corporation's Standards Regime. The appointments were made by the full Court on the recommendation of the Independent Persons Appointment Panel (consisting of the then Chair of Policy & Resources, the then Chief Commoner, and the then Chair of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen).

Since that time, the Panel of Independent Persons have met on several occasions to assess, hear and consider appeals against decisions made with regard to complaints submitted under the Code of Conduct. Given that the Panel are operating a three-tier process for dealing with complaints (as advised by Lord Lisvane and supported by this Honourable Court) they very quickly went on to express the view that the size of the Panel should be increased from nine to twelve in total. The Complaints Procedure stipulates that no Independent Person may sit on more than one sub-panel in relation to the same complaint and, essentially, a larger Panel was therefore felt necessary in order to allow for illness or other non-availability of a panel member or for instances where a panel member may need to recuse themselves for any other reason where a complaint exhausts all three stages. A Subject Member is also entitled to consult with one of the Independent Persons, taking the total required on the Panel to at least ten.

The proposal to expand the pool of Independent Persons from nine to twelve for the reasons set out above were put to and supported by the Court of Common Council at the end of 2022, with the Town Clerk instructed to re-constitute the Independent Persons Appointment Panel (consisting of the Chair of Policy & Resources, the Chief Commoner, and the Chair of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen or their representatives) to progress a further round of recruitment to appoint three additional Panel Members.

The purpose of this report is therefore to now seek the Court's approval of the recommendations of the Appointment Panel once again following a recent, successful, round of recruitment and to agree to the appointment of the final three individuals named within this report as Independent Persons to ensure that the desired panel of twelve is achieved.

Recommendations

Members are asked to endorse the recommendations of the Appointment Panel in securing the valued services of Mr Andrew Ayre, Ms Karen McArthur and Ms Amina Hossain and approve their appointment as Independent Members of the City of London Corporation.

MAIN REPORT

Background

Creation of an Independent Panel

- 1. Lord Lisvane's recommendations pertaining to Standards included a recommendation "that the Corporation should set up an Independent Panel composed only of independent persons, and charge that Panel with:
 - receiving allegations of misconduct referred to it by the Monitoring Officer;
 - deciding whether any allegation should be investigated;
 - on the basis of the allegation, determining whether there has been a breach of the code of Conduct;
 - reporting that determination, together with a full report of the facts, to the Court for endorsement;
 - hearing any appeal (the appeal function will of course need to be separated rigorously from the assessment and determination function)
 - after determination, and appeal if necessary, recommending an appropriate sanction, giving reasons, as necessary."

Process

- 2. The Court of Common Council, at its 14 January 2021 meeting, endorsed this proposal as well as the adoption of Lisvane's recommendations in the form of a three-stage process, to be operated by the Independent Panel:
 - The first stage to be a more informal / conciliatory nature, seeking to resolve swiftly those issues which might be addressed through dispute resolution or a conversation and apology (with external dispute resolution advice to be made available to the Panel as it deems appropriate and a suitable protocol produced for such stage to be produced).
 - The second stage to then be the formal Hearing process, utilising the Independent Panel, as outlined by Lisvane (i.e. determination of investigation and breach and reporting to the Court of Common Council for endorsement).

• The third stage to be the Appeal stage, the Panel for which should also include a minority of Members of the Court of Common Council, to help provide any relevant internal context.

It was decided that the Panel should be supported by the Comptroller & City Solicitor, as the Monitoring Officer, including in respect of the production of rules and procedures as time progresses, with clerking or administrative support also provided by the Town Clerk's department in the usual way.

Composition

3. This Court agreed with Lisvane's comments in relation to the need for a membership of sufficient size, to ensure that the sub-panels at the hearing and appeal stages could be comprised of entirely different Panel Members, although drawn from the same overall pool and directed that a panel of nine individuals, ought to be secured, utilising staggered terms to provide for both continuity and turnover.

Recruitment and Appointment

4. It was agreed that an open and transparent recruitment process should be employed, with the Chair of Policy & Resources, the Chief Commoner, and the Chair of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen (or their representatives) acting as an interview panel and empowered to put recommendations for appointment to the Court, with the Town Clerk authorised to advertise and undertake a recruitment process in consultation with the Chair of the Policy & Resources Committee, the Chief Commoner, and the Chair of the General Purposes Committee of Aldermen (or their nominated representatives).

Appointment Process to date

5. The appointment process for the new Independent Panel originally commenced in February 2021 and ran until March 2021. This resulted in the appointment of seven individuals, approved by this Court in May 2021. Following this, a second recruitment round was launched in May 2021 and this ran until June 2021. This resulted in the appointment of a further two candidates, approved by this Court in July 2021 and creating the existing 'pool' of nine Independent Persons.

Panel Size

- 6. Given that the Panel are operating a three-tier process for dealing with complaints, as advised by Lord Lisvane and supported by the Court of Common Council, they were quickly of the view that the size of the Panel should be increased from nine to twelve in total. The first two tiers of the Complaints process (Assessment and Hearing) require three panel members each and the third (Appeal) at least two.
- 7. The Complaints Procedure stipulates that no Independent Person may sit on more than one sub-panel in relation to the same complaint and a larger Panel was therefore felt necessary in order to allow for illness or other non-availability of a panel member or for instances where a panel member may need to recuse themselves for any other reason. In addition to this, one Independent Person may be required to consult with the subject member of a complaint, which then takes them out of the available pool for dealing with this same complaint in any capacity.

8. The Court of Common Council endorsed this view and instructed that the Independent Persons Appointment Panel be reconstituted to progress a further round of recruitment to appoint three additional Panel Members.

Recent Appointment Process

- 9. Following consultation with the Appointment Panel as well as with the existing Chair of the Independent Persons, advertisements for the vacancies were, on this occasion, placed on the City of London's webpages, the Guardian online, Law Society Gazette, in City AM online and also in The Voice Newspaper online, with a view to attracting applicants from a more diverse background.
- 10. Applicants were informed that the City were seeking to appoint a panel of individuals with relevant experience in the private or public sectors and individuals who would both promote and maintain high standards of conduct by the Corporation's elected Members and co-opted Members when dealing with the business of the Corporation.

It was also made clear that an Independent Person cannot be someone who, at the time of appointment:

- has been a Member, Co-opted Member or officer of the City of London Corporation in the previous five years; or
- is a relative or close friend of a Member or officer of the City of London Corporation.
- 11. Members will recall that the Court of Common Council was also supportive of remuneration for Independent Persons recommending the utilisation of the standard rate for public appointments, to help ensure strong candidates could be attracted and retained. The position was, therefore, advertised with a daily attendance allowance of £300 and reasonable travel expenses also reimbursed. Attendance depends on the number and complexity of cases to be dealt with as well as any necessary briefing and training sessions.
- 12. A total of 44 applications were received on this occasion. Following a shortlisting process and assessment by the Panel, it decided unanimously on six candidates to shortlist and invite to attend interview on either 25 or 26 September 2023.
- 13. Following face to face interviews held at the Guildhall (with the exception of one candidate for whom virtual arrangements were made to accommodate a medical procedure), the Panel were unanimously of the view that three of the six candidates invited to interview on this occasion were particularly strong and that all three would be a great asset to the City of London's Standards Regime in terms of the breadth and relevance of their knowledge and experience.
- 14. The purpose of this report is, therefore, to seek formal approval for the recommendations of the Appointment Panel that a further three candidates (Mr Andrew Ayre, Ms Karen McArthur and Ms Amina Hossain) be appointed as Independent Persons. So as not to unnecessarily delay due process following interview, these appointments have been signed off under urgency procedures by the Town Clerk in consultation with the Chair and Deputy Chair of both your

Member Development and Standards Sub Committee and Policy and Resources Committee, neither of whom were scheduled to meet until after the October meeting of this Honourable Court.

15. The Committee on Standards in Public Life had recommended that Independent Persons be appointed for a fixed term of two years, renewable once. The Court considered this at their 14 January 2021 meeting and resolved that a fixed term of office of two years, renewable twice, be adopted for the City Corporation's Independent Persons. It was also felt that the terms of the Independent Persons should, ideally, be staggered, the Town Clerk was authorised to draw lots to ensure that staggered terms can be achieved.

Details of Recommended Appointees

16. Andrew Ayre has 37 year's experience as a Crown Servant in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. In 2011, he was appointed British High Commissioner to Guyana and HM Ambassador to Suriname. From 2015-17, he was one of the Deputy Heads of the FCO's Europe Division and then from 2017-21, one of the Deputy High Commissioners to India.

Mr Ayre states that he believes passionately in doing the right thing whilst listening to the broadest possible spectrum of views before coming to a decision. He is committed to high standards of conduct, fairness, transparency and accountability.

17. *Karen McArthur* serves as a lay member on professional misconduct and fitness to practice panels. The other aspect of her portfolio involves serving on Boards which have a clear social purpose where she has also worked with consumer interest groups and regulators to address common issues.

Ms McArthur states that, whether as Chair or Lay, she brings an independent view and challenges colleagues in a professional and respectful manner. Across all of her roles, she is frequently required to review complex information, often relating to events or activities outside her scope of knowledge or experience and synthesising the key issues. She is confident in her ability to question articulately and separate fact from opinion, identify the cogent facts, weigh the evidence and work through decision making in a structured rational format which is robust. Many of her roles are subject to legal challenge so she must ensure that full reasons are given which are supported by the facts, making them defensible and logical in their construction. Ms McArthur describes herself as 'a professional decision maker'.

18. *Amina Hossain* currently serves as an Independent Person for Sutton Council. In addition, she has worked as a lawyer in local government for 9 years and central government for 6 years. She has a solid understanding of the landscape of local government and the role of the different constituents of officers and members and is well versed in both adhering to and applying the Nolan Principles. Ms Hossain states that she is familiar and comfortable with assessing large volumes of evidence before reaching fair, impartial and consistent decisions She prides herself on approaching her decision-making roles with an open-mind.

19. As a reminder, these final three appointees, should they be approved, would join our previously appointed nine (Miranda Carruthers-Watt, Robert Coyle, Christine Fraser, Tom Ketteley, Amanda Orchard, Gary Rogers, Rahul Sinha, Philip Thicknesse and Attiyah Younis) to form our panel of twelve Independent Persons. Further details of the previously appointed nine are set out within the May 2021 and July 2021 Court reports respectively.

Conclusion

20. The Appointment Panel mandated by the Court of Common Council to oversee the recruitment of a panel of Independent Persons and put forward recommendations for appointment hereby recommend that the three persons named within this report (Mr Ayre, Ms McArthur and Ms Hossain) be appointed as Independent Members of the City of London Corporation.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Report of Urgent Action Taken: Welcome reception for the 10th Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting

To be presented on Thursday, 12th October 2023 To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons

SUMMARY

This report sets out actions taken under urgency procedures in respect of applications for hospitality.

The City Corporation agreed to host a welcome reception for the 10th Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting (10CYMM) on Monday 11th September 2023. Members are invited to note the decision taken under urgency procedures.

MAIN REPORT

The Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting is a significant conference held every four years, addressing youth policy for Commonwealth member states. The meeting contributes to broader social and sustainable development goals from a youth development perspective. This year's event was due to be held in Pakistan but, due to the flooding which has struck that nation, the meeting was being moved to London at short notice. Given this, it had been proposed that the City Corporation host a welcome reception for the meeting.

The 10CYMM serves as a platform for Ministers to discuss emerging youth development issues, assess the current post-pandemic realities in member states, celebrate 50 years of youth development in the Commonwealth, share practical ideas and approaches and identify collaborative opportunities. The London Mayor, the Duke of Edinburgh and the Speaker of the House of Commons all host events to welcome these delegations and give them a unique experience of London.

Members were invited to support a proposal that the City Corporation hosts a welcome reception for the 10th Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting. The event presented an opportunity to showcase the City Corporation's support for the Commonwealth institutions and for encouraging and developing young people.

When the City was made aware of the application, a decision of Court of Common Council was sought under urgency procedure to allow the time necessary to prepare for the event, and granting approval as follows:

• The provision hospitality in the form of a reception on the occasion of the 10th Commonwealth Youth Ministers Meeting, with arrangements to be made

under the auspices of the Civic Affairs Sub-Committee; costs to be within approved parameters.

Measures introduced into Parliament which may have an effect on the work and services provided by the City Corporation

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

<u>Bills</u>

The Pensions (Extension of Automatic Enrolment) Act 2023

This Act amends provisions in the Pensions Act 2008 to give regulation making powers which will enable the Secretary of State to make regulations to reduce the lower age limit at which otherwise eligible workers must be automatically enrolled and reenrolled into a pension scheme by their employers, and to make regulations to remove the Lower Earnings Limit (LEL) from the qualifying earnings band so that contributions are calculated from the first pound earned and to make regulations modifying the requirements of the annual review of the qualifying earnings band. The Government has stated its intention to implement these changes by the mid-2020s and so it is anticipated that Regulations will be brought forward under the powers in the Act in the next 12-18 months if that timetable is to be adhered to. This is of interest to the Lord Mayor and the Corporation as regards wider work on pensions and pensions provision.

Statutory Instruments

The Data Protection (Adequacy) (United States of America)1Regulations 20232

Identifies the United States of America as a country which provides an adequate level of protection of personal data for transfers under the Data Protection Act 2018 and the UK GDPR (also under the 2018 Act). This means that personal data which will be in the scope of the EU-US Data Privacy Framework Principles can be transferred to persons in the United States of America who participate in the UK Extension to the EU-US Data

Date of Royal Assent

18th September 2023

Date in Force

12 October 2023 Privacy Framework without the need for any specific authorisation.

The Environmental Protection (Plastic Plates etc. and 1 October 2023 Polystyrene Containers etc.) (England) Regulations 2023

These Regulations apply in relation to England only. They prohibit persons from supplying or offering to supply certain plastic or polystyrene items in the course of a business: they also prohibit the supply of single-use plastic plates, trays or bowls, balloon sticks and cutlery and the supply of single-use polystyrene food or drink containers and cups. This is of interest to the Corporation as an catered events venue.

The Alcohol Licensing (Coronavirus) (RegulatoryEasements) (Amendment) Regulations 202328 Set

28 September 2023

Prolongs an existing extension of permissions for automatic extensions of premises licences that only permit sales of alcohol for consumption on the premises ("on-sales") to allow sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises ("off-sales"). This easement will continue to 31 March 2025.

The Social Housing (Regulation) Act 2023 (Commencement No. 1 and Saving Provision) Regulations 2023

Brings into force provisions relating to the Regulator of Social 20 September Housing's new powers to set standards and requiring providers 2023 to comply with future arrangements for remedying hazards. Also brings into force a power for the Secretary of State's to give a direction about providing information to tenants.
