22 February 2024

(A) City Fund 2024/25 Budget Report and Medium-Term Financial Plan

The Court considered a report of the Finance Committee which presented the overall financial position of the City Fund (i.e. the City Corporation's finances relating to Local Government, Police and Port Health services).

In consideration of this item, Members had available to them an Addendum, which included a revised Appendix B and further Appendix I.

The Chairman spoke to introduce the Budget together with the City's Estate budget at item 8(A), as well as clarifying a number of elements, following which Members took the opportunity to ask questions on subjects including the introduction of a second-home premium, the social tenant rent increase and potential donations to appeals. In reply, the Chairman said that the charging of second-home premiums was being implemented across London and the City Corporation would be an outlier if it did not follow. The provision for receipt of the premium would be included in the 2025/26 budget following a 12-month notice period. With regard to the social tenant rent increase, there was a requirement to maintain a balanced Housing Revenue Account, and support was available for those in need. Finally, the Chairman said that the Disaster Emergency Committee had not launched an appeal regarding the humanitarian situation in Gaza, and he was therefore not in a position to comment on a donation from the City Corporation.

Resolved – That the Court of Common Council:

- 1.0 Notes and approves the overall budget envelopes for City Fund.
- 1.1 Additional funding is required to be approved for new on-going cost pressures and have been included as budget uplifts:
- 1.1.1 Agreed pay award from 1st July 2023.
- 1.1.2 Net 3% inflation uplift to local risk budgets.
- 1.1.3 £470k for City Fund Adult Social Care and Children Services.
- 1.1.4 £2m central provision to cover assumptions for Ambition 25 (Reward Refresh) – subject to recommendations of the Corporate Services Committee.
- 1.1.5 £210k increase in legal costs to support specialist advice.
- 1.1.6 £330k on-going City Fund support to Electoral Services.

- 1.1.7 £400k provision for possible increases to members allowance subject to recommendations of the Civic Affairs committee.
- 1.1.8 £56k shortfall (split across City Fund and City's Estate) to Occupational Health Physician Services.
- 1.1.9 £59k (3%) uplift to the London Symphony Orchestra grant.
- 1.1.10 £189k (3.47%) increase to the Museum of London grant.
 - 1.2 For Cyclical Works Programme (CWP):
 - 1.2.1 Additional funding totalling £62.7m to address the backlog of works £27.1m, forward plan £34.0m, plus £1.6m towards delivery of the programme across the next 5 years from 2024/25 (Appendix A, paragraphs 22 to 28).
 - 1.2.2 Funding identified from reserves in City Fund, endorsed by Finance Committee in December, to be ringfenced to the programme (paragraph 50). Delivery will need to be managed robustly to avoid cost creep.
 - 1.2.3£25m was allocated to the Barbican Centre, approved by Court of Common Council 9 March 2023 to address critical health and safety needs and to fund the development of a business case to consider replacement of more fundamental infrastructure than is covered in a cyclical works programme.
 - 1.2.4 Any further funding for the Barbican Centre to be considered separately and as part of its own strategic business plan (paragraph 29).
 - 1.3 To address inflationary pressures going forward assumptions include 2% uplift from 2025/26 onwards.
 - 1.4 Savings still to be achieved from Development of City commercial income streams through Barbican Management, Commercial - procurement, and from implementation of the Enterprise Resource Planning system have been reprofiled to (£3.3m) 2025/26 and (£0.6m) in 2026/27 respectively. Permanent savings from previous savings programmes are expected to crystallise by 2024/25 see paragraphs 63 and 64.
 - 1.5 Other one-off pressures and opportunities for transformation in 2024/25 outlined in paragraph 27 to be funded from forecast carry forward underspends from 2023/24.
 - 1.6 Unfunded additional revenue bids (paragraph 26) to be avoided during 2024/25, unless these can be prioritised from savings or income generated from the Corporation's Resource Prioritisation Refresh Programme (RPR).
 - 1.7 Increase the rents for social tenants within the Housing Revenue Account by 7.7% for 2024/25, as supported by Childrens & Community Services Committee on 25 January in order to balance the HRA across the MTFP.
 - 1.8 As in previous years, it is recommended the earmarked security reserve retains £1m as a minimum and is reviewed regularly.
 - 1.9 Approve the overall financial framework and the revised Medium-Term Financial Strategy (paragraphs 17 to 73).
 - 1.10 Approve the City Fund Net Budget Requirement of £201.8m (Appendix A, paragraph 7)

Key decisions:

The key decisions are in setting the levels of Council Tax and National Non-Domestic rates:

- 2.0 **Council Tax** paragraphs 54 to 57
- 2.1 To approve an increase of 2% social care precept, raising c£165k p.a. in response to the ongoing pressures in homelessness and adult social care. This is recommended given the pressures within adult social care totalling £310k p.a.
- 2.2 To approve an increase of 2.99% on core Council Tax raising c£247k p.a. This is recommended to address £160k pressure on children social care and bridge the gap on adult social care as above.
- 2.3 To note if both increases are approved, the 4.99% increase will increase income by £412k and raise Band D rate by c£48.00 to £1,051.62 (before GLA precept). This increase is not excessive and is below the threshold to require a referendum and much needed for continued support to vulnerable members of society.
- 2.4 To determine that a fully funded means tested council tax reduction scheme will continue in place for those on low incomes and least able to pay more. This means that those that are least able to afford it will continue to receive 100% support with their council tax bills.
- 2.5 To determine the Local Discretionary discount for Care Leavers between the ages of 18 to 25 is continued for 2024/25.
- 2.6 Determine the amounts of Council Tax for the three areas of the City (the City, the Middle Temple and the Inner Temple to which are added the precept of the Greater London Authority (GLA) Appendix B.
- 2.7 Determine, that as in previous years no discount (0%) is awarded to unoccupied and unfurnished and uninhabitable dwellings for 2024/25.
- 2.8 Determine that a premium is levied on long-term empty property for 2024/25 of 100%, 200% and 300% on properties that have been empty for 2, 5 and 10 years respectively. This is a continuation of the Premiums charged in 2023/24.
- 2.9 Introduce a new long-term empty property premium of 100% for properties that have been empty for longer than 12 months in 2024/25.
- 2.10 Determine that a Second Home Premium is introduced in 2025/26. 12 months' notice is required to introduce this additional charge.
- 2.11 It is recommended that, having regard to the government guidance issued, the Chamberlain be given the discretion, delegated to the Assistant Director, Financial Shared Services, to reduce or waive the long-term empty premium charge in exceptional circumstances.
- 2.12 Approve that the cost of highways, street cleansing, waste collection and disposal, drains and sewers, and road safety functions for 2024/25 be treated as special expenses to be borne by the City's residents outside the Temples (Appendix B).
- 3.0 Business Rates paragraphs 58 to 61

- 3.1 To approve an increase of up to £0.04p in the £ in Business Rate Premium raising up to c£8.1m p.a. to support the ongoing pressures on the Police and security costs (paragraphs 40 to 43, 52).
- 3.2 Award a Discretionary Discount under S47 Local Government Finance Act for qualifying Nursery Schools of up to 100%.
- 3.3 Note that the Non-Domestic Rate multiplier of 54.6p and a Small Business Non-Domestic Rate Multiplier Rate of 49.9p have been set by Central Government for 2024/25 (Appendix A, paragraph 9).
- 3.4 Note that, in addition, the GLA is levying a Business Rate Supplement in 2024/25 of 2.0p in the £ on properties with a rateable value of £75,000 and above (Appendix A, paragraph 12).
- 3.5 Delegate to the Chamberlain the award of discretionary rate reliefs under Section 47 of the Local Government Finance Act 1988 (Appendix A, paragraph 11).

4.0 Capital Expenditure

- 4.1 Approve the Capital Strategy (Appendix F).
- 4.2 Approve the Capital budgets for City Fund and the allocation of central funding from the appropriate reserves to meet the cost of the 2024/25 bids release of funding being subject to approval at the relevant gateway and specific agreement of the Resource Allocation Sub Committee at gateway 4(a) (paragraphs 70 to 73)
- 4.3 Approve the continuation of the allocation of central funding in 2024/25 to provide internal loan facilities for the HRA, currently estimated at £14.6m respectively.
- 4.4 Approve the Prudential Code indicators (Appendix D).
- 4.5 Delegate authority to the Chamberlain to determine the final financing of capital and supplementary revenue project expenditure.

- 5.1 Approve the Treasury Management Strategy Statement and Annual Investment Strategy for 2024/25, including the treasury indicators Appendix E.
- 5.2 Approve the authorised limit for external debt (which is the maximum the City Fund may have outstanding by way of external borrowing) at £432.8m for 2024/25; and the Minimum Revenue Provision (MRP) for 2024/25 at £1.4m (MRP policy is included within Appendix E Treasury Management Strategy Statement and Annual Investment Strategy Statement 2024/25 Appendix 2).

7.0 Resolution

7.1 the Resolution, as set out in Appendix I on page 9 of the Addendum, to be agreed.

(B) 2024/25 City's Estate Budgets and Medium-Term Financial Plan

The Court considered a report of the Finance Committee presenting the overall financial position of City's Estate.

Resolved - That the Court:-

- 1.0 Notes and approves the overall budget envelope for City's Estate 2024/25 revenue budgets.
- 1.1 Additional funding is required for new on-going cost pressures and have been included as budget uplifts:
- 1.1.1 Agreed pay award from 1st July 2023.
- 1.1.2 Net 3% inflation uplift to local risk budgets.
- 1.1.3 £2m central provision to cover assumptions for Ambition 25 (Reward Refresh) – subject to recommendations of the Corporate Services Committee.
- 1.1.4 £100k increase in legal costs to support specialist advice.
- 1.1.5 £540k contingency held centrally to support the increase in State Visits.
- 1.1.6 £20k funding to support RASC away day.
- 1.1.7 £113k provision set to support volunteering.
- 1.1.8 £148k recognition of staff contribution through staff summer events and annual lunch.
- 1.1.9£380k funding for Corporate Graduate Scheme, increasing to £710k from 2025/26.
- 1.1.10 £10k support for on-going Benefits-in-Kind review and annual reporting.
- 1.1.11 Shortfall on Occupational Health Physician services (£56k split between funds).
- 1.1.12 £85k increase for Mayoralty and Shrievalty allowances as agreed at the Joint Deputation meeting on 20 March 2023. For 2024/25 an increase of £62k is being proposed – subject to Joint Deputation meeting on 28 March 2024.
- 1.1.13 £400k provision for possible increases to Members allowance.
- 1.2 For Cyclical Works Programme (CWP):
- 1.2.1 Funding of £71m has been allocated within City's Estate to address £28m backlog of works and £43m forward plan, towards delivery of programme across the next 5 years from 2024/25.
- 1.2.2 Following meeting with the Joint Resource Allocation Sub Committee and Service Committee Chairmen, additional headroom has been created to address urgent health and safety issues at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama over the 5-year forward plan totalling £12.5m (£8m to 2027/28).
- 1.2.3 Funding identified from reserves in City's Estate resulting in an additional draw on assets endorsed by Finance Committee in December, to be ringfenced to the programme. Delivery will need to be managed robustly to avoid cost creep.
- 1.3 To address inflationary pressures going forward assumptions include 2% uplift

from 2025/26 onwards.

- 1.4 Savings still to be achieved from Commercial procurement and implementation of the Enterprise Resource Planning system have been profiled (£0.3m) to 2025/26 and (£0.6m) in 2026/27 respectively. Permanent savings from previous savings programme are expected to crystallise by 2024/25.
- 1.5 Other one-off pressures and opportunities for transformation in 2024/25 outlined in paragraph 11 to be funded from forecast carry forward underspends from 2023/24.
- 1.6 Unfunded additional revenue bids (paragraph 10) to be avoided during 2024/25, unless these can be prioritised from savings or income generated from the Corporation's Transformation Programme.
- 2.0 Approves the overall financial framework and the revised 5-year Financial Strategy (paragraphs 4-30).
- 3.0 Approves the 2024/25 Capital and Supplementary Revenue Project Budgets for City's Estate amounting to £218.3m (paragraph 27).
- 4.0 Approves the allocation of central funding of up to £218.3m for City's Estate to meet the cost of 2024/25 approved capital schemes. Release of such funding being subject to approval at the relevant gateway and specific agreement of the Resource Allocation Sub-Committee at Gateway 4(a). Note the agreed capital envelope for new bids of £5m in 2024/25 (paragraph 27-30).
- 5.0 Notes that the budget approved would exclude an amount of up to £50m in respect of sums already agreed by the Court of Common Council to cover the Smithfield Annexe Buildings, which are not included in the current capital estimates. Should this sum be required, the MTFP deficit will increase accordingly.
- 6.0 Delegates authority to the Chamberlain to determine the final financing of capital and supplementary revenue project expenditure.

Further resolved - That the thanks of the Court be given to the Chairman of the Finance Committee for his introduction to the budget reports before the Court this day and that a copy be circulated to every Member in the usual way.

9. CITY BRIDGE FOUNDATION BOARD

(A) 2024/25 City Bridge Foundation Budget and Financial Forecasts

The Court considered a report of the City Bridge Foundation Board which presented the 2024/25 budget and detailed financial forecasts for the period 2025/26 - 2027/28, together with a summary of forecast funds to 2032/33 for City Bridge Foundation (CBF), the working name for the Charity; i.e. Bridge House Estates.

The Chair of the City Bridge Foundation Board introduced the report, along with the

Bridging London 2020-2045 Strategy Refresh report at item 9(B) and the City Bridge Foundation Annual Report and Financial Statements 2022/23 at item 9(C).

In reply to a question from a Member, the Chair said he would be happy to keep the relationship between the City Corporation and the bridges controlled by the Charity under review, but reminded Members that the City Bridge Foundation had a statutory duty to act only in the best consideration of the Charity.

Resolved – That Members of the Court of Common Council, acting for the City Corporation as the Charity Trustee of City Bridge Foundation (Charity No. 1035628) and solely in the Charity's best interests:

- i. Approve the 2024/25 budget and financial forecasts for period 2025/26 2027/28.
- ii. Authorise the Managing Director of City Bridge Foundation, in consultation with the Chair and Deputy Chair of the CBF Board, to amend the charity's expenditure budgets and forecasts to provide for revised central recharges of City Corporation expenditure to the charity, following both a review by the Chamberlain of the methodology for these corporate re-charges and the finalisation of capital budgets for the City Corporation for its 'cross-Fund' projects which involve expenditure of CBF charitable funds.
- iii. Approve a new designation of surplus income funds for application for future Social Investments (the Social Investment Fund).
- iv. Approve the level of free reserves to be maintained over and above the agreed minimum policy of £35m due to economic factors alongside inflationary pressures.

(B) Bridging London 2020-2045 Strategy Refresh

The Court considered a report of the City Bridge Foundation Board presenting a refreshed version of City Bridge Foundation's overarching strategy; *Bridging London 2020-2045*' for approval and implementation from April 2024.

Resolved - That Members of the Court of Common Council, acting for the City Corporation as the Charity Trustee of City Bridge Foundation (Charity No. 1035628) and solely in the Charity's best interests - approve the refreshed version of the Charity's overarching strategy, 'Bridging London 2020-2045'.

(C) City Bridge Foundation Annual Report and Financial Statements 2022/23

The Court considered a report of the City Bridge Foundation Board presenting the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Resolved – That Members of the Court of Common Council, acting for the City Corporation as Trustee of City Bridge Foundation (Charity No. 1035628) and solely in the Charity's best interests - note the CBF Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2023.

10. Planning and Transportation Committee

(Deputy Shravan Joshi)

22 February 2024

City Plan 2040

The Court considered a report of the Planning and Transportation Committee concerning a new local plan for the City of London.

The Chairman of the Committee spoke to introduce '*City Plan 2040*', following which Members took the opportunity to ask several questions, covering the below areas:

Concern regarding the impact of future high-rise development on worship in Bevis Marks synagogue was noted, and a question raised as to whether this would be addressed during the forthcoming public consultation.

Some welcomed the Plan and thanked the Chairman for setting up engagement sessions. Clarification was sought as to whether elected Members could contribute to the public consultations on behalf of their wards.

Assurance was sought that the upcoming planning application for London Wall West area would correspond with the Plan's emphasis on retrofitting buildings.

A question was raised with regard to action taken to increase the appeal of properties to office workers, and to ensure that there was a healthy residential population in the City.

With reference to the recommendations within the report, a question was raised on whether it would be more appropriate to return the list of further changes (arising from the consultation) to the Planning and Transportation Committee rather than under delegation to an officer.

Concluding the debate, the Chairman addressed the points made by Members. He would not comment on active planning applications but confirmed that all applications went through the same stringent processes of carbon optioneering. Bevis Marks would become only the third named and protected site in the Plan. The Plan included a 'fast-track' approach to retrofitting for the 20% of sites not classified as prime office stock to allow a 'change of use' from office to hotel, leisure or cultural use, and there were already encouraging signs of utilisation of this approach. Concerning the recommended delegation to officers, the Chairman noted that the length of time it had already taken to bring the Plan to Court and felt it would not be appropriate to return it to the Committee. The changes from the consultation would reflect the views of all stakeholders, including Members.

Resolved - that Members:

- 1. Agree the proposed changes to the City Plan set out in Appendix 2 and that the City Plan 2040 (Appendix 3) be published for pre-submission consultation.
- 2. Agree that, following consultation, the City Plan, the public representations and other supporting documentation, be submitted to the Secretary of State, for examination.

- 3. Authorise the Planning and Development Director, in liaison with the Chair and Deputy Chair of the Planning & Transportation Committee, to compile a list of further changes to the City Plan in response to public representations and submit this to the Secretary of State.
- 4. Authorise the Planning and Development Director to make further non-material amendments and editorial changes prior to public consultation and submission to the Secretary of State.

11. CORPORATE SERVICES COMMITTEE

(Deputy Alastair Moss)

10 January 2024

(A) People Strategy

The Court considered a report of the Corporate Services Committee concerning a People Strategy for the City of London Corporation.

In the absence of the Chair and Deputy Chair of the Corporate Services Committee the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee introduced the report, thanking all officers involved in drafting the Strategy. The People Strategy would work to support the delivery of the Corporate Plan by ensuring the City Corporation had the right people in the right places at the right time. The report set out priorities on leadership, talent, development, and staff wellbeing, how contribution was rewarded and how the consistent delivery of basic service was ensured. Engagement would continue with all stakeholders as the programmes of work within the strategy evolved.

During discussion, Members made reference to the office attendance policy. Several Members requested that consideration be given to having officers in the office five days a week, while other Members noted the benefit provided by flexible workplace attendance. Members also requested that more though be given to the ethnicity pay gap and social mobility.

Concluding the debate, the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee noted the differing views on office attendance, and informed the Court that the Corporate Services Committee had agreed, in February 2024, that a change to the workplace attendance would be applied from 1 September 2024, with the effect of requiring all employees currently required to attend their office or place of work on a minimum of two days per work to increase their attendance to three days, or 60% of their working time. The Committee had also requested that officers return with a report exploring the implications of a 100% office attendance policy, which would need to be led by the Town Clerk and Chief Executive as the head of paid service, based on professional advice and consultation with staff. The Chairman shared the views of Members on narrowing the ethnicity pay gap, and on encouraging social mobility.

Resolved – That Members approve the adoption of the City Corporation's People Strategy 2024 – 2029.

(B) Pay Policy Statement 2024/25

The Court received a report concerning the City Corporation's Pay Policy Statement, setting out its approach to pay for the most senior and junior members of staff.

Resolved – That Members approve the draft Pay Policy Statement for 2024/25, thereby ensuring that the City Corporation meets its requirements under the Localism Act 2011.

- 4. The signing of funding agreements with CLF member authorities, enabling them to access this funding.

- 1. The charges set out in the report, with effect from 1 April 2024, or as soon as practicable thereafter.
- 2. The proposed Byelaws set in the report and that the Comptroller and City Solicitor be instructed to seal them accordingly.

Motion

Holmes, Ann, Deputy.; Mooney, Brian, Deputy 'The Chair and Deputy Chair of a Sub- Committee shall be the Chair and Deputy Chair of the appointing Committee, or their nominee(s), subject to the support of the wider Committee Membership. Policy and Resources Committee can approve exceptions to this practice.'

By deleting everything after 'be' on line one, and replacing with 'elected by the membership of the appointing committee, except where the court has designated to a particular role'

and Standing Order 29(4) which states:

'Ahead of the first meeting of each Committee following the annual appointment, the Town Clerk will seek expressions of interest of members who are willing and able to take the Chair.'

By adding, 'of the Committee and any of its Sub-Committees other than those excepted at Standing Order 27(2).'

During debate, Members reflected whether the amendments proposed would be more democratic, whilst some felt it may lead to adverse effects and unintended consequences.

A Member rose to make a point of order, noting that Standing Order 3(1) required any proposed changes to the Standing Orders to be recommended to the Court following consideration by the Policy and Resources Committee. The Member noted that the proposals had not gone through this process and asked if the motion was in order.

The Lord Mayor accepted the point of order and ruled the Motion as being out of order as the proposed changes had not been considered by the Policy and Resources Committee, as required by Standing Order 3(1).

16. The Chamberlain, in pursuance of the Order of this Court, presented a list of the under-mentioned persons, who had made applications to be admitted to the Freedom of the City by Redemption.

Questions

George Abrahams to the Chair of the Natural Environment Board The Town Clerk read out a question on behalf of George Abrahams to the Chair of the Natural Environment Board, which requested further information on how the benefits of the City Corporation's open spaces were valued and how the Court could help to support the spaces.

Benefits of the City Corporation's open spaces

In reply, the Chair of the Natural Environment Board noted the City Corporation's commitment to its open spaces. Their benefits included providing a home for natural life, places for people to enjoy, several cultural and heritage assets and essential ecosystem services. These benefits were historically unrecognised and undervalued,

and the Board had recently commissioned a natural capital audit to capture their true value. The audit had produced outstanding results, showing the City Corporation's natural capital asset portfolio delivered an annual estimated value of £282.6m, with a present value of over £8.1bn over 50 years. The open spaces attracted 47m visitors every year, and the Chair cited the example of West Ham Park, which attracted enough visitors each year to fill the nearby London Stadium 35 times over. The value of the open spaces carbon sequestration was greater than that of the amount being spent on the City Corporation's carbon removals project over six years. The open spaces had an overall benefit to cost ratio of 16:3, which the Chair felt delivered excellent value for money.

The Town Clerk read out a supplementary question on behalf of George Abrahams, asking the Chair of the Board to do all she could to use the results of the research to raise awareness of the importance and value of the open spaces to a wide range of audiences, and to demonstrate the City Corporation as being world-leading in this work.

In reply, the Chair said the Board and the Natural Environment department planned to use the result of the audit in a range of ways. She wanted to raise awareness of the importance and value of the open spaces to a wide range of audiences, internally, locally, nationally and globally. The Chair also noted the opportunities for income generation through biodiversity credits, government grants and Community Infrastructure Levy funding from other local authorities. The research could establish a baseline to measure progress against, inform the City Corporation's priorities and build effective strategic and delivery partnerships.

Deputy Shravan Joshi asked a supplementary question, referring to the biodiversity policies promoting green spaces within the Square Mile in the Local Plan. He asked if there was a way to quantify the values for these areas from the natural capital audit, and to monitor their usage.

In reply, the Chair said that the audit had revealed that the network of open spaces in the Square Mile provided £126.8m worth of benefits to society annually, and a present value of £3.6b over 50 years. The spaces attracted 21m visitors a year, and plans were underway to harness this footfall in building the City of London into a world-leading leisure destination.

Greg Lawrence asked the Chair why she had compared to West Ham Park to London Stadium, the home of West Ham United Football Club. In reply, the Chair said that she had been unable to resist.

Alderman Greg Jones asked if the audit could be used to examine any economic advantage that could be taken with surrounding developments and biodiversity net gains. In reply, the Chair said she saw no reason why this could not be explored.

James St. John Davis asked the Chair how the public good of the open spaces would be framed. In reply, the Chair provided details of the benefits the open spaces provided to all Londoners. She informed the Court of her upcoming appearance on BBC London to further promote the community value of the open spaces.

Electoral expenses

Deputy Madush Gupta to the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee

Deputy Madush Gupta, noting the increased cost of election spending, asked the Policy and Resources Chairman if he agreed that it was time to seek statutory changes to lift permitted election expenses by a minimum of 87%.

The Chairman of the Committee was heard in reply, noting the complexity of the issue. There was no national system that the City could use as suggested in the question. The system governing expenses for local authority elections was provided by a different power to that of the City of London Corporation's election expenses, and national updates applied to spending limits for local elections elsewhere were not applicable to the City Corporation. Unlike the uplifts for local elections, the method of uprating rates in the City could only correspond to a change in the value of money. Provision for other types of local election could be uprated as a result of changes recommended by the Electoral Commission, which would not necessarily correlate with changes in the value of money. This was due to a difference in the drafting of the provisions in the Representation of the People Act 1983. The sums for the City were most recently updated in 2005 and the Chairman agreed that a review was long overdue, particularly due to the significant inflation over the intervening period. In February 2024, the Policy and Resources Committee agreed that, subject to government agreement, the spending limit forward elections should rise from a lump sum of £266 plus 5.2p for each elector in the Ward List, to £385.70 plus 7.5p per elector. The calculation had been made on the basis of the GDP deflator index since the previous uplift. The report approved by the Committee had set out the reasons for using this measure opposed to other commonly used indexes. The City Remembrancer had advised that the agreed figure was likely to be acceptable to government, which the Chairman felt had to be an important consideration in any proposed sum. The Remembrancer's Office was meeting with the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities and the Chairman undertook to update Deputy Gupta on the outcomes of this meeting. Looking ahead, the Chairman was clear that the budget for City elections should be reviewed more regularly but felt the agreed path was the correct one.

Locum Tenens

The Town Clerk reported that the Lord Mayor now needed to depart the meeting in order to attend another engagement. Accordingly, there was produced and laid in Locum Tenens Court a Warrant, signed by the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, appointing Alderman Sir Andrew Parmley as Locum Tenens to transact all the business appertaining to the Office of Mayoralty of this City during his absence

Construction work on Fleet Street

John Griffiths asked the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee if he could help in resolving the delay in work on 120 Fleet Street, noting the impact it was having on the Fleet Street Conservation area.

The Chairman of the Committee was heard in reply. He shared the concerns shared by Mr Griffiths. The development was a critical scheme for the area, and the City more widely. The Chairman had requested and attended an urgent meeting with the development team. Although demolition of the existing buildings had already occurred, the Chairman confirmed that construction contracts had yet to be signed

and the works had paused. Senior City officers were in frequent discussions with the development team. The Chairman assured the Court that work continued to discharge the various planning conditions and agreements to facilitate delivery.

John Griffiths asked a supplementary question, seeking assurance that steps were being taken to secure the remaining Grade II listed building from squatters and dilapidation, and to seek a worthwhile meanwhile use from the developers until work could resume.

The Chairman replied to say that the condition and welfare of the listed building was of concern to all. It had been inspected by City officers and found to be both weatherand water-tight. The areas of special interest were protected and in good condition, and regularly cleaned and maintained. There was a 24/7 security presence on the site, and CCTV and motion alarms to prevent unauthorised access. Officers would continue to visit the site regularly. There were ongoing discussions with the developer to explore opening the building's historic ground floor to the public for meanwhile use, and a calendar of curated events, developed by officers and the Fleet Street Quarter BID, would be distributed in the spring.

Hugh Selka asked a supplementary question, asking the Chairman for his assessment of the scale of the problem of vacant sites and buildings across the City as a whole.

In reply, the Chairman said that development sites were continuously monitored. The temporary pause at 120 Fleet Street was an isolated example. The Square Mile was experiencing vigorous construction activity as planning schemes were implemented throughout the City, and the most recent Deloitte London Office Crane Survey had recorded the highest ever volume of new construction starts. The Chairman said that this demonstrated that the City remained a hugely popular and attractive choice for occupiers, and highlighted the big name occupiers who had actively moved back to the Square Mile.

Alderwoman Martha Grekos asked a supplementary question. She said 120 Fleet Street was not an isolated example, and noted that the development, along with several others in the City, were backed by Chinese capital. Highlighting the issues and potential risks this posed, she asked the Chairman what point there was in granting consent for schemes when the projects were delayed due to the problems of Chinese capital.

In reply, the Chairman disagreed with the Alderwoman's view of the Square Mile's real estate market and maintained that 120 Fleet Street was an isolated example. He reemphasised that the Planning Department remained in contact with developers and investors to ensure schemes came to fruition. The City Corporation's planning process addressed all applications which were submitted to it, and could not decide which it would consider. All applications had to be considered equally, regardless of the source of the financial backing, as long as the source remained legal.

Alderwoman Grekos asked a further supplementary question, asking if the Chairman would consider what other options could be explored to guarantee that developments were progressed.

The Chairman replied to say that he did not have the information to hand to answer the question and undertook to provide a written response.

Carbon emissions

Eamonn Mullally asked the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee to provide assurance that all projects would follow the City Corporation's Whole Life-Cycle Carbon Options guidance on finding the best balance of carbon emissions when demolishing a structure.

The Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee replied that the City Corporation's Carbon Options guidance set out a process by which developers could compare different options for a proposed development. It was adopted as a planning advice note, and developers were strongly recommended to follow the guidance. It applied to all major developments over 1000m² and for smaller developments where it was proposed not to retain the majority of the substructure and super structure. The guidance did not form part of the Local Plan, and was therefore not a firm requirement; however, City Plan 2040 would set out a 'retro-fit first' approach, reinforcing the Carbon Options guidance and be a firm policy requirement. The guidance had been widely welcomed as providing a clear process for developers to follow, and since its adoption all major developments had followed the approach. The Chairman emphasised that the guidance was a tool to provide a basis for decisionmaking and allow exploration of options and their whole-life carbon impacts alongside wider sustainability and planning benefits. In some instances, demolition may remain the most suitable use for a site, whereas retention may be a better option in other cases.

Eamonn Mullally asked a supplementary question, seeking assurance that the City Corporation would apply the Carbon Options guidance to the Bastion House planning proposals.

The Town Clerk informed the Court that the 40-minute limit for questions had been reached, and all unanswered questions deferred to the next meeting of the Court or answered in writing.

APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS ON COMMITTEES

- 1. The format of this paper shows the constitution of each Committee, followed by the proposed membership and, lastly, its terms of reference.
- 2. Against the names of Common Councillors are one or more numbers. A number shown without brackets reflects the total number of years that a Member has served on the Committee since first elected to the Court, including the forthcoming 2024/25 year. Numbers in brackets apply only to Committees for which the Court makes an appointment for a four-year period, and indicate which year of the period that Member is entering in 2024. (In the case of the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama, the Barbican Centre Board, and the Audit & Risk Management Committee, appointments are for a three-year period).

N.B. – Terms associated with membership of the Board of Governors of the three independent City Schools run from July to July, rather than April to April, to coincide with the academic year. Please note that appointment to the School Boards is subject to satisfactory completion of Disclosure & Barring Service Checks.

Nominations

- 3. Nominations for appointments on Ward Committees have been submitted in accordance with Standing Order No. 23(6).
- 4. Where a Ward chooses not to make a nomination to a Ward Committee or pair with another Ward, the vacancy shall be advertised to all Members and, on the basis of the nominations received, the appointment made by the Court.
- 5. Where a vacancy exists on a Ward Committee, an interim ward pairing option may be exercised (in accordance with the agreed ward pairing arrangements) until the replacement ward representative is agreed subsequent to the election of a new Common Councillor for the Ward.

Compliance with Standing Orders

6. Each Committee or Board, in carrying out the functions and responsibilities delegated to it by the Court of Common Council, shall do so in compliance with the City Corporation's Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and such other requirements as the City Corporation may determine. This includes Committees or Boards with different constitutional arrangements and/or extended delegations, such as the Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music & Drama (which operates under a separate Instrument and Articles of Government in accordance with section 29 of the Further and Higher Education Act 1992); the City of London Police Authority Board (which has vested in it the powers and duties of the Court of Common Council as Police Authority for the City of London by virtue of the City of London Police Act 1839, together with other relevant legislation, save the appointment of the Commissioner of Police); and the City Bridge Foundation Board (which has vested in it all the duties and powers of the Court of Common Council as Trustee of Bridge House Estates (Charity Reg. No. 1035628), except those matters expressly reserved to the Court).

Terms of Reference and Delegation

- 7. The Court of Common Council may discharge its functions and responsibilities through delegation to the several committees and through delegation to officers, in accordance with the Framework for Accountability and Delegation (agreed by the Court in January 2005).
- 8. Committees have delegated authority to discharge their functions as set out in their terms of reference and in accordance with Standing Orders. Where Committees have requested amendments to their Terms of Reference or compositions, the proposed amendments are set out in red text with proposed deletions struck through. The affected Committees are Policy & Resources Committee, Finance Committee, Audit & Risk Management Committee, Planning & Transportation Committee, Port Health & Environmental Services Committee, Markets Board, Fraud & Cyber Crime Reporting and Analysis Procurement Committee, Digital Services Committee, Board of Governors of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, Community & Children's Services Committee, City Bridge Foundation Board, Health & Wellbeing Board, Local Government Pensions Board and the Pensions Committee.
- 9. Some changes have been included following the authorisation of the Town Clerk, by the Policy & Resources Committee, to make factual amendments to Terms of Reference (such as the correction of job titles, committee names etc.)
- 10. The final terms of any proposed amendment will be communicated to the Court prior to consideration of this item.
- 11. Lands and/or property in the purview of committees shall be managed and maintained by the relevant committee.
- 12. Committees may also choose to delegate the exercise of their functions to sub-committees and, to officers.

Matters of Policy and/or Strategic Importance

13. The creation of a new, or the amendment of an existing, corporate or strategic policy, or other matters of corporate or strategic importance, should be referred by committees to the Policy & Resources Committee for consideration prior to the matter being referred, as necessary, to the Court of Common Council.

Appointment of Senior Officers

- 14. In recent years there have been a large volume of changes to committees, alongside a number of amendments to senior officer roles and job titles, the latter primarily arising from the Target Operating Model changes.
- 15. In 2016 and 2021 respectively, this Honourable Court agreed a process for senior officer appointments and an <u>updated schedule of which committees were to be involved</u>. It has been identified that Court Orders inconsistently (and often incorrectly) referred to committees' responsibilities and/or involvement with these Court-agreed appointments. Many job titles were incorrect, not all roles were captured and so on. To help ensure the Court of Common Council's Court Orders are never out of date, and do not have to be amended again in future, it is proposed that explicit reference to senior officer recruitment is deleted. This deletion does <u>not</u> remove any committee's responsibilities. Institutions have not been amended (e.g. the Independent Schools, Guildhall School of Music and Drama.
- 16. An exception has been made where Committees are responsible for making recommendations to the Court on High Officers (Town Clerk, Chamberlain, Comptroller & City Solicitor, Remembrancer and Commissioner of Police). A further exception has also been for Heads of Institutions.

Chairing arrangements

17. A motion was put forward by the Barbican Residential Committee in March 2024, further supported by the Policy & Resources Committee, in the following terms:

"That Standing Order 29(2) be waived for the Barbican Residential Committee for the 2024/25 civic year, on the basis that the Barbican Residential Committee is at a critical stage in overseeing the Barbican Estate Office Transformation Programme and related projects, and that continuity of leadership on the Committee is crucial for the successful delivery of the recommendation by Independent Consultants, Altair."

18. In consideration of this item, the Honourable Court is therefore invited to approve this waiver, which would have the effect of permitting the incumbent Chairman the opportunity to re-stand for a further year in the role, should they wish to do so.

4. Terms of Reference

- Securing compliance with the scheme regulations and other legislation relating to the governance and administration of the scheme and any statutory pension scheme that it is connected to;
- Securing compliance with requirements imposed in relation to the scheme and any connected scheme by the Pensions Regulator; and
- Other such matters as the scheme regulations may specify.

(b) securing the effective and efficient governance and administration of the LGPS for the City of London Pension Fund

The <u>Local Government</u> Pensions Board will ensure it effectively and efficiently complies with the code of practice on the governance and administration of public service pension schemes issued by the Pension Regulator.

The <u>Local Government</u> Pensions Board will also help ensure that the City of London Corporation Pension Fund is managed and administered effectively and efficiently and complies with the code of practice on the governance and administration of public service pension schemes issued by the Pension Regulator.

The Pension Board shall meet at least two three times per year.

5. Chairmanship

4. Terms of Reference

To undertake statutory functions on behalf of the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) and ensure compliance with the Local Government Pensions Scheme Regulations ("the Regulations"), relevant legislation, and best practice as advised by the Pensions Regulator.

To be responsible for: -

- a) formulating, publishing and periodically review strategies and policies around the Pension Fund, for example (but not limited to) investments, responsible investment, funding, and administration.
- b) selecting and appointing suitability qualified external service providers, such as investment managers and advisors as required.
- c) monitoring the Pension Fund's investment arrangements including asset allocation, the performance of investment managers and advisors, and asset pooling arrangements (noting that the Pension Fund is a shareholder of the London CIV pool).
- d) monitoring liabilities, making arrangements for the triennial actuarial valuation of the Pension Fund, and considering and approving the required employer contribution levels for each employer within the Fund.
- e) dealing with the admission and cessation of employers as and when necessary and to review the ability of admitted bodies to meet their obligations to the Pension Fund.
- ensuring the Corporation effectively discharges its obligations to scheme members and employers as an administrating authority.
- g) considering and approving the Pension Fund's Annual Report as well as all other statutory statements required under the Regulations.
- h) working with, receiving and considering comments from the Local Government Pensions Board (a scrutiny and non-decision-making body established under the Regulations) in pursuit of good governance of the LGPS.
- i) ensuring that arrangements are in place for consultation with stakeholders as necessary.
- developing and maintaining the appropriate level of knowledge and understanding to carry out their duties effectively (including completion of the Pensions Regulator's Public Service toolkit).

NOTE: whilst it is the expectation and intention that corporate policies are applied in respect of the Pension Committee's activities, such matters must always be considered in light of the specific regulatory requirements that apply to the administration of the LGPS. Therefore, where relevant and insofar as such policies impact the Pension Fund, they will need to be reviewed by the Pension Committee.

In my current role, part of my job is to keep staff vetting up to date under the Disclosure and Barring Service safeguarding arrangements and to maintain and conduct all safer recruitment in our school community.

Steve Goodman

I am a qualified social worker. I previously led both childrens and community services in Hackney.

I have sat on CCS for two years and I think I have made a useful contribution.

I have become increasingly interested in the social housing services that we provide and the need to develop appropriate strategies going forward.

If elected, I would want to continue to contribute my experience and knowledge of children and community services but also to increasingly focus on the social housing agenda.

I am currently a member of the Housing Management Almshouses sub-committee.

Natasha Lloyd-Owen

As a resident, now raising my 4-month old son in the city, I know how important the work of this committee is. As a previous member I particularly focused on improving the services available to young people (as the Lead Member for Young People), the city's strategy for tackling homelessness and rough sleeping and our support for carers during the pandemic. With my professional background in public inquiries, inquests and criminal law I will bring energy, ideas and real scrutiny to this committee.

Jacqui Webster

I am Chief Executive of a local charity, working with people to improve their physical and mental health, develop social networks, and increase social cohesion.

I have led on the design and delivery of programmes that put people at the heart of services from large Public Health and NHS commissions to smaller initiatives like peerled group activities to tackle isolation.

Over two decades, I have developed programmes for young people experiencing adverse childhood experiences; women experiencing multiple disadvantages in pregnancy and early parenthood; older people and people with long term health conditions, including stroke survivors and those experiencing social isolation.

Central London Works – additional grant funding and increase in contract value

To be presented on 25th April 2024

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The City Corporation acts as the Contracting Body for Central London Forward (CLF) which has been offered additional funding of £2.5m by the Department for Work and Pensions to continue delivery of Central London Works at higher volumes.

As with previous approvals of such funding in July 2023 and March 2024, a Court of Common Council decision is required to passport any such recommendations proposed by the CLF Board and approved by your Finance Committee. Your Finance Committee approved this funding at its meeting in April 2024 and recommends that the Court approves the proposals necessary for CLF to receive this funding.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Court of Common Council approves:-

- The signing of an addendum to the Finance and Costings Framework with DWP to enable the receipt of this £2.5m.
- The increase of the contract value of Central London Works by £2.5m.

MAIN REPORT

Background

 Central London Forward (CLF) is the sub-regional partnership of the 11 central London local authorities and the City of London Corporation. The City of London Corporation is the Contracting Body for CLF and in this role enters into contracts on behalf of the member authorities. Central London Works is the largest employment programme managed by CLF. The programme is the devolved Work and Health Programme in central London, and it is funded by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP).

Current Position

2. Your Finance Committee received a report at its meeting on 9 April 2024 informing Members that additional funding of £2.5m had been made available by DWP for Central London Works. The Committee noted that Central London Works was currently delivering above the target for its primary measure of performance, the proportion of participants entering work and reaching the Lower Earnings Threshold. The programme is currently the top performing Work and Health Programme contract in London for job outcomes, and the third best performing out of eleven nationally. Demand for the programme has been high, and CLF has had to limit the number of programme starts in recent months to avoid exceeding the budget. This funding would allow the programme to continue delivering at higher volumes until the end of September 2024, enabling support to an additional 1,200 central London residents.

3. Without the additional funding, Central London Works will have to cease taking new starters in May 2024.

Proposals

4. Your Committee accordingly recommends the signing of an addendum to the Finance and Costings Framework with DWP to enable the receipt of this £2.5m, and the increase of the contract value by £2.5m.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

Strategic implications

 The funding will support the delivery on several outcomes in the City of London Corporate Plan 2024-29. It will also enable the delivery of priority 1 of the CLF Strategy.

Financial implications

20. There are no financial implications for the City Corporation. Both the programme itself, and the CLF staff managing the programme are funded by grant from DWP.

Resource implications

21. There are no resource implications on the City Corporation.

Legal implications

22. The increase is in the contract value is permissible under Reg 72(1)(b) of the Public Contracts Regulations 2015. This is because a change of contractor at this stage would 'cause significant inconvenience or substantial duplication of costs for the contracting authority' and because the proposed increase in value (£2.5m) does not exceed 50% of the original contract (£53.4m).

Risk implications

23. There are no risk implications for the City Corporation.

Equalities implications

24. The additional funding would have a positive impact through tackling labour market inequalities. The programme has equalities targets which will be monitored.

Climate implications

25. There are no climate implications. Ingeus are required to minimise emissions as part of delivering Central London Works.

Security implications

26. There are no security implications.

Conclusion

27. The additional funding will enable CLF member authorities collectively to provide additional support for residents through their local employment services. We therefore **recommend** that this Honourable Court approves the above recommendations to allow receipt of the funding. In doing so, the City Corporation fulfils its responsibilities as the Contracting Body for Central London Forward (CLF) and in this respect the Honourable Court's decision is required to passport the recommendations put forward by the CLF Board through your Finance Committee.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Future Network Programme – Gateway 4b

To be presented on 25th April 2024

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

This report sets out the requirement to replace the existing City of London Corporation and City of London Police IT network.

In line with the City Corporation's Projects Procedure, your Digital Services Committee recommends under urgency procedures, the progression of the procurement of a New Network Support Provider to replace the existing network with a Secure Access Service Edge solution, at Gateway 4b, noting that the overall scheme would require additional funding requests through the budget-setting process for 2025/26.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Court of Common Council approve the progression of the procurement of a New Network Support Provider to replace the existing network with a Secure Access Service Edge solution at Gateway 4b, noting the total estimated cost of the project at ± 9.24 m, with an estimated Costed Risk Provision of ± 2.93 m.

MAIN REPORT

- Background
 1. The current City of London Corporation and City of London Police network was implemented in 2017. The network hardware is ageing, and the requirements of the organisation have evolved to a point where there is no longer a cohesive approach to networking across the organisation. The Future Police Estates Programme (FPEP) and Markets Consolidation Programme (MCP) require a resilient and robust network provision to support the delivery of modern, future-proofed facilities. The current network contract with ROC Technologies expires in January 2025 at the latest and cannot be extended.
- 2. Accordingly, the Future Network Strategy was approved at your Digital Services Committee when it met on 17th January 2024. The Future Network Programme ('the Programme') aims to deliver the Strategy through replacing the existing network with a Secure Access Service Edge solution. This is likely to lead to improved performance, reduced hardware needs, decreased energy usage, and greater flexibility in building use across the organisation, delivering a modern and resilient network to the City of London Corporation and City of London Police.

Current Position

 In line with the City Corporation's Projects Procedure, your Digital Services Committee (acting as Service Committee for the project) considered options under a Gateway 1-4, under urgency provisions. The options, and considerations, can be summarised as follows:

Option 1

To retain the existing the Multiprotocol Labelling Switch (MPLS) based network, continue to support the hardware, and replace it when it fails. This would fail to address the complexity and limitations of the existing network and would lead to inevitable disruption to connectivity when hardware fails. The existing network technology would be installed to all new buildings.

Option 2

To retain the existing MPLS based network and refresh the hardware based on the same technology before it becomes end of life. This would mean that the network remains supported but will not result in performance improvements or other associated benefits.

Option 3

To progress with the replacement of the existing network in line with the approved Future Network Strategy. This is likely to lead to improved performance, and the Wi-Fi-first approach will reduce hardware needs, decrease energy usage, and allow much greater flexibility in building use across the organisation.

Proposal

- 4. Option 3 was recommended, and approved, with the following Scope and Exclusions:
 - The successful replacement of the existing network hardware across 120 COL Buildings, 12 COLP buildings, 110 CCTV sites.
 - Move to a Wi-Fi-first network approach supported by the installation of new Wireless Access Points to provide improved coverage and connectivity.
 - The implementation of a new cloud-based networking and security architecture.
 - A modern, resilient network approach to support the delivery of new buildings through FPEP and MCP.
 - The procurement of a new Network Support Provider to support the delivery of the Future Network Strategy
- 5. The City Corporation Projects Procedures states that any project with a budget of over £5m, requires an approval by the Court of Common Council at Gateway 4b. The Honourable Court's approval is, therefore, being sought in support of Option 3, to replace the existing network with a Secure Access Service Edge solution in line with the approved Future Network Strategy.
- 6. If approved, the City Corporation would progress to Gateway 5 with the procurement of a New Network Support Provider at a cost of £535k, detailed below.

- 7. It should be noted that the City Bridge Foundation Board considered and agreed apportioned costs to the Charity at its meeting of 20 March 2024.
- 8. The cost to reach the next Gateway is to be funded from an existing budget of of £4.25m, captured within the approved 2024/25 budget as part of the Capital Bids. The total estimated cost of the project excluding risk is, however, £9.24m, with an estimated Costed Risk Provision of £2.93m (amounting, including risk, to a total of £12.17m). The Chamberlain has been consulted on the funding shortfall and it is confirmed that additional costs beyond the agreed £4.25m for the overall scheme would require additional funding requests through the budget setting process for 2025/26. Should these requests be unsuccessful, any spend would be from the approved £4.25m budget may become abortive costs.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

- 9. <u>Strategic Implications</u> the network provision is essential to the work undertaken at the Guildhall and therefore underpins the delivery of a number of strategic outcomes.
- 10. <u>Financial implications –</u> detailed in paragraphs 6-8 and risk implications.
- 11. <u>Resource implications</u> none identified.
- 12. <u>Legal implications none identified.</u>
- 13. <u>Risk implications –</u> any delay in approval could cause significant delays to the programme, holding up the subsequent required stages of approval to issue an Invitation to Tender and the award of the new contract. With an estimated programme completion date of December 2024, there is a risk of the existing network becoming unsupported, specifically the wired and wireless connectivity that is provided at Guildhall and other sites. If there is no contract, there would be a higher risk if there were an incident with the network or if updates were required, as there would be no support mechanism in place. The current contract is due to expire in January 2025 with no further extensions allowed, and delays would mean that alternative arrangements would need to be made; these would likely increase running costs as well as holding

up the required service improvements.

Noting that the programme has an agreed budget of $\pounds4.25m$, and an estimated cost of $\pounds12m$, if the remaining budget is not identified there is a risk that spend to date would be considered abortive costs.

- 14. <u>Climate implications –</u> the recommended option will likely lead to a decrease in energy usage.
- 15. <u>Security implications –</u> none identified.

Conclusion

16.As the total estimated cost exceeds £5m, this Honourable Court is being asked to approve the progression of the procurement of a New Network Support Provider to replace the existing network with a Secure Access Service Edge solution.

All of which we submit to the judgement of this Honourable Court.

Report – City of London Police Authority Board Refreshed City of London Policing Plan 2022-25

To be presented on Thursday, 25th April 2024

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

- The City of London Policing Plan 2022-25 informs the community, stakeholders and staff how the City area is to be policed. The Force and Court of Common Council (in its capacity as a police authority) are required to continue to publish a policing plan by the Police Act 1996 due to being exempt from the legislative requirement to publish a police and crime plan.
- 2. Policing plans must have regard to any national strategic policing priorities stipulated by the Home Secretary. Such priorities are currently articulated by the Strategic Policing Requirement; the Force's approach to this appears in the Plan. Additionally, the Plan takes account of Government policy statements regarding reducing crime, addressing antisocial behaviours, supporting the vulnerable, accountability and value for money.
- 3. The original 2022-25 Plan was approved by the Police Authority Board in February 2022, but there is a requirement to review and republish the Plan annually. In order to inform this year's version, wide ranging consultation was undertaken, including a Court of Common Council Member Briefing held on the 11th January 2023, and the annual community survey in October 2023. The Plan was refreshed in response to this consultation and approved by the City of London Police Authority Board in February 2024 and is hereby submitted to the Court for information.
- 4. The full City of London Policing Plan 2022-25 is available in hard copy upon request to the Town Clerk's Department and a web version of the report has been produced this year which can be found at <u>Policing Plan | City of London Police</u>

Report – Finance Committee Report of Urgent Action Taken: Setting a Small Business Multiplier for the City Premium

To be presented on 25th April 2024

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

The Court of Common Council is required to set an Annual Non-Domestic Rating Multiplier (the City Premium). Unfortunately, recent changes to the method in which the Multiplier is set were not included in the 2024/25 City Fund budget approved by the Court in March 2024. An adjustment to the Budget was accordingly approved by the Town Clerk under urgency procedures to set a correct Multiplier.

MAIN REPORT

- 1. The Court of Common Council is required to set an Annual Non-Domestic Rating Multiplier (the City Premium). At the Court of Common Council on 7th March 2024, the 2024/25 City Premium Multiplier was set at 1.8p. This was an increase of 0.4p on the 2023/24 multiplier.
- 2. A Small Business Non-Domestic Multiplier was also set as part of this process. Historically, the multipliers have been coupled and the calculation to determine the City Premium multiplier has always resulted in the City Multiplier and the City Small Business Multiplier being the same. As a result, the City has only ever carried out one calculation to determine the City multiplier. This same process was followed to set the 2024/25 multiplier at 1.8p.
- 3. However, for 2024/25, as a result of legislation decoupling the multipliers, the Chancellor raised the standard multiplier from 0.512p to 0.546p, with the Small Business Multiplier remaining at 0.499p. The decoupling of the national multipliers requires a separate multiplier to be calculated for the City Small Business Premium. Unfortunately, this change was not included as the 2024/25 Budget. The revised calculation means that the Small Business Multiplier for the City Premium should be set at 1.6p.
- 4. To allow Business Rate Bills to be dispatched in time for 1st April payment date, the Town Clerk accordingly approved, under urgency procedures, that the 2024/25 City Fund budget be adjusted such that a Small Business Non-Domestic Premium of 1.6p is set.

RECOMMENDATION

Report – City Remembrancer

Measures introduced into Parliament which may have an effect on the work and services provided by the City Corporation.

To be presented on 25th April 2024

To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

Statutory Instruments

Date In Force

The Levelling-up and Regeneration Act 2023 (Commencement No. 3 and Transitional and Savings Provision) Regulations 2024

Brings into force certain provisions in the Levelling-Up Act, including requiring planning authorities to use standardised data processes and mandates that planning authorities must provide public data under an approved open licence. Authorises the making of regulations in relation to duties on a developer intending to carry out a development to serve a commencement notice before any development has begun on the site. Brings into force a regulation making power which would permit authorities to confirm a Compulsory Purchase Order conditionally. The Regulations make permanent the streamlined regime for pavement licences.

Introduces requirements to publicise CPOs, including 30th April 2024 documents and notices online.

Social Housing (Regulation) Act 2023 (Commencement No. 2 and Saving Provisions) Regulations 2024

Gives the Regulator of Social Housing new powers including: to require a registered provider of social housing to prepare a performance improvement plan; and to arrange for an authorised person to take emergency remedial action in respect of premises to remedy specified failures in certain circumstances where there is an imminent risk of serious harm to the health or safety of the occupiers of those or other premises. The provisions also bring into force requirements for the Regulator to make, and take appropriate steps to implement, a plan for carrying out inspections.

Employment Relations (Flexible Working) Act 2023 (Commencement) Regulations 2024

Regulations bring into force the only remaining provision to be 6th April 2024 commenced in the Employment Relations (Flexible Working) Act 2023. The provision, section 1, relates to flexible working (right to request contract variation) and an employer's duties in relation to any such application.

Code of Practice (Requests for Flexible Working) Order 2024

Brings the revised Code of Practice on requests for flexible 6th April 2024 working, which has been issued by ACAS under section 199 of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992 (c.52) into effect.

Official Controls (Location of Border Control Posts) (England) Regulations 2024

Introduces greater flexibility in the siting of border control posts so that they may be located at a distance away from the immediate vicinity of a point of entry into England. The Regulations specify reasons why posts might be sited away from a point of entry and these include recurrent flooding in the area, cliffs which impinge on the physical location, and where entry is by rail and the first stop is away from the immediate point of entry into England.

Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 (Application of Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984) (Amendment) Order 2024

The Order brings processes relating to the forfeiture of 26th April 2024 cryptoassets - which are derived from or are intended for use in unlawful conduct – into line with existing forfeiture powers in relation to cash, certain listed items of personal property, and funds in bank or building society accounts.

The Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 (References to Financial Investigators) (England and Wales and Northern Ireland) (Amendment) Order 2024

Staff at Security Industry Authority, Food Standards 26th April 2024 Agency, Environment Agency, Public Sector Fraud Authority, and Department for Work and Pensions can now become accredited financial investigators.

Draft Financial Services and Markets 2000 (Disapplication or Modification of Financial Regulator Rules in Individual Cases) Regulations 2024

Regulations made under the Financial Services and Markets Act 30th June 2024 2000 to permit the PRA to disapply or modify any PRA rule, save in relation to conduct and financial threshold levels. Designed to ensure transparency of the PRA's decision-making, the regulator must publish a notice explaining its decision.
