- increase the number of voters at the 2025 and 2029 elections; and
- increase the number of candidates at the 2025 and 2029 elections.

This year the Ward of Aldersgate will democratically elect members to represent our citizens.

However in 14 of the 25 City of London wards there will be no elections and by default there will be fewer voters exercising their democratic right. Either the 'Speak for the City' campaign has failed or the system of election to Common Council has failed. In either case an independent enquiry is called for."

Ward of Bishopsgate - 19th March 2025

"This Wardmote resolves to request the City of London Corporation to reintroduce Ward Newsletters to help engage with the wide range of businesses, residents and students in Bishopsgate on the topics which matter to them most" Resolved – That the resolution be referred to the Policy & Resources Committee for consideration and any necessary action.

Ward of Cripplegate - 19th March 2025

- a) "This Cripplegate Wardmote:
 - i) Notes that several Members of the Court of Common Council have been appointed Lead Members including for Climate Action and Sustainability.  - iii) Resolves to request the Court of Common Council to appoint a Lead Member for Urban Greening and Biodiversity charged with ensuring City Corporation takes all necessary steps to increase urban greening and biodiversity enhancement independently of any requirements for the same in planning applications and other development proposals."

12. Questions

Hughes-Penney, R.C, Alderman to the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee

Defence Preparations

Alderman Robert Hughes-Penney asked the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee how the City was planning to play its part in the United Kingdom's defence preparations, in light of the rising threats of aggression from around the world and given the City's historically supportive and proud associations and affiliations with the armed forces.

In response, the Chairman indicated his strong support for the UK Government's recent commitment to spend 2.5% of GDP on defence from 2027. Shared security would also play an important role in the new UK-EU reset trade deal, with the Government announcing an annual EU-UK dialogue on defence and UK participation in the EU's €150bn loans-for-arms fund. The Chairman provided several examples of the City's commitment to supporting the armed forces and defence sector, including a Defence Finance Roundtable hosted in April 2025 in partnership with the aerospace, defence and security industry, at which he had been joined by the Defence Procurement Minister, the Rt Hon Maria Eagle.

As a supplementary question, Alderman Hughes-Penney, noting that the next meeting of the Court would be during Armed Forces Week, asked whether the Chairman would undertake to establish a committee or working group focused on security, defence and resilience engagement in order to ensure these activities and plans were implemented and developed in an ongoing and strategic manner. In reply, the Chairman noted that the current demands of this work were being met through the Policy and Resources Committee, meaning that the formation of a committee or working group was not required. He did not feel there was enough work in this area to warrant a separate governance arrangement and cautioned that any potential expansion of governance arrangements should be subject to weighty consideration. The City of London Corporation would continue to engage with and provide support to the Armed Forces and the aerospace and defence industries. Furthermore, by pushing for growth and clarifying its contribution to strengthening the UK's economic security, the City Corporation would continue to use its expertise to support the UK's national security.

Simon Duckworth asked the Chairman if there were other ways in which the City Corporation could use smaller amounts of money to support the body of City of London reservist forces, noting the marked impact this could have on the retention of reservists. The Chairman acknowledged that more could be done to support the vital work of cadets and volunteers and indicated that this would be given priority on a case-by-case basis.

Deputy Benjamin Murphy asked the Chairman if he agreed that the City Corporation's Open Spaces provided a useful venue for armed forces training. The Chairman agreed and thanked Deputy Murphy for promoting his committee's work.

Jason Groves asked how the financial services and banking industries could support the UK government and its allies to scale up their defence, which was becoming increasingly important given the current geopolitical background. In reply, the Chairman highlighted the FPS sector's £110 billion tax contributions which supported the UK Government's defence budget. City Corporation officers were working to engage with the HM Government to determine the next steps on locating a defence bank in the Square Mile.

In response to a question from James Tumbridge on the defence sector often being viewed as a negative sector for investment, the Chairman agreed that work was needed to continue to drive investment in this sector. The Chairman reasserted that the defence of the nation would always remain a key priority for the City Corporation, as it would for the UK government.

Fredericks, M.B, Deputy, to the Chairman of the Community and Children's Services Committee

Nursery and Childcare provision at The Aldgate School

Deputy Marianne Fredericks asked a question of the Chairman of the Community and Children's Services Committee, asking if she could inform the Court of the results of a recent survey carried out on the continuation in situ of the current nursery and childcare provision at Aldgate School.

In reply, the Chairman confirmed that a consultation on this matter had been undertaken between 24 March and 2 May 2025. Officers were currently preparing a 0-2 childcare policy, which would recommend a discretionary subsidy for childcare across the City. This would be considered at the June 2025 meeting of the Community and Children's Services Committee (CCS). The Chairman indicated that she did not want to pre-empt Members' decisions by discussing the matter in detail ahead of the June meeting, but assured Members that the consultation findings would be a core consideration in the agreement of any future policy.

As a supplementary question, Deputy Fredericks asked the Chairman to confirm that the nursery provision was included in the current provision for Aldgate School. She noted that the Chair of Governors at the Aldgate School had previously written to the Chairman and relevant officers to highlight misinformation being circulated regarding the nursery provision and asked the Chairman to acknowledge the confusion that had been caused.

In response, the Chairman said that numerous services were included as part of the surface level agreement with Aldgate School, with substantial conversations held with Aldgate School about the future provision of the Children's Centre Services, the Nursery and the 0-2 provision. The consultation findings on the latter would form part of the ongoing conversation about the future arrangements for all the services provided across the City, including for the Children's Centre and a hub for children's services. An existing agreement with Aldgate School meant that any information published by the City Corporation directly referring to the school would be jointly agreed by both parties before being published. This agreement also applied to information being published by Aldgate School regarding these topics.

Ruby Sayed, noting the importance of ensuring that childcare needs for the entire City were considered and that Members had an opportunity to highlight the specific childcare needs within their Wards, asked the Chairman to reassure the Court that there would be a thorough discussion of the survey results at the upcoming meeting of the Committee in June.

In reply, the Chairman indicated that a briefing would be held in advance of the meeting in June, given the complexity of the subject and the arrival of several new Members to the Committee in April 2025. This would enable all Members to ask questions in advance of the formal meeting and gain an understanding of the history of the issue thus far, to help provide a more informed discussion at the June meeting.

David Williams asked a supplementary question, querying whether the reference in the survey to the service of affordable childcare being a 'subsidy' did a disservice to the difference between a public service and the service provided by Aldgate School for the last 22 years as part of an agreement to deliver children's centre services in the City of London.

In reply, the Chairman reiterated the City Corporation's responsibility to ensure that all children received the best service wherever it was provided, whether at Aldgate School or other providers, and that children's services were equally accessible across the City. The Chairman assured Members that the debate at the upcoming CCS meeting would be as detailed and thorough as Members wished to make it and she hoped that the Committee would be able to reach a conclusion and provide parents with the knowledge of what services and provisions they might and might not be able to access.

Jason Pritchard asked why Members had not yet been given sight of the consultation results. He proceeded to inform the Court that 75% of those surveyed ranked keeping the subsidy as their first choice, and 87% ranked removing it as their last. He continued to ask if the Chairman agreed that these results were unambiguous in their support for retaining the subsidy, and that the service should therefore be protected in its current standing.

In reply, the Chairman indicated that the survey had included numerous questions and views in addition to this question, and that the detail of the survey responses was still being analysed by officers. While there was no doubt about the support for the current provision in the Aldgate School, it would be improper to comment on one or two specific outcomes ahead of consideration of the full survey results at the upcoming Committee meeting.

Establishment of a Working Group to review housing provision

Mark Wheatley asked a question of the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee, asking whether he would commit to convening a Working Group of 12 Members of the Court to review the housing provision and consider the creation of a housing committee with grand committee authority. If so, Mr Wheatley asked if the Chairman would convene this working group within six months, with the request that the findings be submitted to Court within 12 months of the group convening.

For the benefit of the Court, the Chairman repeated the response he had provided when the same question had been asked on Mr Wheatley's behalf at the Policy and Resources Committee on 8 May 2025. Following three external reviews of the City Corporation's housing service, action was being taken to improve customer focus, contract and cost management, to implement a new housing strategy and develop an asset management plan. A report in February 2024 had considered that current governance arrangements were sufficient to oversee improvements in the service, but indicated that this would be reviewed again in February 2026. As such, the Chairman was reluctant to agree to any new processes or working groups in addition to those arrangements. Members would also have to consider whether a new Grand Committee was the right mechanism to consider housing provision, given the existence of the Housing Management and Almshouses Sub-Committee, the Barbican Residential Committee and the Barbican Estate Residents Consultation Committee.

As a supplementary question, Mr Wheatley expressed the view that the decision taken in February 2024 to defer an outcome had denied residents good scrutiny of the Corporation's governance arrangements. He cautioned that Members must not

Wheatley, M.R.P.H.D, to the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee lose sight of their role to serve residents, asking the Chairman if he agreed that residents deserved the courtesy of a working group.

The Chairman said that the lack of investment in the City Corporation's housing estate was wholly unacceptable, and that housing provision had been pushed up the political agenda by Members and officers as a result. The City Corporation would need to look to private money and partnerships to improve the quality of housing and should consider the full list of governance options available before establishing a working party prematurely. Residents themselves should be consulted as part of this process.

Deputy Helen Fentimen, also the Chairman of the Community and Children's Services Committee, asked if the Chairman agreed the introduction of a new Committee structure risked disrupting the positive improvements that were currently being made. The Chairman agreed, highlighting that significant and positive work was underway, and reiterating that it was not the right time to review the governance structures around this issue.

Charles Edward Lord asked if the Chairman agreed that Member action was sometimes necessary. The Chairman agreed that Member action could be necessary on occasion and that it was important for Members to exercise their democratic decision-making powers. However, setting up ad hoc working parties to try to achieve these objectives would not be the correct route in this case.

Police (Conduct, Performance and Complaints and 28th May 2025 Misconduct) (Amendment) Regulations 2025

Permits the Secretary of State to set probationary period for special constables, clarifies that a conviction for an indictable-only offence will always amount to gross misconduct, provides that, where gross misconduct is found, the outcome must be dismissal without notice unless exceptional circumstances apply. The Regulations allow notices, for instance in relation to officer performance, to be served by email rather than post. Where an officer receives a notice about performance, the Regulations set a default period of 3 months within which that officer should demonstrate sufficient improvement in performance. Introduces a default period of three months where an officer is served with a written improvement notice.

Report – Finance Committee Pan-London Sexual Health eService (SHL.UK)

To be presented on Thursday, 26th June 2025 To the Right Honourable The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled.

SUMMARY

Your Finance Committee recommends a Competitive Process, under the Health Care Services Provider Selection Regime, for the procurement of the replacement Pan-London Sexual Health eService, due to commence on 15 August 2026

This recommendation is made following appointment of the City Corporation to continue to act as the Lead Authority for London and accountable body for the procurement of a new Pan-London Sexual Health E-services contract and the host of the programme management service under an inter-authority agreement, which provides for the commissioning of "open access" sexual health services across London.

Court approval is required as the estimated contract value exceeds £4,000,000 as per Section 16.2 of the Procurement Code Part One notwithstanding the fact that all funding is received from external parties. This proposal has been reviewed and recommended by Projects & Procurement Sub-Committee and approved by the Finance Committee.

RECOMMENDATION

That approval be granted for the procurement, via a Competitive Process (described in more details as Option 1 in this paper) under the Health Care Services Provider Selection Regime, of the replacement Pan-London Sexual Health eService, due to commence on 15 August 2026.

MAIN REPORT

Background

- 1. London's Sexual Health E-Service is part of the Pan London Sexual Health Programme (LSHP) which aims "to manage and deliver an efficient virtual service as part of a wider healthcare system that responds effectively to the sexual and reproductive health needs of London's residents."
- 2. In 2017, 30 London local health authorities, including the City Corporation acting in that capacity, agreed to collaborate to deliver these sexual health services under an Inter-Authority Agreement (IAA) dated 16th May 2017, with the City Corporation also agreeing to be appointed as the Lead Authority, being the accountable body responsible for hosting the programme management service and procuring the Eservice.
- 3. The contract for the provision of the E-Service, valued at over £200m, was awarded by the City Corporation on 15 August 2017, for a minimum 5-year term with options to extend it by a maximum of 4 years. The contract was extended for a further 3-years extension in 2022, and then a final 1-year extension was applied, taking the contract end date to 14 August, 2026.
- 4. The current E-Service is provided by Preventx Ltd who sub-contract with Chelsea and Westminster NHS Trust and Lloyds Online Doctor for clinical leadership, patient care and the supply of medical treatments.
- 5. It provides online assessment for sexual health testing services by post with remote treatment for chlamydia. The E-Service is partnered with London's NHS Trusts who provide ongoing care to E-Service users as required. It provides contraception to residents of 16 authorities, who have called off this optional service line.
- 6. The E-Service has performed well against the key performance indicators, the supplier has been responsive to our evolving needs and service user feedback is consistently positive. When compared with providing similar care pathways in a traditional clinic setting, the E-Service provides value for money to the participating Authorities and convenience for their residents.
- 7. A small Programme team, the London Sexual Health Programme Team (LSHPT) hosted by the Directorate of Community and Children's Services within the City Corporation, manages the E-Service contract on behalf of 30 participating authorities under the IAA. The arrangements provide for the costs of the hosting to be met by the participating authorities as well as for recharging each of the local authorities for their residents' usage in a timely manner so that liquidity risk is managed for the City Corporation as the accountable body.
- 8. An E-Service Management Board (ESMB), comprising of representatives from each participating Authority, provides strategic oversight for the contract and makes recommendations to the City Corporation when variations, including extensions, to the contract are needed.

Current Position

- 9. The 30 participating Authorities have recommended to the City Corporation, via the E-Services Management Board (ESMB), that the current E-Services contract is reprocured and to go live on 15 August 2026.
- 10. Publishing the tender documentation in June 2025 will ensure there is adequate time for the delivery of a comprehensive competitive procurement process by the City Corporation as Lead Authority, allowing all participating Authorities to obtain their own authorisations throughout the process, and to participate in the subsequent service contract awarded by the City Corporation. The competitive procurement (including legal advice) will be funded by all the participating authorities.
- 11. The new Provider Selection Regime (PSR) sets out the rules for procuring health care services in England by organisations termed Relevant Authorities. The key criteria under regulation 5 of the PSR are (a) quality and innovation, (b) value, (c) integration, collaboration and service sustainability, (d) improving access, reducing health inequalities and facilitating choice and (e) social value.
- 12. The participating Authorities reached a consensus in the ESMB of the 18 April 2024 for a competitive process to be undertaken for the (re)procurement of the Sexual Health E-services and this was endorsed by the authorities at a subsequent meeting of the LSHP's Strategic Board. The City Corporation as the host authority has taken this decision on behalf of the Related Authorities via the IAA.
- 13. Your Finance Committee accordingly recommends the competitive process option for reprocuring the contract, as it has the advantages of encouraging a costeffective service e-provision, promotes new approaches and improvements in service delivery and reduces the legal and reputational risk associated with direct awards.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

Strategic implications

- 14. Having a 99% service user satisfaction rate, the SHL.UK E-Service fully supports the City's outcome of "Providing Excellent Services".
- 15. The current contract has so far delivered high user satisfaction (99% ecommendation rate), award-winning service, and significant testing activity (57% of all testing in London). The service has recently been awarded 'Environmental Sustainability Project of the Year' at the HSJ Partnership Awards 2025 for the recycling and reuse of testing equipment.
- 16. Performance against KPIs is reviewed with the supplier at quarterly Contract Board and reported to all Authorities at quarterly E-Service Management Board.

Results savings, efficiencies and benefits

17. The current contract for E-services provides value for money to the participating authorities when compared with providing similar care pathways in a traditional clinic setting. Currently the participating authorities are spending £11 million less on STI interventions than in 2019/20. The greater the proportion of activity that happens online, the greater the efficiencies for the Authorities individually and collectively. Public Health England predict that the next 10 years will see a return

- on investment based on £9.00 saving for every £1 invested in publicly provided contraception.
- 18. The E-Service is addressing accessibility challenges for residents from deprived areas. 69% of STI Kits were ordered from the top 5 most deprived areas in London with 74% for routine contraception and 81% for Emergency contraception.
- 19. Providing the same care at lower prices enable the participating Authorities to meet the challenge of rising demand for sexual health testing that accompanies expanded uptake of Pre- Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) and fulfil the capital's commitment to becoming the first nation in the world to achieve zero new HIV transmissions by 2030.
- 20. The LSHP Team have a new dedicated senior Health Business Analyst joining the team in September 2024 to undertake all the data and financial modelling to detail the efficiency, effectiveness, value and behaviour of Pan-London residents accessing the Sexual Health E-Service and how it is critically improving health outcomes across all participating authorities. This information has underpinned the Business Case for the re-procurement and has been approved across all Related Authorities to proceed to market via a PSR route.

Financial implications

- 21. City Corporation acts as a trusted broker on behalf of the LSHP; consequently this proposal involves no direct cost to the Corporation.
- 22. The value of the monthly invoices from the existing supplier under the current contract requires enhanced approval processes involving the Chamberlain, Chamberlain's Department, and the Executive Director of Community & Children's Services. The programme team includes a dedicated resource for recharging the participating authorities each month according to their residents' usage. The level of liquidity in the funds under the arrangements is regularly reviewed with the Chamberlain and any new measures to manage risk for the City Corporation as accountable body are then implemented.

Resource implications

23. There is already a team in place within City of London who manage the SHL.UK service on behalf of the London Boroughs; the re-procurement will not require additional resource to be brought in.

Legal implications

24. There will be a continuation of the existing governing arrangements, including financial commitments; this will include the City Corporation as local authority which decisions are for the Health and Wellbeing Board and will be considered separately by that Board should this reports recommendations be supported. The City Corporation, as the Lead Authority can then take the relevant steps to (re)procure the Sexual Health E-Service in accordance with the City Corporation's standard procurement procedures and a new IAA will be required after approvals are confirmed at City Corporation. The IAA will clearly state the apportionment of liabilities across all participating authorities.

Risk implications

- 25. There is significant risk for London's sexual health system if the City Corporation does not re-tender the SHI.UK E-Service on behalf of the Related Authorities.
- 26. If the mandate is not approved as recommended by the participating Authorities, this would create significant risk of major reputational damage for all participating Authorities and potential adverse publicity for all Authorities, including the City Corporation because the activity currently managed through the sexual health E-Service will be transferred back to in-person clinics across London. If this were to occur the LSHP team will have to support participating authorities with a streamlined contingency plan service due to service disruption and financial constraints.
- 27. The re-procurement of the SHL.UK E-Service gives the Programme's capability to seek a more effective and efficient supplier in a competitive market under the PSR regime. The current pan London Needs Assessment indicates that there are critical changes in resident profiles and trends that require an updated service model and specification.
- 28.A lack of continuity of service will create a significant rise in financial burden for all participating authorities that has not been accounted for. The LSHP would have to seek advice and guidance from each participating authority finance teams (including City Corporation through its own participation).
- 29. A disruption in service will have a impact on residents requiring STI and contraception support across the region. This is counter-intuitive to the values and principles of the City Corporation's Corporate Plan, specifically Outcome 2: Diverse engaged communities, providing excellent services.

Equalities implications

30. The Programme has sought external support from the Equalities & Human Rights Commission to ensure Public Sector Equalities Duty compliance. To ensure the Programme remains fully compliant throughout the duration of the Programme an Equity Equalities Diversity & Inclusion Advisory Board (EEDIAB) has been established as part of the existing governance structure to provide advice to the Statutory Board and Clinical Advisory Board on all matters related to the delivery of the Programme. The EEDIAB consists of diverse service user representation to ensure service users' voices are heard and represented on all matters related to the Programme. This Group will be consulted on the Equalities Impact Assessment (EQIA) completed by the Programme.

Climate implications

- 31. The following initiatives around climate and responsible procurement are in place currently and will be built upon throughout the new service:
 - The existing e-Service as recently won a national environmental award:
 - Environmental impact (energy use, managing waste)
 Community benefits (engagement with neighbours, residents & businesses, service user involvement)
 - Workforce representation (ethos, culture, mindset)
 - Economic outcomes (recruitment of workers from London's diverse communities, local volunteering opportunities)

Security implications

32. There are no security implications.

Conclusion

- 33. The City Corporation as a Lead Authority (and through its own participation as a local authority) will ensure an exemplary LSHP procurement process will be undertaken on behalf of all participating authorities with the re-procurement of the SHL.UK E-Service.
- 34. By conducting this re-procurement, the City Corporation is provided with the opportunity to continue to enhance its reputation for delivering excellent public services, technological innovation and cost effectiveness.
