Aims of your organisation:

Faith Matters launched in 2006 as a vehicle to enable faith communities to reduce conflict using conflict resolution tools. Faith Matters works on integration, cohesion, hate crime and countering extremism projects.

Faith Matters has been ground-breaking and instrumental in developing new and innovative projects that bring faith communities together and in strengthening faith institutions. This has also involved strengthening the capacity of faith leadership, working on developing shared values that act as a glue between communities and in developing voices against extremism and extremist rhetoric. We have over a decade of experience on working in these areas and have worked with statutory, community and private sector partners. Our projects have also been referred to by Ministers in Her Majesty?s Government.

Main activities of your organisation:

The organisation?s tried and tested methodology and programmes aim to develop strong relationships between all faith communities using historical and religious contexts and by identifying commonalities between communities. Faith Matters has also specialised in online campaigns, developing hate crime projects, working on safeguarding projects and in online safety and security with mothers taking key roles in ensuring the safeguarding of families.

The organisation has a number of work strands and objectives that are listed below. Faith Matters therefore works to provide:

- ? Social programmes based on the themes of interfaith, conflict resolution, community cohesion, the protection of human rights and preventing violent extremism. Within these themes, we will work with any faith community.
- ? A bridge between secular and faith communities which are increasingly taking polar positions.
- ? Advice, support and consultancy to statutory, private and community / voluntary groups, in relation to faith groups.

Summary of grant request

The project aims to support its beneficiaries, particularly women, to access to the information they need in order to report anti-Muslim hate crimes. Through encouraging increased reporting, it will support more victims of anti-Muslim hate crime to will access diverse forms of practical, legal and emotional support to help them cope with or reduce the harmful effects of being subjected to a hate crime/incident such as depression, anxiety and the consequences of a lack of sleep. By accessing these forms of support and through participating in an informed manner in the criminal justice system, beneficiaries will experience a reduction in the fear they have felt following an attack, gain an improved perception of safety and security and, in particular, increased confidence to continue with their lives and to report hate crime (whether to third party projects such as Tell MAMA or to the police, or both), to encourage their peers and communities to do so or to speak out and challenge hate and discrimination in their personal and professional lives. It also aims to work with particularly active individuals and those who have the motivation to become multipliers and influencers in their communities to transfer information and increase their skills, understanding and opportunities to act as ambassadors for reporting within their families, social circles and communities.

The project will involve the coordination and promotion of 16 discussion workshops for 400 Muslim women. These workshops will address, at a basic level, the realities of anti-Muslim hate crime and support beneficiaries to understand why, and how, to report. Beneficiaries will leave the sessions with a greater understanding of how to recognise an anti-Muslim hate crime; an awareness of the benefits of reporting hate crimes (both to the police and to third party projects such as Tell MAMA); with an understanding of how to report crimes, what support services are available and how and why to access them. Beneficiaries will also here from true life case studies which demonstrate the gains that can be made from reporting.

It will also include the coordination and promotion of 5 training workshops for victims of anti-Muslim hate crime who are already active, or who have the potential to be active, in challenging hate and supporting others within the community to report crime and gain access to support services. These 5 workshops, which will target a total of 50 beneficiaries, will be based on our existing Certificate Course in e-Activism and Combatting Xenophobia and will cover topics including: (1) Legislation (2) Anti-Muslim Incidents in the Public Sphere (3) Online and Offline Expressions of Anti-Muslim Hate (4) Social Action and Engaging with Communities.

Beneficiaries will be invited to a final conference to share of experiences, findings and best practice. The conference will be directed at beneficiaries of the training workshops in particular, as well as representatives of support agencies (i.e. Victim Support, Citizens Advice), other voluntary groups and statutory organisations (i.e. Police) who will also be invited to participate both as speakers and delegates.

All activities will be implemented in parallel to the hosting of a microsite and moderating of a Facebook page and related social media activities to (a) Increase understanding of anti-Muslim hate crime (b) encourage reporting of anti-Muslim hate crime and (c) support others who want to play an active role in encouraging reporting within their communities. External organisations with whom we partner more generally on the Tell MAMA Project, such as Victim Support, will also be invited to host their materials on the site if they wish.

- 4. Increase reporting of anti-Muslim hate crimes within the beneficiary group
- 5. Facilitate increased and improved discussions and engagement that promote the reporting of anti-Muslim hate crime amongst a wider online audience.

Do you plan to continue the activity beyond the period for which you are requesting funding? If so, how do you intend to sustain it? If not, what is your exit strategy?

We plan to continue the activity beyond the period for which we are requesting funding given that hate crime is on the rise, we will raise funds through crowdfunding and through partnering with other agencies to increase the level of reporting and provide the support services to victims.
