The CoLP workshop was delivered online, and students given advice on how to obtain support, and report cyber bullying concerns to the police. Students were also told about the different routes into policing, with some later expressing an interest to join at the end of the programme. The Force is exploring with partners involved how this project could be taken into other schools and the future possibilities for this project.</p>
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
