2. Chief Commoner

#### **Deputy Peter Gerard Dunphy**

Its sincere gratitude for the approachable, diligent and reliable manner in which he has undertaken the role of Chief Commoner for 2024/25.

Peter's year in office has been defined by the energy and determination he has demonstrated in tackling a number of the more challenging matters faced by this Honourable Court. Peter has overseen consultation on, and the eventual implementation of, a new Members' Code of Conduct which, for the first time, mandates training on the Code. This will be an important step towards changing culture and ways of working for the better, enhancing standards across the Corporation. This is a significant legacy which will undoubtedly benefit all Members of this Honourable Court and, indeed, future Courts. Peter has also successfully implemented a more formal approach to setting out behavioural expectations

around behaviours at City-hosted hospitality events, thereby ensuring that those on the Court can confidently lead by example. Having said all of that, the kind of example that his mini-campaign for Westmalle Dubbel beer to be served at all events sets, I'll leave to others to decide!

One of the most important functions of the Chief Commoner is to act as the foremost representative of Members in respect of their rights and privileges – i.e., ensuring that Members are supported effectively in undertaking their roles and have access to the right tools to serve their constituents and the City. We are, therefore, particularly indebted to Peter for his enthusiastic oversight and promotion of the development and launch of a comprehensive Member Induction and Refresher Plan. This has seen the delivery of significantly enhanced training opportunities for both new and returning Members, and the programme will continue to run from now until the Summer Recess in July. This programme far exceeds what we have had in place for previous years and has benefitted immensely from his own experience as a Common Councillor, his energy, and his collaborative approach.

Throughout his year, despite the many and varied commitments associated with the Chief Commoner role, Peter has not foregone his extensive committee responsibilities, regularly attending meetings not only of his own Committees, but of others, keeping his finger firmly on the pulse of the wider Court and areas of burgeoning interest, ensuring he is able to offer advice or support to colleagues as needed. The pastoral support role of the Chief Commoner is often overlooked as it's done "behind the scenes", but I know that many of us are personally deeply grateful to Peter for the many hours and thoughtful consideration he has put in to assisting individual Members with personal matters, playing a huge role in supporting the wellbeing of his colleagues on the Court. Equally, he has been robust in dealing with standards matters or disagreements between colleagues, acting firmly and fairly to resolve issues quickly, as part of his ongoing and successful efforts to drive forward ever improved standards and behaviours.

As well as work supporting colleagues, Peter has of course been involved in many high profile civic and ceremonial engagements of national importance over the past twelve months. He played an integral role in the arrangements for the State Banquet for Japan - the first Spring Banquet in a number of years at Guildhall - as well as for the Lord Mayor's Banquet and the State Banquet for Qatar held at the Mansion House.

Other highlights marking the Chief Commoner's tenure include the Holocaust Memorial Day reception, the Pikemen & Musketeers Centenary service at St Paul's and subsequent Guildhall reception with Prince Michael of Kent, and also his very own Civic Dinner Programme, through which Peter embodied the City Corporation's unique convening power by ensuring that diverse and eclectic groups of people were brought together. These themed sessions were very much inspired by the Chief's contacts and I know that he was particularly proud of his film and media themed dinner.

In taking their leave of the Chief Commoner and in thanking him formally and sincerely, his colleagues wish to express their appreciation not only to Peter, but also to his wife Jennifer, who has supported the Chief Commoner over this past

year. We thank them both for their hospitality, approachability and drive for improvement, and wish them both and their young family all good health and happiness for many years to come.

#### 13. Elections

Question Alderwoman Elizabeth King, while thanking the Elections Team and all candidates for

King, E., Alderwoman to the Chairman of the Policy and Resource s Committe e their endeavours, noted that despite the Speak for the City campaign, the recent City-wide Common Council elections had not seen an increase in the number of candidates or in the number of contested wards, and asked the Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee to set out his plans to enhance the City Corporation's democratic legitimacy.

In reply, the Chairman joined Alderwoman King in thanking officers for all their hard work delivering the elections. He advised that it was usual practice to conduct a review post-Election to identify areas for improvement and confirmed that all Members would have a chance to feed into this.

The Speak for the City campaign had aimed to boost registration, complementing initiatives to engage the City's business and worker communities, including the City Belonging Project. The ward list grew by 1,416 registered voters between 2022 and 2025 – from 19,595 people to 21,011 – representing a 7.2 per cent city-wide increase, driven largely by business voters. This engagement had also sparked considerable interest in standing for election. More than 130 potential candidates attended the Speak for the City reception and 118 attended candidate briefings.

While the final number of candidates had not dropped compared to the last election, the Chairman acknowledged that the City Corporation did appear to face difficulty in converting high levels of initial interest into candidature. He felt all Members could acknowledge that seeking elected office and being an elected Member took up substantial time and work and that for many, at certain points in their lives, they reflected that it was not necessarily desirable for them to do so at that point in time. He added that, whilst the Court's non-partisan nature unquestionably brought strengths, it did mean that there was no party-political machinery directing candidates to specific wards, or ensuring candidates are fielded in every ward.

The Chairman felt that it was incumbent on all Members of the Court to make the case persuasively to the talented people they met, encouraging them to vote, to stand for election, and demonstrating to them and all the City Corporation's stakeholders the difference that they could make as a Member.

As a supplementary question, Alderwoman King asked the Chairman if he would commit to considering the following factors in the post-Election review: the scheduling of Committee meetings, the resources spent by businesses in registering voters, a reduction in the number of Wards or councillors, and a Citizens Assembly. The Chairman expressed his sympathy with the Alderwoman's position.

James St John Davis asked the Chairman if he agreed that investing in and expanding the City Belonging project and its networks would help with engagement. The Chairman said he believed engagement was a key factor in attracting more candidates.

Responding to a question from Deputy Peter Dunphy, the Chairman agreed that it would be helpful to consult those individuals who had expressed an interest in standing for election but who had, ultimately, decided not to stand..

Replying to a further question from Deputy Henry Colthurst as to whether consideration of the introduction of rolling registration could be fed in to the review. The Chairman confirmed that he would be happy for this to be included, although was unsure whether there might be additional costs associated with this.

Gaby Robertshaw asked if the Chairman agreed that there had been fantastic representation at the Speak for the City event. The Chairman agreed that it had been a

worthwhile campaign.

In response to a further supplementary question from Mark Wheatley, the Chairman agreed that it was worth considering the re-introduction of hard copy ward newsletters.

#### Cheapside Tree

Broeke, T., to the Chair of the Natural Environm ent Board Tijs Broeke asked the Chair of the Natural Environment Board if she could provide an update on plans to preserve the 'Cheapside Tree' and upgrade the surrounding garden.

In reply, the Chair said that preservation, conservation, sustainability and public access were key drivers in the City Corporation's Natural Environment Strategy. The tree, a London Plane on the corner of Cheapside and Wood Street in the grounds of a destroyed church (St Peter Westcheap), was believed to be the City's oldest living tree. The City Corporation looked after around 60,000 veteran and ancient trees of between 300 and 1,000 years of age across London and the Home Counties. Alongside these, the City Corporation also maintained upwards of 200 City gardens, churchyards and plazas. The St Peter Westcheap Relandscaping Project was part of the Cool Streets and Greening Programme, which aimed to create a more climate resilient and greener public realm while encouraging greater public use and accessibility. The protection of the historic Cheapside Tree was paramount alongside improving the surrounding churchyard's aesthetics and the project team had carefully considered how best to improve conditions for the tree through decreasing the amount of paving, improving the quality of the soil, introducing new planting beds and installing new fences to allow the roots more space. The project formed part of a citywide programme to ensure longevity and sustainability by developing appropriate conditions to cope with extreme climate fluctuations. Detailed designs had been approved at the end of 2024 and would be submitted to the diocese for faculty approval in Summer 2025. The Chair said that renovating heritage landscapes where faculty permissions from the Church of England were needed was complex, but construction was expected to begin in early 2026.

As a supplementary question, Mr Broeke asked if there was scope to explore funding a small research project and exhibition on history of the tree and its site. The Chair replied to say that heritage conservation and learning were vital elements of the Natural Environment strategies. The City Corporation was organizing the first International Veteran Tree Conference in three decades in June 2025, and officers were constantly developing and building their knowledge bank to explore all options to encourage and build public awareness of sustainable natural and heritage environments. Work had already taken place with the London Archives to host several successful outdoor exhibitions across the City Corporation's open spaces, and the Chair would support exploration of any project promoting the Cheapside Tree, the St Peter West Churchyard and the work of the City Gardens team.

#### **English Devolution Bill**

Deputy Andrien Meyers asked the Chairman of the Policy & Resources Committee if he could provide the Court with further information on the impact of the English Devolution Bill on the City of Corporation.

In reply, the Chairman said that an English Devolution Bill was expected during this Parliament, but that the City Corporation would need to wait until it was published to fully understand the potential impact. The Chairman did not expect any sort of local government reorganisation within London but said that the City Corporation through its position in London Councils, of which he was a Vice Chairman, was supportive of

greater powers and responsibilities being given to London with the aim of driving growth. It was vital that this was done in a way that protected the things that were unique and special about the City of London and that any new governance arrangements were developed in agreement and partnership between London boroughs, the City Corporation and the Mayor of London.

Meyers, A. Deputy, to the Chairman of the Policy & Resource s Committe

As a supplementary question, Deputy Meyers asked what the City Corporation could do to support deprived areas of London and the United Kingdom. The Chairman said that the main way in which the City Corporation could do this was through creating the conditions for growth that provided the tax revenues to fund public services, adding that he was pleased to note that the annual economic output of the Square Mile had exceeded £100bn for the first time. As the City Corporation's annual Total Tax report set out, the wider Financial & Professional Services industries contributed more than £110bn in tax; around half of the total annual UK health expenditure. Beyond this, the City Corporation also made a major contribution to Londoners through the City Bridge Foundation, through City of London Academies Trust, the London Careers Festival, its open spaces, and through its many other activities and services.

Deputy Benjamin Murphy noted the impact of the Bill on those counties in which the City Corporation's open spaces were located, and asked the Chairman if he would join the Natural Environment Board and the City Remembrancer in following this closely and applying pressure to political colleagues across the Home Counties where necessary. The Chairman thanked Deputy Murphy for reminding the Court there would be implications for the City Corporation's open spaces and other aspects of its provisions in these areas. Noting his own experience in county council government, he undertook to liaise with the City Remembrancer to bring the necessary political pressure in the right way to protect the City Corporation and its activities beyond the Square Mile.

#### City Child and Family Centre at the Aldgate School

Jason Pritchard asked the Chairman of the Community and Children's Services Committee if she would commit to retaining the City Child and Family Centre at the Aldgate School.

In reply, the Chairman said that she was extremely conscious of the local community's strength of feeling on this issue and the Community and Children's Services Committee had discussed the topic on several occasions. She continued by providing Members with further context on the Centre. The City Corporation had started to review the services it provided within the Square Mile in response to the governments launch of Family Hubs and the Start for Life programme in 2021. During 2023-24, the Committee reviewed reports on the development of a Family Hub within the City, and specifically on how it could deliver equitable and fair service across the whole of the City for all resident children. Concurrently, the Committee looked at an independently commissioned review of the services, which included consultation with relevant stakeholders. The consultees included parents at the Aldgate School. The review found that parents wanted schools across a range of geographically spread venues to ensure equity of accessibility and convenience to a greater number of families across the City. The Committee was conscious of the need to ensure a fair and equitable approach to accessing services and consequently agreed to restore the management of the Centre into an in-house provision. The Chairman emphasised that this did not mean that services would not be in a variety of locations across the City, including Aldgate School. Additionally, Members of the Committee decided in January 2025 to sustain the subsidy

of the 0-2 years childcare provision at the Aldgate School until 31 August 2026. This was done to ensure the subsidy was available to all children across the City. The Committee would consider this again at its June meeting, with the benefit of responses from an ongoing consultation concluding in May 2025.

As a supplementary question, Mr Pritchard said that while Family Hubs might make sense in larger borough, the City was small. The Centre at the Aldgate School was purpose-built and had operated successfully for over 20 years. He asked the Chairman why the City Corporation was trying to replace it with something designed for different needs. The Chairman replied to say that the proposals did not necessarily remove services from the Aldgate School and added that services were already provided in five other locations across city, including a second location, the Artizan Street Library, in Portsoken. These services were important to all families and all children across the City, and the Chairman acknowledged the high regard and respect of residents for these services. However, she also knew that families in other parts of the City could not access these services. The City Corporation was responsible for all 700 children in the Square Mile, and had to ensure services were fair and could be accessed equitably. She reiterated that there were no plans to remove services from the Aldgate School where it was appropriate for them to continue to be delivered from that location.

Deputy Marianne Fredericks noted that many services for residents in the City were located in the north of the City, and asked when similar services might be provided in the east side of the City.

At this point in proceedings, the time limit for the putting and answering of questions, including supplementary questions, by Standing Order 13(9) was reached.

14. Legislation The Court received a report on measures introduced by Parliament which might have an effect on the services provided by the City Corporation as follows:-

#### **Statutory Instruments**

#### Sanctions (EU Exit) (Miscellaneous Amendments) 18 April 2025 Regulations 2025

Regulations made under the Sanctions and Anti-Money Laundering Act 2018 and in consequence of the Economic Crime (Transparency and Enforcement) Act 2022, to update the procedure that applies when sanctions require urgent updating. The regulations apply to all countries subject to sanctions.

## Local Authorities (Capital Finance and Accounting) 23 April 2025 (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2025

Is retrospective and provides that, in relation to financial years falling within the period beginning on 1st April 2018 and ending on 31st March 2025, a local authority must not charge an amount to its revenue account to reflect any fluctuation in the fair value of a local authority's investment in a pooled investment fund. Instead, such amounts must be recorded in a separate account established and usable solely for that purpose. Provides additional flexibility for the accounting treatment of infrastructure

assets within a local authority's statement of accounts for financial years beginning on or before 1st April 2024.

### Environment Act 2021 (Commencement No. 10) Regulations 1 May 2025 2025

Makes provision for a statutory condition to apply to all planning permissions granted in England, subject to a power to grant exceptions. The statutory condition is intended to ensure the biodiversity gain objective is met.

# The Community Infrastructure Levy (Amendment etc.) 1 May 2025 (England) Regulations 2025

Clarifies that the Community Infrastructure levy is payable consequent on planning determinations made by the Secretary of State (or appointed person). The Community Infrastructure Levy is charged on new developments and is intended to fund local infrastructure.

# Companies Act 2006 (Recognition of Third Country 14 May 2025 Qualifications and Practical Training) (Amendment) Regulations 2025

Makes numerous changes to the recognition in England of overseas auditing qualifications, including the skills and qualification of an individual, that the skills are covered by a recognised professional qualification, that the law and practice of the country or territory with respect to the audit of accounts is similar to that in the United Kingdom, and that a person seeking recognition must be approved by the body or organisation which is responsible for approving a person as being eligible under the law of that country or territory for appointment as an auditor.

The text of the measures and the explanatory notes may be obtained from the Remembrancer's Office.
