Summary

Every year English Heritage publishes a list of statutory protected heritage sites, which English Heritage regards at 'most at risk of being lost through neglect, decay or inappropriate development'. The latest edition of the 'Heritage At Risk Register' (HARR) was published in October 2013.

The City's designated heritage assets feature eleven times in the 2013 edition of the HARR, the same as in 2012. These include:

St Mary Somerset Tower, Upper Thames Street London Wall (3 individually listed sections)

Roman Wall in basement of 90 Gracechurch Street

Kenley Common, WWII fighter pens (2 individually listed groups)

Ashtead Park

Wanstead Park

Wanstead Park Conservation Area

Bunhill Fields Conservation Area

The last four listings pertain to parks or conservation areas, parts of which are owned or managed by third parties, i.e. not exclusively owned by the City.

Actions proposed to remove certain sites from the HARR or to mitigate further deterioration are described in the report.

Main Report

Background

 Following the annual update of the English Heritage 'Heritage At Risk Register', the City Surveyor's Heritage Estate Section reports on the findings relevant to the City.

Current Position

2. The 2013 HARR includes the below listed eleven designated heritage assets owned by or managed by the City of London:

Assets within the City of London

St Mary Somerset Tower, Upper Thames Street London Wall – 3 individually listed sections:

- (i) All Hallow Church to 38 Camomile Street
- (ii) St Alphage Garden
- (ii) Cripplegate Fort

Roman Wall in basement of 90 Gracechurch Street

Assets outside the City of London

Kenley Common, WWII fighter pens (2 individually listed groups)
Ashtead Park
Wanstead Park
Wanstead Park Conservation Area
Bunhill Fields Conservation Area

A copy of the full HARR descriptions can be found in Appendix A.

- 3. Five of these properties are within the City and five are located outside. One property is included twice in its own right and as part of a conservation area.
- 4. The City's heritage assets included in HARR come under the following designations:

- 5. No City assets were removed from or added to the HARR since 2012.
- 6. HARR states that the trend at all City-owned assets is 'deteriorating', with the exception of Ashtead Park ('improving') and St Mary Somerset Tower ('fair'). However, proposals are in hand which aim to improve the condition of all currently included heritage sites in order for them to be removed from future HARRs.
- 7. Three of the listings pertain to parks or conservation areas, parts of which are hold or managed by third parties. Reasons for inclusions in the HARR are typically management issues arising from mixed ownership.

Proposals

- 8. **St Mary Somerset Tower** A development agreement to redevelop the St Mary Somerset Tower has been in place since 2012. Currently a number of variations to the agreement are being agreed to precipitate progress. The full lease is expected to be granted to the tenant in late 2014, once key building contracts have been signed and agreed to the satisfaction of the City. The tenant will then be obliged by the lease to undertake works to the external envelope within a defined timescale. Upon completion of these works the asset should be removed from the HARR.
- 9. **London Wall** A phased conservation programme to the London Wall was commenced in 2010. Works are on-going, fully funded by the Additional Works Programme (AWP) and are expected to take a further 2-3 years to

- complete. These three Scheduled Monuments should be removed from the HARR upon completion of these conservation works.
- 10. London Wall Cripplegate Fort The damage to the roof over the viewing chamber of the Roman Fort Gate, under London Wall, was caused by Thames Water's Victorian mains renewal contractor. The damage has been repaired to our satisfaction. Monitoring of the chamber is still required to ensure it no longer suffers from water penetration, which will assist in removing this part of the City wall from HARR.
- 11. Roman Wall (90 Gracechurch Street) Moisture damage was originally caused by a blocked ventilation duct, which led to the assessment by English Heritage. The ventilation has been reinstated and environmental conditions within the chamber have since been improving. The Roman wall will be inspected in early spring 2014 as part of the annual survey of all Roman remains. This will identify any further works that might be necessary to remove it from future HARRs.
- 12. **Kenley Common Airfield Blast Pens** The 'Kenley Revival Project', a programme of conservation and community engagement is currently being developed with the help of a Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) development grant. It will need to pass HLF stage 2 in December 2014 as well as seeking CoL authority to start work in early 2015. If successfully implemented, the programme would remove the two Scheduled Monuments at Kenley Common from future HARRs.
- 13. **Ashtead Park** As a result of commissioning a landscape Conservation Management Plan (CMP) for the Freemen's School in Ashtead, together with the efforts of Surrey Wildlife Trust, who manages the remaining park, English Heritage has acknowledged that the overall condition at Ashtead is 'improving'.
- 14. **Wanstead Park** A Conservation Management Plan (CMP) will be produced in 2014/15 and the park is earmarked for a potential future HLF application to address concerns identified in the HARR. Please refer to the separate National Lottery Funding (NLF) report tabled today.
- 15. A Steering Group consisting of statutory bodies, asset owners and local interest groups has been set up at Wanstead Park to address the overall management of the conservation area.
- 16. **Bunhill Fields Burial Ground** Is earmarked for a potential future HLF bid, which would prevent the cemetery, or any of the individually listed memorials, re-joining future HARRs. Please refer to the separate National Lottery Funding (NLF) report tabled today. Open Spaces will review and prioritise the submission of their projects to HLF as set out in the NLF report. In the meantime, we undertake regular conservation maintenance works to prevent further deterioration. Liaison with the local authority and other owners would need to be sought to remove the whole conservation area from future HARRs.
- 17. In addition to the above I shall continue to manage a planned programme of maintenance works across the heritage estate, and funds may need to be sought from the Additional Works Programme in order to mitigate the risk of any other assets being included on future HARRs. This would be subject to a further report to Members.

Corporate & Strategic Implications

18. If appropriate works are not undertaken to these heritage assets, they will inevitably deteriorate further which could lead to statutory infringement. Lack of suitable maintenance would permit further property decay and may increase health and safety risks, and reputational risk to the City.

Financial Implications

19. Table of funding available and anticipated completion date for conservation campaign associated with each of the areas included in the HARR:

Conclusion

20. The City's entries in the HARR remained the same as in 2012. Currently English Heritage has been co-operating in the City's efforts to remove entries from future HARRs, and has been working with the City in developing appropriate asset management strategies to achieve this.

Begun as a C17 park, Ashtead was developed during the C18 and C19 by successive owners. Although the estate was sold as 51 lots in the 1920s, the historic landscape is largely in two ownerships. The main house and surrounds are a school which is preparing a new master plan that, it is hoped, will be informed by an almost complete landscape Conservation Management Plan. The northern park is managed as public open space by Surrey Wildlife Trust who are willing to acknowledge the site's history in management decisions.
