Aims of your organisation:

Respond aims to make a real difference to the lives of people with learning disabilities or autism by providing effective and flexible support to help them to improve their lives. Respond works with children and adults with learning disabilities or autism who have experienced violence, abuse or trauma - as well as those who have abused others - through psychotherapy, advocacy, campaigning and other support. Respond aims to prevent abuse by providing training and consultancy and undertaking research.

Main activities of your organisation:

- 1. Individual psychotherapy for children, young people and adults with learning disabilities or autism who are victims and/or perpetrators of sexual abuse, who have experienced significant trauma.
- 2. Circles of Support and Accountability (CoSA) a community-based intervention for people with learning disabilities or autism who have sexually offended or displayed sexually harmful behaviour.
- 3. Group therapy CBT and psychodynamic groups for children who have been sexually abused; young people with sexually harmful behaviours; young people using violence in intimate relationships; adult male sex offenders.
- 4. Specialist risk assessments for adults and young people with sexually harmful behaviour.
- 5. Family Support Services family counselling, support work and advocacy for families whose children have experienced institutional abuse, mentalization-based family therapy for children and parents; advice and support.
- 6. Policy and Campaigns Forced Marriage, campaigning on a national level
- 7. Training and consultation services for multi-sector agencies in the UK

Summary of grant request

The overall aim of the project is to improve the mental health of people with learning disabilities or austim involved in the criminal justice system or those who are likely to come into contact with it, thereby reducing offending and re-offending. Respond is the leading provider of psychotherapy and support to offenders with learning disabilities. Respond has developed the use of CoSAs for offenders with learning disabilities and is reputable trainer for professionals working in the field. Respond believes this project directly addresses the Trust's priority "More offenders and ex-offenders receiving help and support to improve their mental health" as this is the sole purpose of this work.

20-30% of all offenders have learning disabilities or difficulties that interfere with their ability to cope with the criminal justice system, and 23% of young offenders have learning difficulties (IQs of below 70) and a further 36% have borderline learning difficulties (IQ 70-80). Research by the Prison Reform Trust (2008) found that there are a significant number of prisoners who, because they have a learning disability or difficulty, are excluded from aspects of the prison regime including offending behaviour programmes. Prisoners with learning disabilities and difficulties are discriminated against personally, systemically and routinely as they enter and travel through the criminal justice system.

The positive outcomes each year include:

- 1. Improved mental well-being evidenced for up to 25 offenders or those at risk of offending with learning disabilities through the use of recognised outcome measures
- 2. Decreased levels of risk for up to 25 offenders or those at risk of offending evidenced through the use of recognised outcome measures
- 3. A decrease in the number of offenders or those at risk of offending residing in Assessment and Treatment Units
- 4. Improved mental well-being and awareness of risk for up to 20 family members
- 5. Increased knowledge and skills for 100 professionals supporting people with sexually harmful/offending behaviours
- 6. Decreased levels of isolation for up to 25 offenders with learning disabilities through the use of recognised outcome measures

In order to achieve these outcomes the project focuses on the following areas of work. In each year we will undertake:

- At least 6 risk anaylses/assessments
- At least 15 individual psychotherapeutic interventions of a minimum of one year
- Training
- Circles of Support and Accountability
- Enhancing skills in the field and developing partnerships

People with learning disabilities or autism are employed as members of the Respond Action Group. The Group is involved in campaigning on issues such as disability hate crime, shaping service development and delivers training to external agencies.

All our service users are disabled and from diverse ethnic backgrounds. Respond makes much of our information available in easy-read formats and employ staff from a range of backgrounds to reflect the make-up of our service users as far as possible.

We have recently expanded our use of volunteers in all areas of the organisation. In particular we have recruited 30 volunteers to participate in our CoSA project, supporting people with LD who have offended.

Respond has a robust strategy for reducing its carbon footprint. Respond recycles plastic, paper, aluminium and glass. Staff do not print documents unless absolutely necessary. Travel is kept to a minimum by using remote meeting solutions such as Skype. All essential staff travel arrangements must be made using bicycle, buses or trains. Staff are encouraged to cycle to work and make use of the government's Bike to Work Scheme.

Psychotherapy and risk assessments/analyses

We will provide long-term individual psychotherapy for 15 offenders (and those at risk of offending) with LD each year.

We will provide six 12-week psychotherapeutically informed risk assessments/analyses each year for people with LD who are offenders or at risk of offending

Circles of Support and Accountability (CoSAs)

We will run CoSAs for five offenders (and those at risk of offending) with LD each year. We will recruit and train up to 20 new volunteers for the Circles each year.

Training, consultancy and awareness raising for professionals in the Criminal Justice System and families of offenders.

We will provide training and consultancy for up to 100 professionals each year

We will provide two support events for up to 10 family members each year.

Partnership development

We will work with partner organisations such as Ann Craft Trust, Prison Reform Trust, Institute of Psychotherapy and Disability, NSPCC (NCATS service) and service providers including Choice Support in order to build organisational capacity addressing the needs of young people and adults with learning disabilities.

Respond Forensic Service will fund the activity through earned income from commissions to undertake client risk assessments/analyses and psychotherapy, and clinical supervision for professionals. Respond will also secure grant income from charitable trusts and foundations.
