THE CHIEF COMMONER'S HANDBOOK

A covering note by Deputy Edward Lord OBE JP

Shortly before Christmas, I had a number of conversations with the current Chief Commoner and the Chief Commoner Elect, both of whom commented that there was a distinct lack of information about the duties and expectations of the office of Chief Commoner, and of the resources available to support the incumbent in their role.

It is not unusual in the City Corporation for there to be reference documents providing advice and guidance to Members holding particular roles, for example Boots Book for Aldermen, and the Sheriffs' Red Book, both of which have historically been put together by Members rather than by Officers.

Given the significance of the office of Chief Commoner, it seemed appropriate for there to be something similar. As no one else was likely to do so, I took it upon myself to spend the Christmas break drawing together available source material, and my own knowledge, to prepare a draft document which consolidates everything currently available into one document as a 'Handbook for the Chief Commoner'.
