Aims of your organisation:

Positive East's mission is: to improve the quality of life of Individuals and communities affected by HIV and our vision: to work towards a world where people living with HIV can fulfil their potential free from stigma and discrimination. Our four organisational aims are:

- ? Provide a holistic range of services that enable people living with HIV to promote their health and well-being, support self management, and to gain and sustain their independence.
- ? Maintain and increase work in building a safer sex culture, supporting people to stay HIV negative, reduce undiagnosed infection and reduce late diagnosis of HIV and the onward transmission of HIV.
- ? Influence policy development and service improvement that will enable us to further our mission.
- ? Ensure the charity is sustainable, appropriately resourced, and has the broadest strategic choice to best enable achievement of its vision.

Main activities of your organisation:

Annually we provide direct support to more than 1,700 people who come to us knowing they'll receive excellent service and a further 1,500 who will receive a free HIV test in our offices or outreach sessions. Many of our clients are from marginalised communities, whose experience of HIV is exacerbated by poverty, poor housing, isolation, treatment literacy, other co-mobidities, cultural/linguistic barriers to accessing services and HIV related stigma. We have developed an holistic service, tailored to individual need through an assessment process, to support people to achieve independence as well as their wider goals.

Current activities of Positive East Include: Advice Service, Counselling, tailored Peer Support, community specific support groups, health and well-being activities, i.e. yoga, mindfulness, massage therapy, healthy living workshops, i.e. nutrition advice, smoking cessation, volunteering opportunities and mobile and onsite rapid HIV testing. We also run a community cafe, computer lab and gym.

Summary of grant request

Aim:

Positive East's Advice Service is London's only accredited advice programme (AQS) that directly supports 900 people living with HIV (PLWHIV) per year. The primary aim of the programme is to support PLWHIV to: overcome poverty and financial hardship (including benefits challenges), housing instability, increase access to food banks, debt services, hardship funds and parcels and better deal with workplace/employment challenges.

Need:

Medical and scientific advances enables significant HIV viral suppression allowing HIV positive people to live with healthy immune systems and normal CD4 counts (400 and 1,600 per cubic millimetre of blood). However despite this, HIV continues to be linked to social inequalities including poverty, unemployment, economic instability and poor mental health - experienced by many of the 50,000 Londoners currently living with HIV (PHE 2016). For example, the 2015 PHE Positive Voices study demonstrates that 15% of PLWHIV report being late with bills compared to 6% of the general population and 33% of PLWHIV stated they had skipped meals because of poverty. Unemployment amongst people living with HIV is higher than the national average ? 64% of PLWHIV are employed compared to 73% of the general population (PHE 2016) and 63% of PLWHIV report depression and 73% experience ongoing anxlety (NAT 2016).

Activities/delivery:

Our AQS certified Advice Service provides information, advice, casework and advocacy (including representation at tribunals) on welfare benefits, housing, immigration and generalist advice Issues. The service is delivered via: telephone advice line; face-to-face appointments; drop in service; signposting to additional Positive East services, and volunteering opportunities. Your grant will be used to employ a full-time Advice Service Worker.

Why Positive East:

For 25 years Positive East has been at the heart of East London services supporting people affected by HIV. We're an integral part of the HIV health and social care pathways with close working relationships with HIV clinics and key health and social care professionals and services. The charity?s Advice Service operates through a holistic approach. This means that as well as addressing the advice related needs, we identify other key needs and link people with our peer support, counselling and group/course services. This approach promotes client independence and increases the potential for making our clients? financial futures more sustainable, e.g. dealing with complex mental health issues and being able to return to work.

Reducing poverty:

To reduce poverty we provide advice and advocacy casework in relation to ill health and disability benefits such as PiP (including supporting people to transition from DLA to PiP) and Employment and Support Allowance. The work involved supporting initial claims through to undertaking mandatory reconsiderations and appeals where our rate of success was almost 100%. The service also dealt with complex housing issues and supported people to access food parcels and hardship funds. Furthermore, our holistic services, i.e. counselling, peer support allows our clients to tackle the root causes of their poverty leading to sustained outcomes.

Good practice:

For example, last year 15 volunteers - many of whom are past Advice Service beneficiarles - supported the delivery of the Advice Service and we hold an annual service user forum which seeks to embed the needs and experiences of PLWHIV into the development and delivery of our services. We celebrate diversity and this is shown in the backgrounds and experiences of our staff, volunteers and clients, i.e. significant representation from BME and LGBT communities and women. We also take significant steps to reduce our carbon foot print through recycling and using recyclable products, and growing our own herbs and vegetables for our café.

Telephone Advice Line - available 5 days a week, accessed by clients and healthcare professionals delivering information and advice on benefits (mainly ill-health and disability), housing, dept, employment, immigration and generalist advice.

Face-to-face appointment service - delivered at our offices or regular outreach sessions at North East London HIV clinics. We also offer home and hospital visits where appropriate and representation at tribunals.

Drop in service - Clients can drop in to our offices and, where their presenting issue is urgent e.g they have no money, they will be seen immediately.

Referring on to other PE services - this can include Peer Support, skill development workshops, counselling, volunteering opportunities and job skills and CV development activities delivered by our partners at UBS, FCA and FCSC.

Training of volunteers - we will maintain a cohort of 20 volunteers annually and provide both induction and ongoing skill development training.

Positive East, like a large number of charitles, has gone through significant changes in15/16 due to reductions in funding from Local Councils. The Charity had anticipated a loss of £400k statutory income in the 2015/16 financial year which is just under 1/3 of our turnover. We have now completed the process of re-organising to strengthen and ensure the sustainability of the Charity for the future.
